

Making End-Of-Life Decisions

Ignatian Spirituality and the Examen

The Daily Examen has its roots in Ignatian Spirituality and is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day. An individual makes time to pray the Examen by pausing to consider God's presence and discern where God calls us. St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, thought that the Examen was a gift that came directly from God, and that God wanted it to be shared as widely as possible.
