

It is truly the season of holidays as we quickly transition from one holiday to another. Shops and stores sell Christmas decorations immediately after Halloween because they know that there are people who will want to decorate for Christmas as soon as November begins (a thought I do not understand, but to each their own).

Of course, these are not the only holidays celebrated in this span of the year. Many religious and culture holidays are celebrated within close proximity of Christmas. It's why in the public and professional sectors people will say "Happy Holidays!" or "Seasons Greetings!" Many of us will

recognize that this is not designed as a slight against one holiday or another, but for non-religious entities, or rather, multi-religious entities, it is a way to include many traditions and customs around this festive time of year. Christmas has even evolved into a rather distinct holiday that non-Christians celebrate as well. It's morphed into a holiday of Santa Claus, Hallmark movies, and commercials about gifting your spouse a brand new car with a giant red bow, a purchase that was felt to be not necessary to discuss and easy to do on a whim with no impact to your finances. Not that any of those things are bad, except maybe the car thing, but Christmas has become so prevalent that those outside the Christian tradition have adopted their own meaning onto it.

Which leads us into a theological predicament. One that I've received a few questions on in the past few weeks. We constantly profess Jesus as Lord and there only being one true God. In such a multi-religious society, what does that mean for us and for others? With such a focus on Christmas, we are also reminded that we are not the only faith in the world, or even in the local community. Are people of no faith or other faiths destined for suffering?

The short answer is: no. For starters, I believe that Hell is a philosophical concept and not a physical location. Hell is the absence of God. And if we believe in an omni and ever present God, then there cannot exist a time or space without God, thus Hell is a concept and not a place. Thus,

in my own understanding and I am not saying this has to be true for everyone, if I believe in a universal and omnipresent God, I have a hard time believing in a Hell, a place that is without God.

Now does that mean there is no atonement or reconciliation for those that we universally consider to be “bad people”? That’s a different question entirely and one not so easily attested to. It’s difficult for our mortal and earthly concept to envision reconciliation without atonement and repentance, especially for the most grievous sins. However, do I believe that believers of other faiths or no faith are also lumped into this category? Certainly not. Perhaps this is my human understanding or human desire, but I would hope a

self-professed Christian who murdered people would have some form of atonement to go through more so than a non-believer who never murdered. Perhaps this is wishful thinking, but even Jesus seeks to break down the barriers between cultural norms.

A common New Testament thread is trying to answer the question: “What is the correct way to worship and honor God?” Jesus is not here to abolish customs that his Jewish followers were used to, nor remove traditions from his Gentile followers. Rather, trying to unite them under the common goal of helping and loving those on the margins and seeking a more equitable and affirming future. “Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.” (Matthew 25:45)

The way to honor Christ is to honor the folks who have been relegated to “the least”.

So if we don’t believe everyone else is condemned, do we change the language of “One God in Three Persons” or “I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life” and other phrases that seem to say our faith is the only one and true faith? No. Dr. Kirstin Johnston Largen writes in *Finding God Among Our Neighbors*, “is to reinterpret the uniqueness of the incarnation by seeing the “one and only” language of the New Testament as “love language,” testifying to the special nature of the disciples’ relationship with Christ, rather than making an exclusive ontological claim about his person. Knitter describes the shift in this way: "If Christians could reclarify and repossess the original and enduring intent of christological language – that is, if 'one and only' could mean 'I'm fully committed to you' rather than 'no one else is worthy of commitment' – then many Christians would feel more honest about their faith and doors would be opened more widely to dialogue with other believers equally committed to their saviors." (151-152)

Another way to attribute or rethink about 'one-and-only' language is to consider the love of a spouse or partner. I think many of us recognize that play a huge role in potential relationships and the idea of soulmates, the idea that there is only a singular person built exactly to be compatible to one other person, is

not accurate or true. However, this does not undermine the intense love and deep commitment one can have for a spouse or partner. Ask anyone who loved a spouse who died and then happily remarried. It is indeed possible to feel that deep commitment to multiple people.

