2024 Annual Meeting Minutes

November 17, 2024 | Saint Andrew's Parish Hall

At 12:23 p.m., the meeting was called to order by Father Gary Eichelberger, who then led an opening prayer. Ethan Cashwell moved that John Rhodes be appointed clerk for the annual meeting. Kacey Eichelberger seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

The minutes for the November 19, 2023, Annual Parish Meeting were reviewed. Riley Owens moved that the minutes be adopted as read. Allison Giambrone-Wilson seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

The report of the Nominating Committee was reviewed and validated by the Nominating Committee. Leigh Randall moved that nominations be closed and the slate be elected by acclamation. Special thanks was given to a number of parishioners, including our Senior Warden (Riley Owens), Junior Warden (Allison Giambrone-Wilson), and our church staff.

Following the Rector's report, we had a discussion about new limitations on our access to the parking lot beside Saint Andrew's (owned by West End Baptist Church) and discussed how Saint Andrew's could adjust accordingly.

There being no further business to claim the meeting's attention, the meeting was adjourned after a sung doxology lead by Choirmaster John Gilbert and closing prayer at 1:07 pm.

Rusty Infinger | Vestry Nominee



Our Children's Ministry continues to thrive through the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program, creating a sacred and meaningful space for our youngest members to experience God's love. We were also blessed this spring to have Sophia, an intern from Furman University, assist with both children and youth ministries—her energy and presence were a gift to our community.

Our Youth Ministry has also continued to grow, offering monthly gatherings for fellowship and faith formation, service opportunities, and a joyful celebration of our high school graduates. It's been inspiring to watch our youth build lasting relationships and a strong sense of belonging.

This year also marks a milestone—St. Andrew's 125th Anniversary. Throughout the year we've celebrated with special events, including guest preachers who have helped us reflect on our past and imagine our future. These moments have reminded us of how deeply rooted we are in gratitude and hope.

Another bright spot has been the recent return of our monthly Supper Club, offering a simple but meaningful way to share food, conversation, and community.

We are truly fortunate to have Fr. Gary as our priest. He leads with compassion, warmth, and a genuine spirit of welcome that reflects the heart of our Episcopal tradition. Together with his family, who are active participants in our parish life and a bright light in our lives, he models a faith grounded in hospitality, gratitude, and care for others.

Treasurer's Report

Giving in 2024 was in line with the budget and the church finished with a \$23,000 surplus due to spending being under budget. The Vestry recognized our continued growth trend and raised the budget from \$366,000 to \$387,000 for 2025. Through the third quarter giving has again exceeded projections to run slightly ahead year to date. McKinley Cooper performed a professional audit and again no significant findings or exceptions were noted. Chazin & Company continue to provide quarterly reconciliations and other administrative help.

The Parish made a transition to Miranda Mason for office bookkeeping and management this summer with minimal disruption. Payments and reporting continued and remain timely.

The Parish has not taken its full budgeted distributions from our Investment Fund through the third quarter. Spending has been below budget as new personnel hirings have yet to be executed. Markets have hit all time highs after a rocky 2nd quarter. The Investment Fund is accounted for separately from restricted accounts. As of this writing on October 28th the Investment Fund balance was \$678,199, an increase of \$45,000 over last year's annual report.

The church's finances are quite strong due to the continued stewardship and dedication of its members.

Seminarian Update

This fall, my fiancé, Brett, and I have begun a new chapter of life across the Atlantic as I start my doctoral studies (DPhil) in Systematic Theology at Oxford. I am deeply grateful to St. Andrew's for sponsoring me in the ordination process and for holding me in prayer as I take up this next stage of formation.

We've found housing at St. Stephen's House, Oxford's Anglo-Catholic seminary. The buildings once belonged to the Society of St. John the Evangelist—the Cowley Fathers—so it is a sweet providence to live in the place where modern Anglican religious life first took root. Our arrival was not without drama: when we came back from the airport with Momma, we discovered a pipe had burst and water had been running for half a day, flooding the kitchen and living room. The repairs are still being sorted out, so we'll see if we'll have to find something else.

Momma's visit was a gift. I loved showing her around Oxford, helping me try on my new academic robes, and taking her to London and Paris. Paris especially stole her heart—she delighted in what she called her “Princess Di pilgrimage.” We dropped her off for her return flight (her first international trip on her own—they grow up so fast!), and Brett and I have since settled into the rhythm of English church life, brimming with Masses and Evensongs.

