A Letter from Pastor Jen

Happiest People on Earth

For the eighth consecutive year, the residents of Finland have been named the happiest people in the world. *Onneksi olkoon!*

So what's their secret? (It can't be the weather.)



According to this year's *World Happiness Report*, their joy might have less to do with sunshine and more to do with kindness. The report's theme focused on something that sounds very familiar to people of faith — the power of caring and sharing.

Researchers discovered what Scripture has been teaching all along: when we care for others, we are "twice-blessed." Like mercy in Shakespeare's *Merchant of Venice*, caring "blesses those who give and those who receive."

Each act of care ripples outward-blessing others, and blessing you!

Around the world, people were asked simple questions: In the past month, have you given to charity? Volunteered? Helped a stranger? Would someone return your lost wallet if they found it?

The answers painted a hopeful picture. It turns out people are far more kind than we think. When researchers actually dropped wallets on the street, they were returned much more often than anyone expected. Even during the pandemic, when life was at its hardest, acts of generosity and compassion *increased* — and they've stayed higher ever since.

The report shows that kindness doesn't just help the receiver — it blesses the giver, too. But here's the key: the deepest joy comes not when we help to feel good about ourselves, but when we genuinely want to make a difference.

Other insights from the study remind us of the simple, sacred ways we connect with one another:

- Sharing meals is one of the most universal forms of caring. People who regularly
 eat with others are significantly happier than those who eat alone. Around the
 world, loneliness is rising especially among young adults and yet so is our
 longing to belong.
- Living with and for others matters. In communities with strong family and social bonds, happiness is higher and more evenly shared.
- Serving others through volunteering, giving, or helping strangers even reduces what the report calls "deaths of despair," the tragic losses linked to addiction and hopelessness.

In a world that often feels divided or disconnected, these findings are good news. They affirm what our faith has always known: caring for others isn't just charity — it's the foundation of a joyful life.



As we move into this season of gratitude and giving, there are many small ways to live out that truth:

- Share a meal with us at our potluck *Friendsgiving* on **November 16**, or come for a light supper on **Thursday evenings in Advent December 4**, **11**, **and 18**.
- Help a stranger by serving as a greeter or usher at one of our Christmas services.
- Choose a gift from the **Giving Tree** to brighten the season for a family in need.
- Notice and celebrate the kindness you see in others.

Each act of care ripples outward — blessing others, and blessing you.


Confirmation News

A Letter from Council

Gift from Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Lawrence

This past August, representatives of the former Redeemer Lutheran Church in Lawrence, Ken Caglusio, and Rosemary Moran, presented a check for approximately \$160k to Faith Lutheran. This extraordinary gift is the result of a long process that began with a vote of the Redeemer con-



gregation as part of the Holy Closing of the church. As one of the final acts in their long ministry, Redeemer congregation gave thoughtful and faithful consideration to the distribution of these church assets, and chose to provide gifts to eight faith-based and community-based organizations in the region, including Lazarus House, community service organizations in Lawrence, and our sister NE Synod congregation Triumphant Cross as well as to Faith.

Now it is Faith Lutheran's turn to give thoughtful and faithful consideration to the best uses of this gift:

- Do we want to use this to strengthen or expand some of our current ministries?
- Do we want to use this to extend our ministry into an additional areas?
- Do we want to use a portion of this gift join with other ministries in our region, or perhaps internationally (such as with our A-Z Ministry)?
- Do we want to invest in the future in some way, through new leadership education, or through our Endowment, to provide support to ministry in the future?

A team has been formed that included members of the Church

Council, our Endowment Committee, and a member of Redeemer now worshiping with us at Faith, to consider ways this gift might be used enhance our ministries now, and in years to come. They will bring recommendations to the Council, and then we will bring a recommendation to the congregation at the Annual meeting. And we welcome your ideas, and you can share these with any member of our Council.

