IN FLANDERS FIELDS.

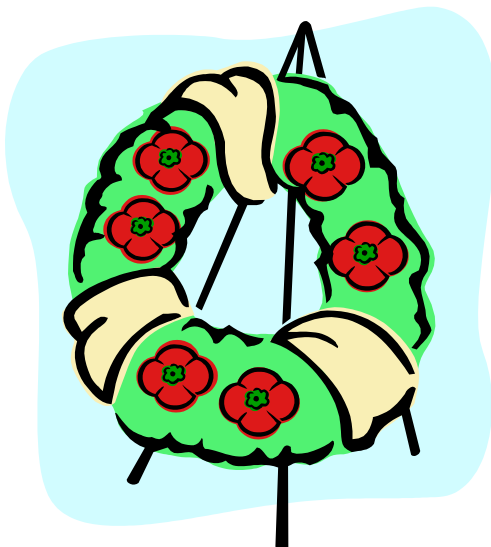


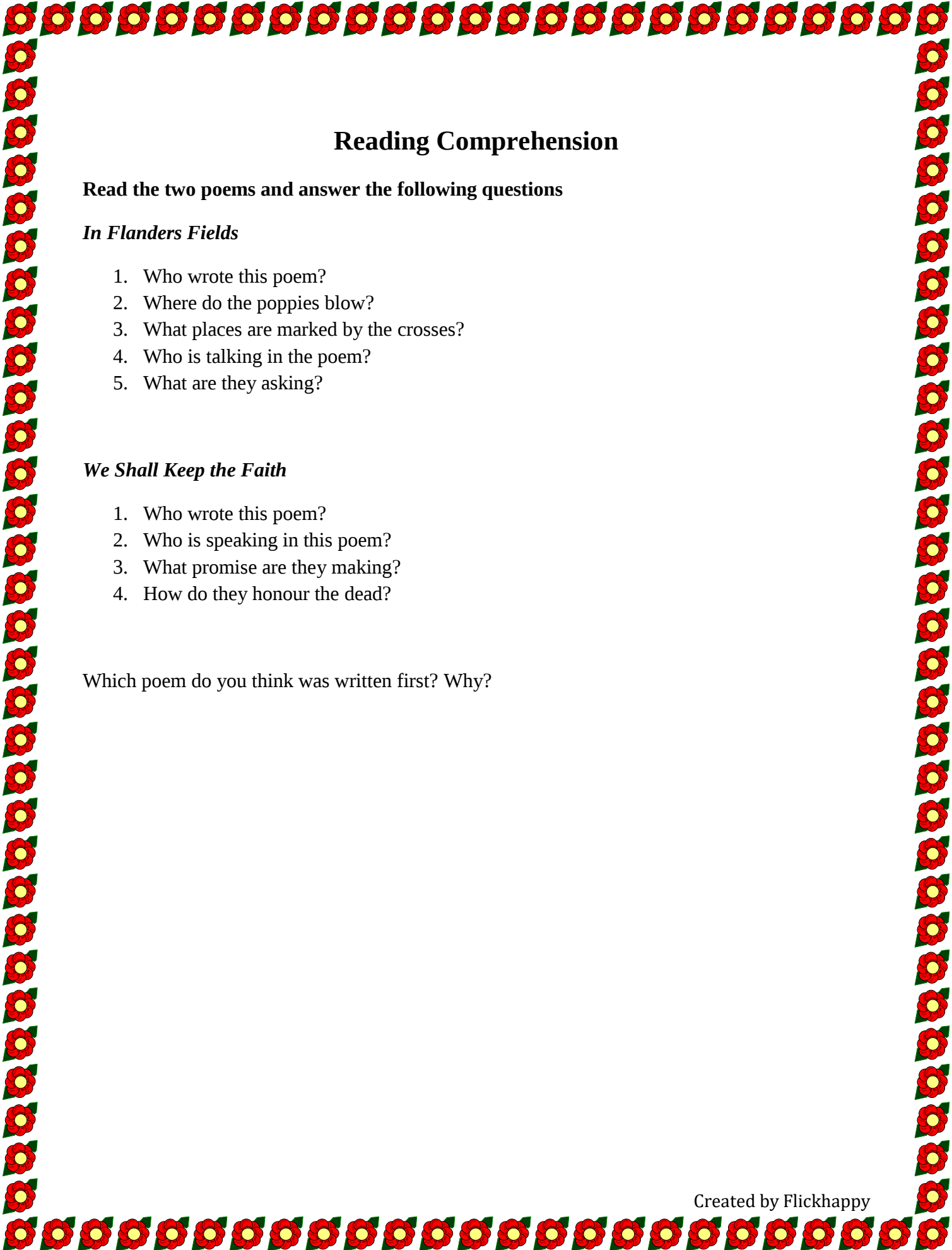
We Shall Keep the Faith by Moira Michael