When we use the 'one-and-only' language as Christians, we are referring to our deep commitment to the Triune God. It means we are invested in deepening our relationship with our faith and the people of our faith. Just because a couple thinks they have a wonderful and loving marriage does not invalidate other couples who feel the same. I find myself in agreement with Knitter and Largen on this point, if we can think of our relationship with God in this way, we can open our hearts and minds to being in faithful dialogue with others

outside our tradition. A dialogue and relationship that comes with the removal of judgement and condemnation.

We prepare in Advent for the return of Christ, a promised kingdom (or kin-dom) where suffering is no more and it is more wonderful than we can imagine. If we truly believe in that promise and a loving ever-present God, perhaps we can boldly say Happy Holidays in the public sphere just as boldly as we declare Merry Christmas in our homes, churches, and Christian communities.

## ***Reconciling in Christ (RIC)***

### **RIC Update**

Thank you to all who attended our Coffee Hour/Discussion on **November 13th**. We had a wonderful discussion and we plan to have more coffee hours to talk openly about the RIC process.

On **December 4th** we had our third RIC congregational meeting. We discussed: What is the difference between tolerating people of different gender identities and sexual orientations vs. affirming and welcoming those among us who are in the Rainbow Community? What would it look like for Mount Hope to be an RIC congregation?

Please keep expressing your thoughts, concerns, questions, etc. The box in the Fireside Room can be used to write comments anonymously (notecards are provided).

### **Why Do We Need a Welcoming Statement?**

On **Sunday, January 8th**, following the worship service, the RIC Committee will present a

draft of our welcoming statement, to be used if we become a Reconciling in Christ congregation. A common question is: Why do we need this? Aren't we already welcoming? Yes. In fact visitors often comment on the friendly atmosphere at Mount Hope. However, this statement goes beyond just being a friendly congregation. Its purpose is to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. It is one way to extend specific invitations to people in our community through a public welcome statement. All RIC congregations are listed on the RIC website on a searchable national map so that LGBTQIA+ people and their advocates can search for a faith community in their neighborhood that is safe and affirming. Sadly, our LGBTQIA+ community continues to experience exclusion and harm from

churches acting in the name of Christianity, even those who declare, "All are welcome."

This process is a journey. The committee will seek feedback from congregation members after presenting its Welcoming Statement draft. The Welcoming Statement will then be voted on by the congregation at this year's Annual Meeting. If it is approved, this is just the beginning. The committee will remain intact. Opportunities for continued study of LGBTQIA+ issues will be offered. We will begin to explore what being an RIC church means specifically for Mount Hope.

Please participate in this process as much as you can. The committee members welcome questions, comments, concerns, and feedback.

## Parish Nurse Notes

**Keep your brain young!**  
 You've heard of cross-training for physical fitness; working different muscles on different days. But you can't *only* exercise one or two muscles. You have to balance developing muscle strength and endurance, flexibility and cardiovascular endurance. Do the same for your brain: challenge yourself to mix mental and physical learning activities. Sound strange? Some examples: learning a new language works out different parts of the brain than learning a new sport or instrument.

Engage in something mentally stimulating like a podcast or an online course. Sharpen your focus by taking short, frequent movement breaks to boost your creativity. And strangely, moving your body more creatively can train your mind to think more creatively. Besides mental stimulation and physical stimulation don't forget to be social! Visit a friend, go out for dinner, read to children. With Christmas approaching we may have lots of opportunities to

socialize. With the New Year coming, think about being intentional about your brain health and your physical health by literally working different "muscles" every day! It might help to actually put it on your calendar: Day 1: Do something mentally stimulating. Day 2: Learn through movement: eg, a new yoga or tai chi pose, a sport, dance moves. Day 3: Socialize. Throw in at least some physical activity each day. Have fun keeping your brain young!
