Christ Church is actively involved with the Choice Food and Resource Center at Unity Square (CFRC), although much of the involvement is “behind the scenes.” Our parishioners and friends help staff the Tuesday appointment-only distributions as well as providing the bulk of the diapers, wipes and sanitary pads for our guests.

Laundry Love May Report (and first 5 months' summary)

In January 2024 New Brunswick Laundry Love @ Handy Street Laundromat changed the procedure for distributing laundry assistance. Figures showed that the average single person used around \$10 to \$12 to wash and dry their clothes. Anyone who was doing laundry just for one person would be assisted by one of our volunteers who would make sure the guest was using the appropriate size washer, provide the necessary Earth Breeze Liquidless Laundry Detergent for the size load and the amount of soil, then use a "high value" card to start the load. When the washer is finished, the volunteer helps the guest find a warm dryer of the correct size (so it will take less time to dry the clothes) and uses the Laundry Love card to start the dryer. This procedure allows us to best steward our resources and to increase interaction and connection with our guests. Since January, we have saved about \$260 over what it would have cost to give each person their own laundry card. In addition, we are creating relationships with these people, which is a main purpose of this ministry. In addition, we have noted a slight decrease in people asking for Laundry Love cards.

Since January, we have served 170 families and 35 single individuals. In all 1,458 loads of laundry provided clean clothes for 582 people. This includes Laundry Love distributed by our partners at University Behavioral Health, Elijah's Promise, Coming Home Middlesex County, and Rutgers' LEED program. Our parish is spreading hope and help through a vibrant social services network, reaching people we otherwise would not be able to assist.

Thanks to our volunteers! The program would not operate without them. Meegan Adames provides translation services for check-in with occasional help from Graciela and Nico. Paul Ambos and Deacon Daphne help with Laundry Love packet management and distribution, as well as assistant guests as necessary. Tony Scimone, a guest who has been using Laundry Love on and off since 2019, is in charge of helping guests doing laundry for just one person. In addition, Mary Lou Taylor has been packing our detergent and dryer sheet packets, taking a huge task off Catherine Ambos' shoulders.

Finally, the main cost of the program is the laundry cards. Parish support of this program allows us to provide this vital service to our New Brunswick area neighbors. Thank you.
