If there is no snow, we will meet at the Hell Cat Trail parking lot #4 at the Parker River National Wildlife Refuge on Plum Island, MA at 10:00 a.m. The boardwalk offers many opportunities for bird sightings, and we may also walk the beach. We plan to walk about three miles and then head into Newburyport to share lunch. 



Fresh Reads - Seacoast

January's selection for Fresh Reads is *Vesper Flights* by Helen Macdonald. In it, she brings together a collection of her best-loved essays, along with new pieces on topics ranging from nostalgia for a vanishing countryside to the tribulations of farming ostriches to her own private vespers while trying to fall asleep. Meditating on notions of captivity and freedom, immigration and flight, Macdonald invites us into her most intimate experiences: observing the massive migration of songbirds from the top of the Empire State Building, watching tens of thousands of cranes in Hungary, seeking the last golden orioles in Suffolk's poplar forests. She writes with heart-tugging clarity about wild boar, swifts, mushroom hunting, migrations, the strangeness of birds' nests and the unexpected guidance and comfort we find when watching wildlife. *Vesper Flights* is a captivating and foundational book about observation, fascination, time, memory, love and loss and how we make sense of the world around us.


