EUCHARIST: Food for the Multitude

1st in a series of 5

July 28, 2024

This year, the Lectionary takes us through the Gospel of Mark—except for a five-week stretch of summer Sundays when we read John, Chapter 6. This offers us an opportunity for an extended reflection on the Bread of Life—the Eucharist. In this series of five bulletin inserts, we'll reflect on this central mystery of our faith.

THE SIGN

The people are hungry and there is practically nothing to eat—all they can find are five barley loaves and two fish. Jesus takes these offerings, blesses them, and shares them with the crowd. And, wondrously, everyone eats their fill.

John tells us that this miracle is a *sign*—that is, a manifestation of divine power with a distinct purpose: to lead to people to faith. This sign points toward the Eucharist. Notice how carefully Jesus' actions are described: "he took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them." The parallels with the Last Supper are hard to miss: "the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it" (1 Cor 11:23-24). Taking, blessing, breaking, giving—this is the pattern of every Eucharist.

After all have eaten their fill, Jesus tells his disciples to gather up the fragments, so that nothing is wasted. And the scraps fill twelve wicker baskets! Why are there so many leftovers? In the Scriptures, the number twelve indicates completeness. This extraordinary superabundance suggests that Jesus performed this miracle not just for those who gathered with him on the hillside, but for all believers, down through the ages—including us. There is enough for all.

ONE AND MANY

In the Eucharist, Christ comes to each of us: Body and Blood, soul and divinity. We call this sacrament *communion* because here we "are united in a hidden and real way to Christ who suffered and was glorified" (*Lumen Gentium*, 7). Sharing in this sacred meal, we are nourished in spirit, cleansed from sin, and strengthened in charity. This sharing is profound, intimate, and personal. Each of us needs this union with Christ on our own journey of faith.

But there is more. Participation in the Eucharist not only unites us with Christ, but with all who share in this sacrament. In receiving the

Body of Christ, we become one body with Christ *and* with one another, so much so that the community of believers is also called "the Body of Christ." In the words of St. Augustine (354-430), "Since you make up the body of Christ and are his members, your mystery rests on the table of the Lord; you receive your own mystery. You answer 'Amen' to the reality of what you are; your reply gives consent to it. For on hearing the words, 'The Body of Christ,' you reply, 'Amen.' Be in fact a member of Christ's body for your affirmation, 'Amen,' to ring true."

No matter how many gather to celebrate the Eucharist—whether it is one or one million—we always receive this sacrament in the midst of the multitude: that is, the Church. We are in this together.







ST. JAMES IMMIGRANT ASSISTANCE (SJIA) PROVIDES INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT TO THOSE SEEKING CITIZENSHIP Alexander (not his real name) sought SJIA’s help with applying for US citizenship. He experienced tragedies in his home country, and as a result suffers from anxiety. At his first naturalization interview, his legal representative noticed that his anxiety was heightened by the long wait time at the Immigration office. Additionally, he was scheduled to be interviewed remotely over a computer in an open room where others were also being interviewed. The combination of the noise and the challenge of being interviewed via computer heightened Alexander’s stress such that he was unable to demonstrate his knowledge to pass the civics requirement. Having observed this, his legal representative advocated for Alexander to have his second (and final) interview in person and in a private office, a request that Immigration accommodated. At this second interview, Alexander was able to concentrate more easily. He passed his exams and was approved to naturalize. Because SJIA was with him at his first interview, we were able to see the obstacles and advocate for a more appropriate testing environment for him. 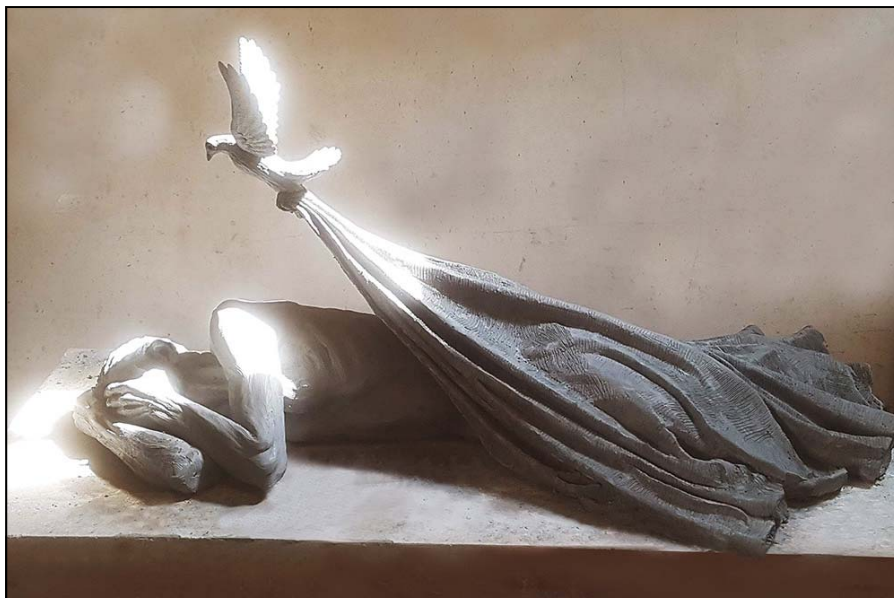

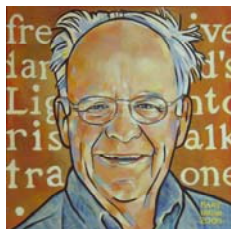
