

Over 92% of tenants facing eviction are unrepresented. We need to change this!

Evictions are going up

Over the past 10 years, on average nearly 40,000 eviction cases have been filed a year in Massachusetts. At stake in each of these cases is someone's housing.

Trauma of eviction

The trauma of eviction is devastating. Losing a home sends families into shelters and onto the streets. It invites depression and illness, spirals into job loss, is uprooting neighborhoods.

Most tenants are unrepresented

Over 92% of tenants last year were forced to fight their eviction case in Housing Court without an attorney, while most landlords have an attorney.

Representation matters

Having an attorney and access to right resources, education, and support can change the outcome for the better for a tenant and preserve a tenancy. The Massachusetts Right to Counsel Coalition is working to ensure that low income people have access to resources and assistance that can prevent their eviction.
