
Zoom Tips and Tools



Do you find it useful to have closed captioning on your TV? Did you know you can have closed captioning on your screen during Zoom meetings and classes?

If you're on a computer, hover your mouse at the bottom of the screen. (On a tablet the icons will be at the top of the screen.) You may see the familiar CC icon – click on it and choose "display captions." If you don't see the CC icon, at the right end of the line of icons you'll see three dots. Click it and select "captions" from the list and select "show captions."

When closed captioning is active you'll see this on your screen:

Technology Tips

Did you know that you don't have to squint at type you find too tiny when you're reading online? There are lots of ways you can enlarge what appears on your screen. Here are just a few and these don't include changing the resolution of your display:

1. If you have a mouse with a roller, it's really easy! Simply hold down the Control key on your PC keyboard (Command on your Mac) and scroll with your roller.
2. Hold down the Control key (Command on Mac) and tap the + key
3. Most browsers have 3 dots at the top right. Click that and choose Zoom. You may select an increased size.
4. On an Android phone, tap the gear icon to open Settings. Choose Display. Tap Display size and use the drag bar to increase the display.
5. When you're in a Zoom meeting or class looking at a presenter's slide that might be too small to read, hover your mouse at the top near the screen share indicator. Click the down arrow and select Zoom; choose the size that will give you a comfortable reading experience. With your mouse you may drag the image back and forth to see all content.
6. If you're working in Word or Excel (or any Microsoft application), the bottom right corner of your screen shows a bar. Drag the handle to the right to enlarge the appearance of the document.


Capital Region Piecemakers Quilting SIG

Fresh Reads - Seacoast

The March Fresh Reads selection is *How to Be an Antiracist* by Ibram X. Kendi. Called “the most courageous book to date on the problem of race in the Western mind” by *The New York Times*, *How to Be an Antiracist* presents a transformative concept that reorients and reenergizes the conversation about racism—and, even more fundamentally, points us toward liberating new ways of thinking about ourselves and each other.

At its core, racism is a powerful system that creates false hierarchies of human value; its warped logic extends beyond race, from the way we regard people of different ethnicities or skin colors to the way we treat people of different sexes, gender identities, and body types. Racism intersects with class, culture and geography and even changes the way we see and value ourselves. In *How to Be an Antiracist*, Kendi takes readers through a widening circle of antiracist ideas—from the most basic concepts to visionary possibilities—that will help readers see all forms of racism clearly, understand their poisonous consequences, and work to oppose them in our systems and in ourselves. Kendi weaves an electrifying combination of ethics, history, law, and science with his personal story of awakening to antiracism. This is an essential work for anyone who wants to go beyond the awareness of racism to the next step, contributing to the formation of a just and equitable society.

As an OLLI member, you are affiliated with a learning region. You are either in the Seacoast, Capital Region, Greater Manchester, or the Mount Washington Valley learning region. What you may not know is that OLLI at UNH encompasses all four of these regions as one statewide group.

Every month volunteer representatives from the four learning regions meet and work on activities to strengthen our program for our members. This group is called the Leadership Council (LC). Several times each year the LC meets in person, versus Zoom, for a full day of work. We recently met in Manchester for an all-day meeting.

Our LC is made up of two representatives from each region and the chair of each statewide committee. Our standing committees include Travel, Membership, Development, Volunteer, Marketing and Curriculum Council. In addition, we have formed task groups to address specific issues; these groups disband when their task is completed.

Here is what we are working on currently:
