The monetary award from the Myrtice H. Price award comes from the \$10,000 endowment within District Three. The interest is calculated as of January 31st of each year.

First, Secord, and Third place winners will receive checks for 50%, 30%, and 20%, respectively, of the interest earned annually from the Myrtice H. Price Investment Fund.

In the event of a two-way tie for First Place, the First And Second place awards will be combined and split evenly amongst the winners. If there is a tie for Second place, the Second and Third place awards are combined and split evenly amongst the winners. If there is a tie for Third place, the Third place award will be split evenly amongst the winners.





Fortunately for me, the Altrusa Orlando-Winter Park Club had five members attending, so we were able to cover each session's workshops. One of the sessions I picked was "Be part of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDG): How YOUR Altrusa Club can spread LOVE and LITERACY and be part of a worldwide LEGACY!". The presenter was Kathy Schrein, who serves as the Altrusa International Representative to the United Nations and is a member of the Altrusa Dayton, OH Club. I went to college at the University of Dayton in Ohio and have a keen interest in the history that Altrusa has with the United Nations. So, this was great pleasure!



Ms. Schrein presented and outlined the <u>2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development effort</u>, adopted by all United Nations Member States in 2015. It provides a shared blueprint for peace and prosperity for people and the planet, now and in the future. At its heart are the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which represent an urgent call for action by all countries (developed and developing) in a global partnership. The UN recognizes that ending poverty and other deprivations must go hand in hand with strategies that improve health and education, reduce inequality, and spur economic growth all while tackling climate change and working to preserve the oceans and forests.



While examining each of the 17 SDGs, panel members provided examples of various Altrusa Clubs' projects that aligned with one or more of the 17 SDGs. It is highlighted that plans are being considered to integrate the 17 SDGs into the International Service Awards.


I hope everyone has had a good summer and is doing well.



We also worked with the school system's Early Learning Service Department and provided books for children participating in the PreK Read with Me Weekend program which encourages the children to share their books with their families.





Altrusa of Statesboro Promotes Summer Service Opportunities

The Ruth MacKinnon Literacy Project has made significant strides this summer by straightening, cleaning, organizing, and labeling books in our dedicated book room. Throughout the 2024–2025 school year, our club proudly distributed an impressive total of 13,153 books to children in Bulloch County. This includes 3,780 books provided to Pre-K students across 20 public school Pre-K classes and 5,110 books delivered to 29 kindergarten classrooms, ensuring that every student received a book. Furthermore, students who received food backpacks were gifted a book each month, accumulating to 3,248 books aimed at fostering the development of home libraries. Our outreach extended to local daycares, the Hearts and Hands Clinic, and the Outreach Center, where we provided 540, 225, and 250 books respectively. Since the inception of the Altrusa Club of Statesboro's literacy project in 2010, we have donated an astounding total of 124,581 books to children. We extend our heartfelt thanks to all club members whose hard work in labeling, packing, and delivering has helped put books into the hands of children.

Continuing summer hands-on service, members of Statesboro Altrusa came together to make a difference in the community by volunteering at the Soup Kitchen organized by Statesboro United Methodist Church. The team, which included Carrie Binns, her friend Jenni Kight, Carol Ruffo, Debbie Vives, Ann Healy, Sandy Smith, Pam Lavender, and Karen Lavender, worked tirelessly to prepare over 200 sandwiches for bag lunches. They also served a delicious hot meal that included shrimp, cheese grits, mixed vegetables, and cookies, ensuring that those in need received not only nourishment but also a sense of care and support from their community.













Days for Girls in North Georgia

Operation Home Front: Back-To-School-Brigade

The signaling of the end of summer! The Club has started the tasks for the annual Back-To-School Brigade program, coordinated by Operation Homefront. Operation Homefront is a national nonprofit organization that promotes strong, stable, and secure military families through a mix of programs.

This year's Back-To-School Brigade started as usual with an email notice from Operation Homefront, asking if the Club wanted to continue collecting from their assigned Dollar Tree stores, which Roberta Klusmeier, Dawn Jones, Cheryl Malloy, and Traci Jones graciously agreed to. They picked up from assigned local Dollar Tree stores each week during the campaign. School supplies are donated by customers at checkout through \$1.00 donations. Our collective efforts netted us over 3,000 items. The Club sorted items collected from their stores and boxed them for transportto a central location where school backpacks were assembled.

On August 7th, several Club members: Sharon Blake, Trina Cothrin, Amy Freeman, Alison Hale, Sue Stead, Traci Jones, Tami Lingelbach, Mundea Klaus, Roberta Klusmeier, Charlotte Simpson, Carol Thomas, and Cheryl Malloy sorted items and assembled 120 backpacks for Operation Homefront.

In addition, the Club divided up the remainder of the school supplies among the various charities and organizations we support. This included:

- 1000 Seminole County Tools-4- Schools Program
- 600 Volusia County Public Schools
- 300 Polk County
- 325 Fundamentals for Kids
