I'm happy to share with you a couple of "good news" items.

First, the Archbishop is assigning a part-time Parochial Vicar to the Cathedral parish. He is Father Alex Pablo, who has been serving the past few years at the four-parish cluster on Beacon Hill and in the Rainier Valley. Father Alex is a priest of the Diocese of San Fernando of La Union, Philippines. He will be joining us on October 1, and will be living in the Rectory. Father Alex's duties will be mainly on weekdays, when he will be assisting with Masses, confessions, pastoral counseling, and the occasional funeral. He will also make himself available when people come to the office requesting a priest. Most weekends, he will be helping out in parishes around the Archdiocese. I know you will welcome Father Alex and I'm sure he will be a happy addition to the Cathedral community.

Some of you have asked how Father Brant is doing during all this. He is weathering the lockdown quite well, but I'm sure he'd be the first to say he is slowing down a bit, and is grateful for your prayers.

The second bit of good news: in response to my recent appeal for the Cathedral Kitchen, you donated an extraordinary \$140,890 – and counting. 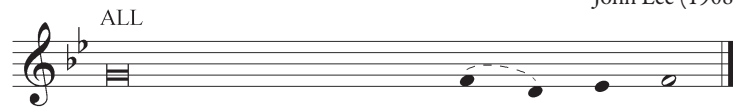



### *Distribution of Holy Communion*

- + **Communion is given only in the hand. Hold your hand as flat as possible.**
- + **As you process forward to receive communion, and as you return to your seat, please maintain six feet of separation between family groups.**
- + **Wear your mask. Hold your hands out flat so that the minister can easily put the host on your open palm without touching your hand. (If contact is made, the EM is required to stop and sanitize her or his hands before moving on to the next household.)**
- + **After receiving Holy Communion, lower your mask with one hand, put the host in your mouth, and then put your mask back on.**
- + **Following the procession, please exit by the door nearest you. This may not be the door you came in. Maintain social distance as you leave the Cathedral and follow the directions of the ministers.**

**ST VINCENT DE PAUL THANKS YOU** Six years ago our Cathedral Vincentians met a middle-aged man who needed a winter coat. We visited in his apartment and learned he could not afford a coat or find one large enough to fit. We helped him find a good coat that was a perfect fit, at no cost to him. While visiting, we also learned he can barely read and has multiple health issues. Despite such challenges, we could see he did his best to manage his limited disability income and rarely needed help. After the pandemic started but before the eviction moratorium, we were surprised to hear he needed help paying rent. We visited by phone and learned his building had been sold. The new owner was charging an additional fee for utilities, but he did not recall getting notice of the utilities charge. He was many months behind paying utilities and had just received an eviction notice for failure to pay. Because of his limited reading skills, he did not understand the eviction notice. We explained a few things and then, after our phone visit, talked with his landlord. The result was that we paid enough on the utilities bill to make sure he could stay in his apartment and pay the balance himself over time. And he still has that old winter coat. 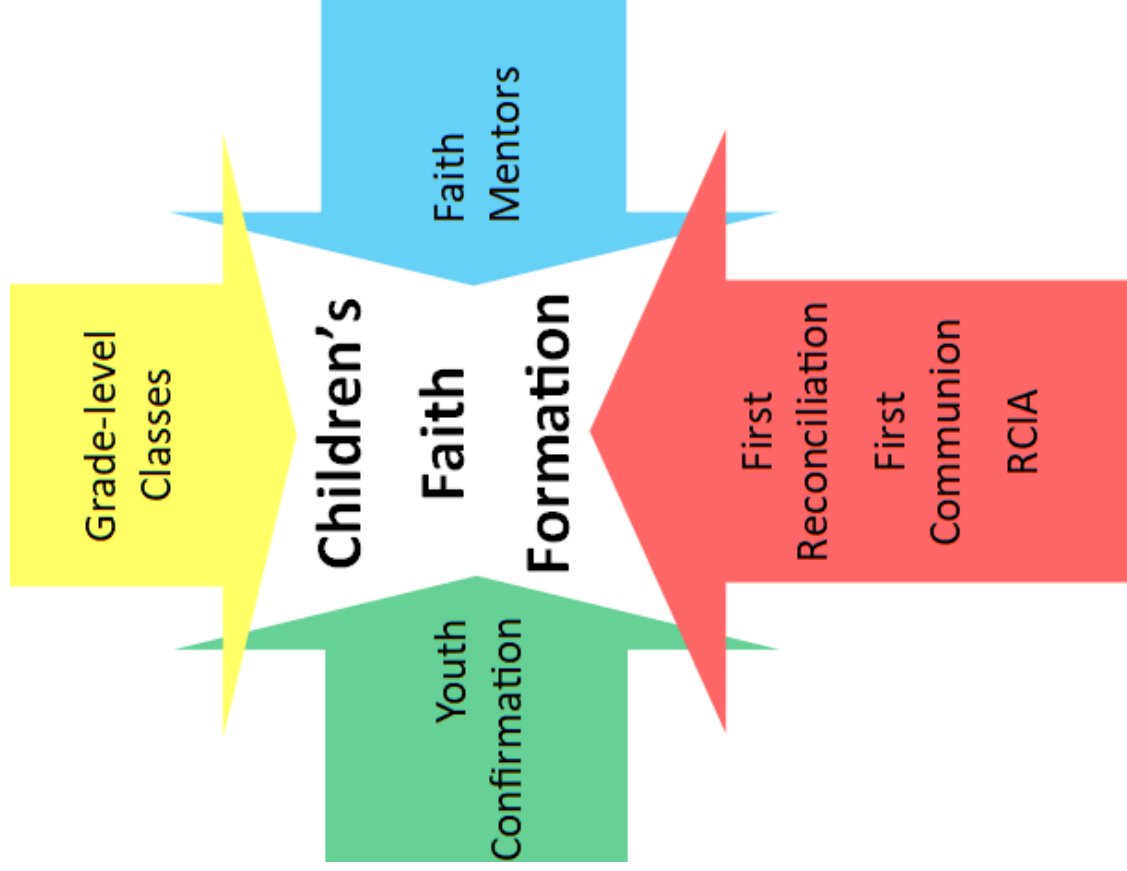

The Church has been celebrating the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR) since 1914. It is always an occasion to express concern for different vulnerable people on the move; to pray for them as they face many challenges; and to increase awareness about the opportunities that migration offers. As the title for his annual message, the Holy Father has chosen “Forced like Jesus Christ to flee” to focus on the pastoral care of internally displaced people.

“During the flight into Egypt, the child Jesus experienced with his parents the tragic fate of the displaced and refugees, “which is marked by fear, uncertainty and unease (cf. Mt 2:13-15, 19-23). Unfortunately, in our own times, millions of families can identify with this sad reality. Almost every day the television and papers carry news of refugees fleeing from hunger, war and other grave dangers, in search of security and a dignified life for themselves and for their families” (Angelus, 29 December 2013). In each of these people, forced to flee to safety, Jesus is present as he was at the time of Herod. In the faces of the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the sick, strangers and prisoners, we are called to see the face of Christ who pleads with us to help (cf. Mt 25:31-46). If we can recognize him in those faces, we will be the ones to thank him for having been able to meet, love and serve him in them. Displaced people offer us this opportunity to meet the Lord, “even though our eyes find it hard to recognize him: his clothing in tatters, his feet dirty, his face disfigured, his body wounded, his tongue unable to speak our language” (Homily, 15 February 2019). We are called to respond to this pastoral challenge with the four verbs I indicated in my Message for this Day in 2018: welcome, protect, promote and integrate.”
