Celebrating the Season of Creation

September 1 to October 4, the memorial of St. Francis

The following is by María de los Ángeles Casafus Carrillo of the Laudato Si' Movement

The Season of Creation is a time of grace that the Catholic Church, in ecumenical dialogue, offers to humanity to renew its relationship with the Creator and with creation, through celebration, conversion and commitment.

The Church has exhorted believers to work for the common good, which requires dignifying life in all its forms, caring for the common home, committing to the construction of more just, supportive, fraternal and peaceful societies, among other fundamental aspects to achieve what Pope Francis calls integral ecology in *Laudato Si'*.



Often, when we speak of creation, it is related to nature, animals, landscapes, the sun, the moon, but rarely do we become aware that the human being is the culmination of the Father's creative work, "God saw all he had made, and indeed it was very good." (Gen 1:31), the Sacred Scripture states, implying that God, after the creation of man and woman, is pleased to see all their work.

Accordingly, the **Season of Creation** is a celebration that allows all people to recognize ourselves as "the work of the Lord's creative act," to contemplate nature and all that dwells in it, and to care for our Common Home.

In 1989 Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitros I proclaimed September 1 as the Orthodox Day of Prayer for Creation.

Subsequently, the World Council of Churches (WCC) extended the celebration until October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. In turn, in 2015 Pope Francis made the Season of Creation official for the Roman Catholic Church.

107th WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES

September 26, 2021

Toward an Ever Wider “We”

Are we all in this world together? Or is it every person in it for themselves? This question is at the heart of Pope Francis message for this year's World Day of Migrants & Refugees. Take a minute to reflect on the past year and a half of life through this pandemic.

What has helped you survive the pandemic? What gave you hope? What drew out the best in you?

Where and how did you practice connections to an “ever-wider we”?

In his message, Pope Francis urges us toward an ever wider *we* - to welcome migrants and refugees into our communities *for us* and for them – because we believe there is *only* “we”. When we welcome a newly-arrived immigrant or help to resettle a refugee, we seek to dissolve their fears of a new place, and a new culture, and deeper fears of being marginalized. A sincere welcome recognizes and calls forth the best of their humanity, and at the same time, we practice the best of our humanity. Throughout the pandemic, reaching out to help others, to receive the kindness of others, to connect in new (safe!) ways, all went a long way to allay our fears, to find a new sense of “enough”, and to swim in the sea of uncertainty. When we recall and savor those life-giving practices from the past year, we find a desire to share that experience with those who arrive as migrants. Many pressures seek to divide us, yet they cannot smother our own experience of the Spirit. Let the Holy Spirit, who speaks as a voice within, unite us. Let us recall our common humanity with immigrant friends, neighbors, and colleagues. As Francis writes, “The Holy Spirit enables us to embrace everyone, to build community in diversity, and to unify differences.”
