

Overview

In 1492, the Alhambra Decree forced Spain's Jewish citizens to make an unthinkable decision: convert to Christianity or leave the country. Over the next 500 years, the saga of the conversos and Crypto-Jews — who practiced their faith in secrecy — brought them to the New World and finally to New Mexico, where their traditions melded with those of the peoples of the Southwest. In this land of canyons and desert, trace the struggle of New Mexico's conversos and Crypto-Jews, and consider how their traditions have managed to survive against the odds.

Acoma Pueblo, Meet a Converso

After breakfast, depart for Acoma Pueblo. Acoma's ties to Jewish history in New Mexico lie in the Pueblo's relationship to Jewish trader Solomon Bibo, the only non-Indian to become governor of a Native American Pueblo. Built on top of a 367-foot-high mesa to protect it from attack, the old pueblo has no electricity and no running water, but its residents vie for chances to live there for a year at a time.

There are other pueblo villages at the base of the mesa, where most of the Acoma Indians dwell. Go to the top of the mesa to explore the old village; visit the old Spanish church and meet some of the inhabitants of this remarkable historic place. Following lunch at the Pueblo, return to the hotel and meet a Converso who will discuss the Converso Crypto-Jewish heritage of people in the area.