One highlight was introducing both Momma and Brett to my supervisor, the Rev'd Dr. Andrew Davison, after hearing him preach at Christ Church Cathedral. Under his master guidance, I'll be researching how Anglicans have received the ancient Christian hope for the apokatastasis—Greek for the “restoration of all things” (Acts 3:21)—and what that means for our theology today, especially with regard to other religions. If God “wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth” (1 Tim 2:4), won't God get what God wants?

The term has not yet begun, so things remain fairly quiet until October, but on October 5th I will participate in the formal matriculation ceremony, full of Latin and bowing.

I'm thrilled for what God has in store here in the coming years and profoundly thankful to St. Andrew's for your support, prayers, and encouragement as I pursue both study and ordination. Please continue to keep Brett and me in your prayers as we settle into this new season.

Repairing the last of the damage from Helene took place earlier this year when several of the damaged roof tiles were replaced as well as repairing the copper flashing on the roof of our church. A small AC unit was added to the church office window. Several pew kneelers needed to be reattached to the floor as well as a few repairs to toilet seats. The kitchen refrigerator had cooling issues several months ago and was repaired. Locks were put on the outside power boxes.

We are looking into the addition of lock boxes on the outdoor faucets, repairing the drain at the bottom of the steps to the basement of the parish house and are hoping to add directional signs to the outside of the church. The loose handrailing going up the front ramp of the church will be repaired as soon as your Junior Warden figures out how to stabilize it.

I have been honored to serve as Junior Warden this year and will continue to do anything I can for St. Andrew's.

Music Director's Report

As I write this report (my sixteenth), the calendar year 2025, draws to a close, and the music ministry of our small but active parish remains intact. Our choir numbers remain small and consist mostly of lower voice parts, but I am grateful for those who are present each Sunday morning to sing God's praise and lead in the Liturgy. Dallin Singer and Tim Cardillo have joined us regularly this year as choir members, and this past spring we procured the services of Joanne Hill as a treble/alto singer. I am grateful for the greater musical flexibility her participation affords us.

New or former choir members are always welcome, so please consider joining us. If you have questions about the choir, call me at (864) 233-3705 or e-mail at gilbert_john@bellsouth.net. Our rehearsals are Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. prior to the sung Mass at 10:30 a.m. in the Parish Hall.

Since the beginning of the liturgical year in Advent 2024, I have played 56 total services including 4 funeral masses. During our liturgical round of services we have incorporated 201 different hymns with 16 of those hymns sung twice and only 1 more than twice. Our repertoire of hymns grows year by year, and our Hymnal 1982 continues to yield inspiring music for congregation and choir.

I am so grateful for the occasional organ substitution by Lee Gray which allows me time away or time to recuperate from any health issues I may encounter having just this year observed my 80th (!) birthday. It is a blessing to be able to continue my music ministry (how long, O Lord?) on a regular basis at this time in my life.

I continue to be grateful for the pastoral partnership I am blessed to share with Father Gary Eichelberger. His creativity, innovation, support and striving for excellence in our worship is a blessing to us all. Thanks be to God!

Communications Director's Report




1. **Facebook** – We got the Facebook page back up and running and have been posting on social media more regularly.

2025 was a year of growth for St. Andrew's Book Club in terms of new membership and diverse reading. Monthly participation, including expressed interest, stands at roughly 13 - 14 persons with each contributing new ideas for reading pleasure. Meetings are held on the first Sunday of each month, after coffee hour, in the parish hall. Notice of upcoming meetings are published in St. Andrew's weekly online newsletter, *The Call*, and in Sunday bulletins.

With that in mind, we hope to continue to grow participation in order to bring fresh ideas for reading material and to continue lively discussion at meetings. Hospitality & Pastoral Care Report

Pastoral Care includes coordination of Hospitality Activities, Bereavement assistance, and Eucharistic Visitors schedule and activities. Committee assists in planning, set-up, food preparation, service and clean-up for events, social receptions and post-Requiem Mass receptions at St. Andrew's and providing meals to parishioners who are ill, in need, or the birth of a baby, etc.

