POSTPONED: FEBRUARY 5 GALA CONCERT We regretfully announce that our Gala Concert originally planned for New Year's Eve and rescheduled to February 5, 2022 must once again be postponed. With COVID infections from the Omicron variant on the decrease but still currently at around 5,000 new cases per day in King County (as of 1/20/2022), we feel that it would be unwise and not in the best interests of public health to present a choral concert until the transmission of Omicron has reached more reasonable levels. The new concert date is to be announced after the threat from Omicron has passed, but it will not occur until after Easter. The St. James music staff appreciates your patience and understanding as we navigate through these bumps and obstacles preventing us from a full return to our live concert series.

2023 Pope Francis has called for the whole Church, not just bishops and priests, to participate in the Synod of 2023. The local phase of the Synod is getting



underway now. Beginning in Lent and continuing into Easter, every member of the Cathedral Parish will be invited to participate in a Synod gathering to reflect on and share our experiences of Church. This is an opportunity both to be listened to, and to listen and be enriched by sharing with other Catholics. How might the Holy Spirit be calling us to journey together in the future?

WASHINGTON STATE ADVOCACY UPDATES

The state legislative session began on January 10. The Washington State Catholic Conference (WSCC) invites you to go to <https://www.wacatholics.org/>, where you can advocate along with the bishops of our state by signing up to receive the weekly Catholic Advocacy Bulletin, find out about action alerts on important legislation, and learn about the WSCC's legislative priorities. Thank you! The St. James Housing Advocacy Committee asks your support for House Bill 1781, Senate Bill 5651, and the Housing Trust Fund, which is a WSCC priority that makes funds available for affordable, low-income, and transitional housing. The House of Representatives is expected to vote on the expansion of assisted suicide, House Bill 1141, soon. This bill is contrary to our Catholic value of upholding the dignity of every person at every stage in life. Contact your state legislators (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/DistrictFinder/>) to urge them to support HB 1781, SB 5651 and the Housing Trust Fund, and oppose HB 1141.

PREPARES (PREGNANCY AND PARENTING SUPPORT)

SUPPORT is a nurturing response of the Catholic community in Washington State to "walk the journey" with pregnant and parenting women, men, and families with children up to age 5 who find themselves lacking a healthy support network. The program, an initiative of our state's bishops, came into being five years ago. Around the state, PREPARES has been active in helping provide basic needs to parents and their children, organizing parent support groups, providing opportunities for parents and children to get together, and family companions to share relationships with a parent in the community. Annual Report: Calendar year ending December 31, 2021

INCOME

\$174,823	donations collected for us by St James Cathedral, including online donations to SVDP (via the St James Website) and special collections taken at Mass
\$6,000	donations from other SVdP sources, from the SVdP conference at Holy Family in Kirkland (additionally gift cards were distributed by us but paid for by others: \$5,225 in Christmas gift cards donated by parishioners at St Jude in Redmond that we gave to 46 families living near St James Cathedral, including 57 adults and nearly 75 children. Also distributed were \$1,250 in Safeway cards donated through the Cathedral kitchen given to 25 neighbors in our parish)

We thank you for your donations, which we put to work directly helping people as quickly as we can. Thanks to an increase in donations at the end of 2020 we started the 2021 with a large balance in our treasury. Simply put, this is the reason our expenses are larger than our income. We did not have a negative bank balance. Most of our money is used to help pay rent to avoid eviction – an escalating need due to high monthly rents, accumulating rent debts caused by widespread unemployment during the pandemic and the fact that current eviction moratoriums are likely to end soon.



Mr. Adam Neiman is delighted to be in Seattle performing Chopin Etudes Op. 10 and 25; a collection of twenty-four short, technically brilliant, contrasting compositions which span a vast range of emotions from intense sadness to unbridled joy.

This collection includes the famous Etude Op. 10 No. 3 nicknamed the *Tristesse* or "Sadness," which Chopin himself described as one of the most beautiful he had ever written. In contrast, this collection also includes Etude Op. 25 No. 9 known playfully as the "Butterfly" etude. Experience these etudes with Adam when he will give a short talk on Chopin followed by a performance of select works and an audience Q&A.

Adam's journey toward becoming a concert pianist began at the tender age of five, at his mother's tutelage. By age eight, young Adam gained momentum with a succession of regional and national competition triumphs, recital and concerto appearances across the United States, and by his early teens, successful forays onto the international concert and competition circuit. As a 17-year-old undergraduate piano major at the Juilliard School, Adam won three of America's most prestigious classical music awards: an Avery Fisher Career Grant, Gilmore Young Artist Award, and the Young Concert Artists International Auditions. In the same year, Neiman was nominated for a Grammy Award, all before graduating from the Juilliard School with highest honors. Neiman has gone on to become one of the most sought-after soloists and chamber musicians of his time.
