

New Year's Eve and New Year's Day

It is 11:59 P.M. on December 31. In just a minute, New Year's Day begins with a bang! Horns and noisemakers blow. People drink champagne. People kiss and hug each other. They say, "Happy New Year!" Everyone says good-bye to the old year and hello to the new one.

New Year's Eve is December 31. It is not a national holiday, so people often go to work on this day. But in the evening, many people go to parties. They stay up late and wait for the new year. They eat, drink, and dance. The people in the picture are at a New Year's Eve party. Some parties are at home. Other parties are at restaurants. In New York City, thousands of people wait outside in Times Square on New Year's Eve. They celebrate the new year with a lot of noise.

January 1 is New Year's Day. It is a national holiday, so most people don't have to go to work. Most people have a quiet day with family or friends. Some people have headaches because they drank too much alcohol the night before. Many Americans are concerned about drinking and driving. Drinking and driving is dangerous and illegal. On New Year's Eve, many cities have free buses and taxis so people don't have to drive.

Many Americans watch television on New Year's Day. In the morning, there are parades on TV. After the parades, there are college football games. One popular game is the Rose Bowl game in California. Millions of football fans watch this game.

On January 1, people think about the new year. Many people make resolutions. They decide to make changes in their lives. Some people promise to exercise more. Some decide to stop smoking. Others decide to lose weight. If people don't keep their New Year's resolutions, they can try again next year!