Bereavement committee was merged with Hospitality in 2014 and has the same duties and responsibilities for receptions after requiem masses at St. Andrew's. Training of additional Eucharistic Visitors (7) in 2025 enabled the committee to bring Eucharist to more parishioners on a more timely basis. Eucharistic Visitors are now dispatched twice a month and are also attempting to make social visits in addition to Eucharistic visits. Pastoral Care additional responsibilities include regular exchange of information with the Rector relating to parishioners' status, needs, issues, etc.

Liturgical Ministers Report

The Liturgical Lay Ministry at St. Andrews supports worship services by providing trained acolytes, including vergers, servers, thurifers, torchbearers, lectors, and intercessors. Currently, we have **35 active lay ministers**, including **three youth servers**.

This year, the ministry served in **162 services**, including **four requiem masses**. To strengthen participation and ensure quality, we developed educational materials and conducted a training session for all lay ministers.

We are excited to revitalize the Order of St. Vincent this year by hosting quarterly meetings. The OSV welcomes all ministers—from the altar guild to the choir—and offers a meaningful, structured way of life dedicated to serving the Lord. Mission & Outreach Report

The Mission and Outreach Committee has had a robust year in intentionally providing financial and other support to various organizations in the Greenville area and the national Episcopal Church's mission endeavors. Our efforts are focused on partnering with organizations to help in their work by direct assistance and highlighting St. Andrew's commitment and reputation as a church with a heart for serving our communities for those in need. By thoughtful discussions and prayerful reflection, our committee identified community concerns. With the budgeted allocations we were provided, we addressed and supported these issues:

1. Hunger and Food Scarcity. We partnered with **Project Host** by sponsoring their fundraising luncheon and participated in their barbecue event. We donated funds to **United Ministries** for their food pantry and assisted in sponsoring their fundraising luncheon.
2. Employment and Workforce Development. We supported **Soteria** as a sponsor of their fundraising event as they empower and assist previously incarcerated individuals by providing financial planning, job training, and affordable rentals.
3. Homeless and Housing Instability. **Greenville Together**, a part of the United Way of Greenville County, aims to help 80 households secure permanent housing in 2025 and we supported their efforts to address ending homelessness.
4. Housing and Neighborhood Development. Through our partnership with **Rebuild Upstate**, we provided financial support and we provided volunteers for a project day in the Spring for necessary home repairs assisting with home preservation and tackling affordable housing by building ramps for neighbors who cannot afford those repairs.

5. Health and Wellbeing. Our support of **Canterbury Counseling Center** helps provide scholarships for counseling services for our neighbors who need but cannot afford mental health treatment. By supporting **The Queer Wellness Center** we help the Center provide LGBTQ+ clients obtain medical and mental health care and provide access to a resource closet for basic needs.
6. Missionary Service Worldwide. We helped our brothers and sisters outside of the US with our financial support for the mission work of **SAMS**, **Cange Refugee Fund**, and **Education Equals Hope in Ecuador**.
7. Supporting Women and Families We sponsored a table at **Safe Harbor**'s fundraising luncheon to support their mission of helping survivors of domestic violence by providing an emergency shelter, counseling for adults and children, transitional housing, abuse education, and legal assistance. We provided funds to support the efforts of **Greenville's Gift**, who provides newborn essentials for babies of moms in financial need. Additionally, we provided funding to the **Magdelene Clinic** where pregnant women with a substance abuse disorder can obtain prenatal care, mental health counseling, and peer support at any stage of their disease process. Our support of **Camp Gravatt**, named after Bishop John Gravatt, provides summer camping opportunities for children who otherwise would not be able to afford this Christian centered camp.
8. Education and Literacy. We donated to the **Absolom Jones Fund**, named after the first African American to be named as an ordained Episcopal priest, which supports educational opportunities at two HBU's including Vorhees College in South Carolina. We provided a scholarship for a participant to be enrolled in the **Carolina Literacy Society**, whose mission is to help immigrant and refugee children in SC increase their English literacy and diminish the learning loss during summer vacation.
9. Critical Community Problems. We support the **Greenville Hispanic Alliance** in their efforts to be a bridge of communication and understanding between Hispanics and the broader community offering services in education, financial stability, health, and legal matters. We are a member of **GOAL Justice**, an interfaith coalition of congregations working to solve problems such as evictions, transportation, and affordable housing through grassroot direct action seeking commitment and support from local officials. Our financial support of **Mill Village Ministries** helps their mission of addressing local systemic injustice through education, access, and resources including the free bike repair and bike earning opportunities at Village Wrench, healthy produce with food assistance through Mill Village Farm, Village Engage bringing social justice issues to the faith community, and Village Launch equipping underestimated entrepreneurs with training, mentorship and access to resources.

The Mission & Outreach Committee is thankful for the honor bestowed upon us by this parish to identify community problems and concerns and then work and collaborate with our partner organizations to seek strategies for resolutions. In the coming church year, we are committed to continue this work by maintaining our relationships with the organizations that are changing the lives of our neighbors both here and globally.

The areas that are identified above will continue to be our areas of focus. However, our work is fluid and we are always seeking opportunities to help when an issue or need arises. In the coming year we intend to be engaged in the following:

1. Research the ongoing societal problems that need support.
2. Maintain strong relationships with our legacy partners.
3. Research and identify new organizations that are providing essential services to our communities and find ways to support those organizations.
4. Work with our communications director to increase our visibility in the community to highlight our work to strengthen our Church's mission of service
5. Engage more of our parishioners to be personally involved in participating in our service projects and sponsorship opportunities.

GOAL Justice Report

Rebuild Upstate Report

Through our partnership with Rebuild Upstate, we provided financial support and 9 volunteers for necessary home repairs for a Greenville neighbor on March 29. After demolishing an old and unstable side porch, we rebuilt a wheelchair accessible deck, allowing the homeowner to safely spend time outdoors and enjoy her back yard. A second project day in the fall was anticipated, but due to budget constraints, the organization is currently requiring that participants fully fund their project at \$2500.

Since St. Andrew's M&O was prepared to contribute only \$1000 as we had toward previous builds, we decided to forgo a second Rebuild project in 2025, and plan to increase our yearly giving in 2026 to \$2500 to fund and participate in another build project. Natalie Buck, our contact at Rebuild Upstate, has left to pursue ordination in the United Methodist Church. Our new contact is Brooke Farmer.

Rector's Report

*"Glory to God whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine."
– Ephesians 3:20*

Over the course of this year, we have been celebrating **125 years** of ongoing witness to the power of the Resurrection as lived out in the community of the faithful that we know as Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church. From studying that history to welcoming monthly guest preachers (many of whom were former Saint Andrew's seminarians and rectors) to seeing our historic church building placed on the National Register of Historic Places, it has been a very rewarding year to participate the life of Saint Andrew's – as we continue to be a place that shows God's love to the world in surprising ways!

I recently entered my tenth year as Rector of Saint Andrew's (and look forward to celebrating the tenth anniversary of my time here next October!), and I continue to have my appreciation deepened for the lives and witnesses of those who worship faithfully at Saint Andrew's – some for over four decades – others who have just joined us – and all of those who occupy a space in between. Each of you has a place in making us who we are. And I have no doubt that, over the course of the coming years, God can and will continue to "do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine" working in and through us.

Over the past year, in addition to all of the special events relating to our 125th Anniversary, we have celebrated a number of other milestones in our common life – from the priestly ordination of our former seminarian, Tommy Watson; to the sending forth of our first ever Curate, Fr. Tyler; to giving thanks for the service of our former Parish Administrator, Marie Ridolfo; to expanding our office staff with the hiring of our new Parish Administrator, Miranda Mason, and our new Director of Communications, Frances Twomey. I commend the reports of our Senior Warden, Junior Warden, and various ministry leaders for more details on those and many other accomplishments of the past year.

Looking Ahead

As we look to this next year, I want to use this space to focus our attention on two key developments now ahead of us—and seek your support as we prepare for both of those:

- **Planning for My Sabbatical (mid-May to mid-September 2026)** – As many of you know, it is the general practice in the Episcopal Church for clergy to take a several month sabbatical every seven years—and I had initially planned to do so in 2024. However, after we received the opportunity to bring on a curate (with my corresponding responsibility for mentoring that individual), I decided to delay my sabbatical until after the curacy (which would also take us through this 125th anniversary year). Thus, I am now planning to take a four-month sabbatical in 2026. I am very excited to be working on my plans for this time of rest and restoration and look forward to sharing more with you about this in the months ahead. Thankfully, our parish has been regularly setting aside funds for this purpose for many years now — so that aspect of it is already taken care of — which brings us to the more exciting development ...

- **Hiring a Full-Time Associate Rector to Start Before My Sabbatical** – Over the course of this past year, I have worked with the Strategic Task Force on Staffing (Phil Buck, Anne Kaiser, Lesley Moore, Dan Randall, and Mtr. Lee Ann Tolzmann) and with the Vestry – as well as my clergy coach, Diana Bender – to discern and envision what it would look for Saint Andrew’s to hire a second full-time priest prior to my sabbatical. Given our continuing growth – both in participation and in financial support – as well as our recent experience of having a curate, I am convinced that Saint Andrew’s is at a point where we would benefit greatly from calling second priest – especially someone with experience in and a passion for cultivating Children & Youth Ministries. Moreover, I am confident that our budget is on a trajectory to handle this expense in the years ahead – as explained in greater detail below. In this regard, I want to share with you some of the work that is already underway in this regard:
 - **Job Description** – I have been working to finalize a job description – and I hope to be able to share that with the Vestry for approval in the days ahead – and then share it with the parish and the wider world.
 - **Identified Candidate!** – One of the biggest challenges that the Task Force on Staffing contemplated as we considered this plan was whether we could find an experienced Episcopal priest who fit all of the key criteria, including a passion for children and youth ministry, a love for Anglo-Catholic worship, and a desire to be in Greenville – and for all of this to materialize in one person before my sabbatical! I am excited to share that, through a series of what I can only describe as grace-filled developments, we have found that individual – and, in addition to being in ongoing conversation with that individual, I have been able to share with the Strategic Task Force, several members of the Vestry, and the Bishop about this particular individual’s interest in coming to serve at Saint Andrew’s – all of whom have shared in my excitement about the prospect. In the weeks ahead, I look forward to introducing her to the entire Vestry – in hopes that, before the end of this year, we can formally extend a call (with a start date in March 2026).
 - **Budget Impact** – As we analyzed the ability of our parish budget to handle the budgetary impact of this hire, we were encouraged by several factors: (1) our ability to handle the cost of a curate for the past two years (in partnership with the Diocese); (2) the budget allowance that was previously made to hire a lay Children, Youth, & Family Minister, which could be incorporated into the Associate Rector salary starting in 2026; (3) the funds that have been set aside over the past decade to plan for the cost of a sabbatical (a substantial portion of which can be incorporated into the Associate Rector’s salary in 2026); (4) the continuing upward pattern of growth in our budget year-after-year; and (5) the expected growth that will flow from the Associate Rector’s ministry among us.

- **Targeted Fundraising** - We also recently decided to start a new designated fund that will give us greater confidence that we can meet our commitment to this position — with the **goal of raising \$125,000 in additional pledged dollars** (beyond our regular Annual Pledge Campaign) to be received over the next two years. I am delighted to share that, as word has quietly spread about this effort, I have already heard from a number of individuals who are committed to making this happen — such that **we are already over half-way to that goal!** I look forward to us reaching that goal in the weeks ahead — and invite all parishioners to consider whether they have the ability to support this effort. It is an exciting time to be doing ministry at Saint Andrew's!

And, one other thing to put on your 2026 calendar ... I recently learned that **Bishop Richards will be coming to Saint Andrew's to preside at Confirmations (and Baptisms) on All Saints Sunday 2026 (November 1, 2026)** — so, next Fall, I look forward to returning from my sabbatical in time to co-lead (with our Associate Rector) Confirmation Classes for all adults and youth who would like to be confirmed or received at the Bishop's Visit on All Saints Sunday!

Thank You to Our Lay Leadership, our Staff, and to Each of You

Before I conclude, I want to offer some specific words of thanks. There are numerous parishioners who have played critical roles in the work of Saint Andrew's over this past year, in particular our vestry leadership — our clerk, **Phil Buck**; our junior warden, **Lee Gray**; and our senior warden, **Leigh Randall**. I am also very grateful for the continued service of our Treasurer, **Jamie Hinds**. Beyond that, I am very appreciative for the commitment of all of the members of the vestry as well as the numerous volunteers who help run the many ministries of this church — many of whom have offered reports in this document.

