Dear Colleague:

On December 11, 2020, a U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) advisory panel recommended Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine. It is expected the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine will be given a similar EUA in the coming days. This is good news as we work to end the COVID-19 pandemic in our state.

The Georgia Department of Public Health (DPH) will follow the guidance and recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) for prioritizing distribution of COVID-19 vaccine. Initial vaccine supply will be very limited. Therefore, based on the risk of infection and transmission of COVID-19, ACIP has recommended that health care workers and residents and staff of long-term care facilities be the highest priority groups to receive vaccine.

As a licensed health care provider in Georgia, you are in the first group eligible for vaccination.

If you and your practice are enrolled as a COVID-19 vaccine administration site, you may be vaccinated from the vaccine supply being shipped to you directly. If you or your practice are not enrolled as a vaccine provider, there are several ways for you to get vaccinated:

1. Health care workers affiliated with a health care system (hospital, clinic or private practice) or pharmacy should contact their respective facilities about the process for vaccinating eligible employees.
2. Health care workers with access to a community hospital or pharmacy, can seek vaccination there.
3. Health care workers without access to these facilities – including those who have started the enrollment process to become a COVID-19 vaccine administration site but have not yet been approved – should contact their district health director (<https://dph.georgia.gov/media/60761/download>) for vaccination.

DPH is working to identify health care personnel in need of vaccination as the COVID-19 vaccine becomes available. We ask for your patience and cooperation during the initial stages of this monumental vaccination rollout.

This is an exciting development in the fight against COVID-19, and we look forward to a continued partnership in protecting the health of all Georgians. Thank you for all you are doing to care for Georgians during this challenging time.
