Spring Term What You Need to Know

REGISTRATION begins February 5 at 9:00 a.m.

- Your membership must be active in order to sign up for courses. [Renew ahead of time](#).
- Registering online is the fastest way to secure your courses. [Log in to your account here](#).
- If you need help, call the OLLI office at (603) 255-3553, but know that hundreds of calls come in on registration morning. DO leave a voicemail rather than calling repeatedly. Calls will be returned as soon as possible.
- Mailed-in registrations are processed by the same four staff members who are answering phones and troubleshooting problems; processing could be any time during the day on February 5.
- Some courses fill up fast! If a course you want is full, DO put yourself on the waitlist. Our track record for getting waitlisted members into classes is pretty good. But, if we don't know you're interested in a course, we can't take action. You are not obligated to register if/when a space becomes available and there is no charge until you do enroll.
- Sign in to your account between now and registration day to be sure you know your username and password.
- If you log into the registration system before 9:00 a.m., you may have to refresh your browser to activate the "add to cart" option. Simply click the refresh icon. 

Remember, changes to course information will not be found in the print catalog or in the online version of the print catalog (PDF); only the individual online course descriptions are updated with changed dates, times or locations.



Parking Tips – If Your Class is at NHTI (Concord) or Brady-Sullivan (Manchester)

Click [here](#) for a map of the **NHTI** campus. Plan to park in any available parking space in the A, B, or C lots (C is closest to the entrance of Sweeney Hall, marked on the map with a 1).



The entry to Lot C is directly across from a wooden gazebo. If you need handicap parking, continue to the next lot directly in front of Sweeney Hall, unmarked on the map, which is all handicap parking. There are also some handicap spaces in Lot C.



This close-up version of the map focuses on the areas of greatest interest to you.


Sweeney Hall entrance.

Please access the **Brady-Sullivan Tower** building by the rear entrance on West North Street. There is a large parking lot with plenty of visitor and handicap parking available next to the building's entrance. Enter the building through the glass doors, and proceed to Suite 104 on your immediate left.

The two primary classrooms (Rooms 101 and 102) are in Suite 104, located next to each other. The suite door will be open for you.

Fresh Reads - Seacoast

The February Fresh Reads selection is *Under a White Sky: The Nature of the Future* by Elizabeth Kolbert. That man should have dominion “over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth” is a prophecy that has hardened into fact. So pervasive are human impacts on the planet that it’s said we live in a new geological epoch: the Anthropocene.

The question we now face is: can we change nature, this time to save it? Elizabeth Kolbert takes a hard look at the new world we are creating. Along the way, we meet scientists who are trying to preserve the world’s rarest fish, which lives in a single, tiny pool in the middle of the Mojave; engineers who are turning carbon emissions to stone in Iceland; Australian researchers who are trying to develop a “super coral” that can survive on a hotter globe, and physicists who are contemplating shooting tiny diamonds into the stratosphere to cool the earth.

One way to look at human civilization, says Kolbert, is as a 10,000-year exercise in defying nature. In *The Sixth Extinction*, she explored how our capacity for destruction has reshaped the natural world. Now she examines how the very sorts of interventions that have imperiled our planet are increasingly seen as the only hope for its salvation. By turns inspiring, terrifying and darkly comic, *Under a White Sky* is an utterly original examination of the challenges we face.

Chair's Chat

January and July are my favorite OLLI months – that's because they're the months we receive our course catalogs. The course catalog marks the end of one cycle, and the start of another one.

Here's how the system works. OLLI volunteers begin months earlier to seek interesting course topics and talented presenters to share this knowledge. Once we have finished this preliminary scheduling comes next. Where will each Learning Region hold its courses? Will the facilities have open times and rooms? Will the many courses conflict with each other or with regular volunteer meetings? Will the presenters have the flexibility to fit into available times? Are there holidays that should be avoided? These issues are important and it's important to get them right.

Once the local dates, times and locations have been tentatively set, the next step is for Learning Region Curriculum Committee representatives to meet as a group for the selection process to determine the courses you will be offered. The Spring 2024 semester offers 169 courses, spanning a wide range of interests from crafts, history, touring, health, personal fulfillment and many more. Zoom courses are then scheduled by a statewide curriculum group.

Once final selections are completed and all scheduling has been finalized, catalog development gets underway. Crafting the course descriptions, presenter biographies and additional content you find in the catalog as well as solicitation of sponsors and advertising comes next. OLLI staff works with

UNH Marketing on producing the layout, proofreading and ensuring accuracy of details. Publishing, printing, and mailing follow with a target delivery to members' mailboxes the week before Previews.

Once the catalogs are delivered the fun part starts. I don't know what you do when you get your catalog but this is my process:

- Scan the catalog and note how it's set up and anything that jumps out at me.
- Sit with a cup of coffee and read about the offerings and use a pen to mark those courses that are of interest to me. (I marked over 40 courses that were of interest. Good heavens, I can't do that many!)
- Take my long list of courses of interest and go through our family calendar and cross out those courses that don't fit into our schedule (the list is now down to about 12).
- I put the 12 into a spread sheet (boring, right?). Let it sit for a week or so and come back and prioritize the list, starting with "must see." Another day or so goes by. My list is final.
- I ended up with seven courses. This is a reasonable amount for me, based on my other volunteer activities and family commitments.

On February 5 at 9:00 a.m., my wife and I will be at our respective computers, making our final selections. Hopefully, we'll get all the courses we seek. Then, the courses begin. Happiness.

Next step – we begin again. What interesting courses should we offer for the Fall 2024 term? Believe it or not, the process has already kicked off!

Leadership Council meetings are generally held on the Zoom platform on the fourth Monday of the month from 10:00 a.m. to noon, giving members the opportunity to observe our governance structure firsthand.
