Wow! What a success for our second annual (603) Challenge as part of the UNH community! A big thank you to our generous donors who supported OLLI during the challenge helping us raise over \$10,000 and unlock the additional \$2,000 bonus donation from the OLLI Leadership Council. As we continue to fully integrate ourselves as a department of the university, things will continue to shift and change. One of our most recent updates includes that our Manchester location will be moving this summer from 1750 Elm Street to the UNH-M Campus at 88 Commercial Street. OLLI will have two available classrooms and two offices for our Administrative Team. At this time, classes will continue to run at our current locations in the Capital Region, Seacoast, and Mt. Washington Valley. Our team is committed to working with the university to provide appropriate classroom space for our program in each of our four learning regions.

I would like to extend my sincerest gratitude to our presenters, CA coordinators, class assistants, Zoom moderators and all those who have been involved in making our semester a success! Across the state this spring, we ran (and continue to run) 164 courses, 348 class sessions, and filled 2502 seats (55% of our seating capacity) so far. And enrollment numbers continue to grow as you may register

for most of the 84 courses remaining in this term right up to the last course in June.

In addition to these courses, each region hosted various activities including lunch & learns, lunch bunch gatherings at some new restaurants, community experiences, and new and continuing SIGs! We are now preparing for our fall 2024 semester with 174 engaging courses that have been recruited, selected and scheduled by our wonderful curriculum committees.

OLLI's biggest outreach effort has always been and continues to be through our members to their families and friends. Word of mouth is the greatest way to share the experience with others by telling them about your involvement in our learning community. 

Did you know that NH food insecurity has increased 40% in just the past 2 years? The common perception is that food insecurity peaked during the pandemic and has since tapered off or at least stayed stable. NOT TRUE! Anne Hayes, Executive Director of [Gather](#), presented the very real, shocking increase in food insecurity in general and what Gather is doing in Seacoast NH and ME to help.

Gather was founded in 1816 by a group of women at Strawberry Banke who wanted to ensure families of fishermen had enough food. It has gone through changes since then and its mission now is "to offer innovative programs that build food security in welcoming and dignified ways." Gather provides nutritious food and prepared meals without charge at its food pantry, its mobile markets and its Meals 4 Kids program. In addition, it operates the Gather Café at Great Bay Community College providing food to those with a student ID at half price (it is estimated that 50% of college students are food insecure).



More OLLI in April



In Manchester, members enjoyed a tour of the Alva de Mars Megan Chapel Art Center on the St. Anselm campus to view "The Intimacy of Seeing: Elsa Voelcker, A Retrospective." Voelcker is a long-time New Hampshire photographer and instructor at Saint Anselm College. This comprehensive yet sensitively curated collection of her work spanned a long career and included a recent series of portraits of individuals with a variety of body modifications/decoration. OLLI was hosted by Fr. Celestine Hetrick, O.S.B, Assistant Curator at the gallery and a monk at Saint Anselm Abbey on the campus. In addition to his thoughtful discussion of Voelcker's work, he provided the history of the overhead murals decorating the gallery's barrel vault (above). Originally the chapel for the college and abbey, these understated yet elegant works were created by Fr. Raphael Pfisterer O.S.B in the early part of the 20th c. and includes images of 'good' versus 'bad' acts- used in part as lessons for students of the college.

Seacoast Mug 'n' Muffin Senior Safety

The Seacoast Region hosted Chief Kevin Walsh of the Rye NH police department for a presentation on safety for seniors. He spoke extensively about the high levels of scam activity in our state.

He focused on the many ways scammers try to get through to us all, with special emphasis on schemes that target people over 60. Interestingly, and sadly, the national news had just featured an older man who shot and killed an innocent Uber driver. The man had been drawn in by a call about a “nephew” who was in trouble and needed money right away. The conversation was convincing enough that he stayed on the line and listened intently. Sadly the Uber driver was also scammed and the older man panicked thinking the driver was involved.

Tragic stories exist about seniors losing thousands of dollars and certainly losing their own sense of confidence in themselves and their own safety. Chief Walsh provided each attendee with a helpful card to keep in the home. He gave permission to provide it to all OLLI members. [Click here to access it.](#)



OLLI in the Capital Region's fledgling Healthy Walking Special Interest Group managed two walks in April and now plans to walk every other week.


The first walk in May is Friday, May 10, at 11:00 a.m. at the Lehtinen Park & Jim Hill River Walk.




Fresh Reads - Seacoast

The May selection for Fresh Reads is *The Civic Bargain: How Democracy Survives* by Brook Manville and Josiah Ober. Is democracy in trouble, perhaps even dying? Pundits say so, and polls show that most Americans believe that their country's system of governance is being "tested" or is "under attack." But is the future of democracy necessarily so dire?

Brook Manville and Josiah Ober push back against the prevailing pessimism about the fate of democracy worldwide. Instead of an epitaph for democracy, they offer a guide for democratic renewal, calling on citizens to recommit to a "civic bargain" with one another to guarantee civic rights of freedom, equality, and dignity. That bargain also requires them to fulfill the duties of democratic citizenship: governing themselves with no "boss" except one another, embracing compromise, treating each other as civic friends and investing in civic education for each rising generation.

Manville and Ober trace the long progression toward self-government through four key moments in democracy's history: Classical Athens, Republican Rome, Great Britain's constitutional monarchy, and America's founding. Comparing what worked and what failed in each case, they draw lessons for how modern democracies can survive and thrive.
