What You Need to Know

REGISTRATION begins February 3 at 9:00 a.m.

- Your membership must be active in order to sign up for courses. [Renew ahead of time](#).
- Registering online is the fastest way to secure your courses. [Log in to your account here](#).
- If you need help, call the OLLI office at (603) 255-3553, but know that hundreds of calls come in on registration morning. **DO leave a voicemail rather than calling repeatedly**. Calls will be returned as soon as possible.
- Mailed-in registrations are processed by the same four staff members who are answering phones and troubleshooting problems; processing could be any time during the day on February 3.
- Some courses fill up fast! If a course you want is full, **DO put yourself on the waitlist**. Our track record for getting waitlisted members into classes is pretty good. But, if we don't know you're interested in a course, we can't take action. You are not obligated to register if/when a space becomes available and there is no charge until you do enroll.
- Sign in to your account between now and registration day to be sure you know your username and password.
- If you log into the registration system before 9:00 a.m., you may have to refresh your browser to activate the "add to cart" option. Simply click the refresh icon.

Don't Forget: Registration BEGINS on February 3, but you can register for any course that is not filled up at any time during the term – online up to 7 days before the course start date, after that by calling the OLLI office at (603) 255-3553.

On the Road With OLLI: Experience a Day of Music, Art & Exploration Boston Symphony Open Rehearsal and Mapparium

Thursday, April 3

Bus pick-ups in Concord & Manchester -- \$130 per member (nonmember fee \$150)

BSO Open Rehearsals offer audience members a unique perspective on the creative dynamic between orchestra and conductor. This presentation will feature Dima Slobodeniouk, conductor, and Frank Peter Zimmermann, on the violin, playing Adolphus Hailstork's *Lachrymosa: 1919*, Stravinsky's Symphony in Three Movements and Elgar's Violin Concerto, three works notable for their proximity to wartime.



Following the morning's musical performance, members will pursue lunch on their own, choosing from numerous excellent eateries in the vicinity of Symphony Hall.

After lunch the group comes together again to visit the Mapparium, a three-story-tall [globe](#) made of [stained glass](#) that is viewed from a 30-foot-long bridge through its interior. Notable is that the visitor views the perfectly proportional globe from the inside allowing complete sight of the entire world.



Fresh Reads - Seacoast

February's Fresh Reads selection is *Why We Read* by Shannon Reed, a longtime teacher, lifelong reader and *New Yorker* contributor. We read to escape, to learn, to find love, to feel seen. We read to encounter new worlds, to discover new recipes, to find connections across differences, or simply to pass a rainy afternoon. No matter the reason, books have the power to keep us safe, to challenge us and, perhaps most importantly, to make us more fully human.

Shannon Reed gets it. With one simple goal in mind, she makes the case that we should read for pleasure above all else. In this whip-smart, laugh-out-loud-funny collection, Reed shares surprising stories from her life as a reader and the poignant ways in which books have impacted her students. From the varied novels she cherishes (*Gone Girl*, *Their Eyes Were Watching God*) to the ones she didn't (*Tess of the d'Urbervilles*), Reed takes us on a rollicking tour through the comforting world of literature, celebrating the books we love, the readers who love them and how literature can transform us for the better.