I am also continually thankful for the leadership and assistance of our other staff members — **John Gilbert**, our Organist-Chairmaster; **Miranda Mason**, our Parish Administrator; **Frances Twomey**, our Director of Communications, and **Jane Babb**, our Nursery Coordinator. We are grateful for the many ways that each one of them shares their extraordinary gifts and faithful labors with all of us at Saint Andrew's. Each one of them — along with each of you — plays an integral and unique role in supporting and furthering the ministry of Saint Andrew's.

Conclusion

In conclusion, I hope that you will join me in the exciting and hopeful work of continuing to discern how God is calling us to ministry together here at Saint Andrew's — as we faithfully come before God's presence with thanksgiving in the year ahead. I welcome and look forward to hearing your feedback. And, whatever God has in store for Saint Andrew's in the next 125 years, I am ever grateful for the love, the prayers, the encouragement, and the inspiration that the members of the parish faithfully offer in this place in this day.

Thank you for the great gift of being able to serve here with you at Saint Andrew's.

- ✖ **EMBODIED:** We worship a God who sanctified the human body through the incarnation of Jesus Christ – and so our worship fully engages the human body – all of the bodily senses – touch, sight, hearing, smell, and taste. We sit, we stand, we kneel. We see the beauty of God's creation reflected in each other and all that surrounds us in worship. We sing, we say, we experience silence. We smell the fragrant offering of incense. We taste the Body and Blood of Christ.
- ✖ **TRADITIONAL:** We recognize that there are many ways to worship God faithfully. At the same time, we also recognize that our particular calling is to offer our prayers and praise to God in the distinctive splendor of the Anglo-Catholic tradition, through which we exalt and elevate the rich, ancient liturgies and practices that have sustained our Christian brothers and sisters throughout the centuries.

Sent to Witness.


We witness to the life changing implications of Jesus Christ's reconciling love through our faithful **service** to the "least of these" in our midst, our commitment to practices of lifelong **discipleship**, and our ongoing **care** for one another as we face the challenges of life together.

- ✖ **SERVICE:** Through our ongoing commitment to a variety of ministries at Saint Andrew's, we seek to help feed, clothe, and house our neighbors in need. We do this in recognition that, as a parish in the Anglo-Catholic tradition, our commitment to social justice should be as central to our identity as our commitment to ancient practices of worship.
- ✖ **DISCIPLESHIP:** Just as the first Christian disciples "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers," (Acts 2:42) we are committed to the ongoing work of formation through the practices of study, fellowship, worship and prayer, such that we can continue to grow, as individuals and as a community, in the knowledge and love of God.
- ✖ **CARE:** In the midst of the Last Supper, Jesus gave his disciples a "new commandment" that they were to love one another – for "by this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34-35). And so we are committed to loving one another through concrete acts of care, and we promise that, if you spend any time in our midst, you will know that love.

Led to Welcome.

We welcome unreservedly all God's children into Christ's Body, the Church – as we strive for a **diversity** that reflects the unfolding reality of God's kingdom, display the blessings of being an **affirming** parish, and continue to seek ways to broaden that welcome in our particular **community**, through our support of local manifestations of art, music, and culture.

- ✖ **DIVERSITY:** Through our belief in the extraordinary and unfolding reality of the communion of the saints in God's kingdom, we see holiness being revealed through the rich diversity of faithful lives of holy women and men throughout the history of the church – people of all races, colors, nationalities, genders, ages, and sexual orientation. Though we recognize that we are not there yet, we strive to have our parish embody that diversity.
- ✖ **AFFIRMING:** Being an affirming church is not new to us. In fact, over the past three decades at Saint Andrew's, we have offered a bountiful witness to the ways in which Christ's love is revealed through a variety of faithful, committed relationships, including same-sex relationships. We welcome you to come and see the vibrant life of a faithful community in which those blessings have been made known – and join us as we continue to offer our lives and our love as a witness to the wider world.
- ✖ **COMMUNITY:** Beyond worship, we experience the incarnate beauty of God's creation and God's creative spirit through our participation in and support of local expressions of art, music, and culture, as we continuously seek new ways to broaden our celebration of God's truth and love.