As you consider your thoughts along these lines—please also give consideration to your Giving Intention for Faith Lutheran's ongoing ministry for 2026. You can access a Giving Intention form on-line through Faith's website, or use one of the paper forms that are in the narthex area. Finally, the letter that each household received about this year's Stewardship Campaign includes a QR code, and scanning that code with your phone camera will link to the Giving Intention Form. Exterior Signage Representing Faith Lutheran's Welcome Statement

Faith Lutheran, in a Special Congregational Meeting in June of 2024, adopted a Welcome Statement, following a long process of education, discussions, and discernment facilitated by our Reconciling in Christ Committee. (Our Welcome Statement is accessible through a link on Faith's Web site.) As many of you recall from discussions during the Special Meeting, any discussion or decisions regarding external representation, such as flags or signs, was deferred to another time. The motion adopted at the Special Meeting was confined to the Welcome Statement.

In May of this year, the Church Council asked our RIC committee (also known as FAL-R) to provide at least three recommendations to the Council for external symbolic representation of what is expressed in our Welcome Statement. After deliberation, the committee recommended three signage concepts to the Council at our September meeting. One of these, in a "ladder sign" for-

mat was the clear favorite of both the RIC committee and the Council. This concept is shown on the left in the figure below. The phrases on the sign panels are portions of Faith's Welcome Statement. One inspiration for this sign concept is a similar ladder sign that is posted on a tree along the path to the Outdoor Chapel at Camp Calumet, as shown at right in the figure below. A team led by Kate Robinson, Communications Liaison on the council is investigating material and vendor options for this sign. The placement concept for this sign would have versions of this sign at each of the three entrances to the church building.

The Committee also recommended

options symbolically representing Welcome through the addition of color to Faith's existing roadside sign close-- to Main Street-- that would be both visible, and interpretable, when viewed from people in passing cars. (Cars pass too quickly for the messages from a Ladder-style sign to register.) Another concept presented by the Committee was to paint the bench in front of the building in a multi-color scheme. Another option for a road-side sign described during the Council meeting includes a version of the multi-color heart symbol of Reconciling Works, (the ELCA-affiliated organization that provided support during our RIC process).

On May 4, the Reconciling in Christ committee (RIC) presented a session on signs and symbols between the morning services. At their monthly meeting later that week, the Church Council asked the Committee for suggestions on outdoor signage which would represent our church's Welcoming Statement. Committee members shared their ideas over the summer and then voted on a couple of options, which involved modifying the sign by the street and adding signs by the church's entrances. These ideas were formally presented to the Council at its September meeting, and good discussion ensued. The Council is moving forward on implementation.



Transgender Day of Remembrance, which will be observed on *Thursday, November 20*, honors and remembers those who have lost their lives due to transphobia. It was established in 1999 in response to the brutal murder of Rita Hester, a transgender woman, in Allston, MA, and is now observed in cities around the world as a day to remember the lives lost to antitrans violence. 

Finance

Budget

Beginning in October, the Church Council began to review budget requests for 2026. If you continue your generosity by fulfilling your 2025 pledges, we will have a surplus which we can use to continue to pay for the unplanned and unbudgeted HVAC system that we had to purchase for the Sunday School wing.

In planning for 2026, the Executive Committee indicated a strong desire to plan for staff raises as our staff has had



to go for two years without raises. Additionally, there is a desire to restore some funding to some of the other budgets, particularly Christian Education, which saw significant reductions over the past two years. Finally, we need to plan for Pastoral Care and Support during Pastor Jen's sabbatical. This will require budgeting for Sunday Supply Pastors plus usually another Pastor to cover issues arising during the week.

Since your generosity will determine the Church's ability to address the items noted in this report for 2026, it is important that you provide us with your pledges as soon as possible as we were blessed in 2025 when a donor stepped forward and balanced our budget. However, that was a one-time gift, so it is difficult without your help to budget for Weekly Offerings in 2026. If weekly offering were to only grow from \$345,199 in 2024 to \$355,00 then we would be looking at a very difficult effort to address the "needs" in the preceding paragraph. However, if Weekly Offering grew to \$382,000 or higher then we could better address the items in the preceding paragraph. As of October 27, 2025, the Financial Secretary reported pledges bringing us almost a quarter of the way to \$382,000 so hopefully we will see the remaining balance arrive by mid-November.

Rentals

For 2025, we have had two rentals but two rentals from last year which were anticipated for this year did not happen. We will need other rentals if we are to reach our target. If you or a friend are interested in renting part of the facility, please contact the office at office@faithandover.org to start.


Musicians Wanted for Holiday Season


Bible Study


Women's Retreat 2025
