with (any) luck/with a bit of luck - used for saying that you hope a particular thing happens

a stroke of luck - when something happens or succeeds suddenly by luck

be in luck - experiencing a surprisingly good situation

be out of luck - unable to have or do something that you wanted

beginner's luck - unusual success that you have when you start doing something new

good/bad luck - when good/bad things happen to you

hard-luck story - a description of bad things that have happened to you that you tell someone in order to m

as luck would have it - by chance

be down on your luck - having a long period of difficulty finding work and earning money

the best of luck (with something) - used for wishing someone good luck in something they are trying to do

for luck - to do something that you think could make you lucky

just my (somebody's) luck - used for saying that something bad happened because you are not a lucky per:

the luck of the draw - the fact that chance decides something, in a way that you cannot control

no such luck - used for saying that something good that might have happened did not happen

luck out - to be lucky

better luck next time - used to encourage somebody who has not been successful at something

some people have all the luck - used for saying that someone has more success than they deserve

try/chance your luck - to try to achieve something although you know you might not succeed

take pot luck - to choose something when you do not know what you will get and can only hope that it will

more by luck than judgment - by chance and not because of any special skill

push your luck - to try too hard to get a particular result and risk losing what you have achieved
