People's health is influenced primarily by the conditions where they live, work, and play. Yet, we spend nearly \$60 billion on health care in Massachusetts, primarily to treat people after they're sick. PWTF is first large scale initiative that invests in evidence-based community strategies to prevent illness and reduce health inequities. Between 2014-18, PWTF funded successful clinical-community partnerships focused on childhood asthma, falls among older adults, hypertension, and tobacco use.

# Independent Evaluation Finds Promising Results, Supports Further Investment

An independent evaluator found that between 2014-2017 "PWTF appears to be a very sound investment from the point of view of improving outcomes and controlling costs," noted significant systems innovation, and concluded that PWTF warrants further investment. The Prevention & Wellness Advisory Board—which includes representatives of consumers, insurers, hospitals, municipalities, business, researchers, and others - has recommend continued funding.



## Community Interventions To Tackle Root Causes of Poor Health & Health Inequities

Preventable health conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, asthma, and substance use disorders continue to rise, consuming 86% of national health care costs. The result is shorter lives, lower quality of life, reduced workplace productivity, and missed school days. Lower income communities and communities of color are impacted the most. Tackling these challenges requires robust investment in community prevention.

#### Essential Partner in Successful Health Care Transformation

PWTF can bring evidence-based interventions to scale and evaluate their impact, providing crucial lessons for MassHealth and accountable care organizations as they seek to improve care at lower cost. PWTF also addresses community factors that lead to poor health – supporting ACOs to take on financial risk by tackling major cost drivers.



#### Small Investment, Major Impact

A relatively small investment can impact millions of Massachusetts residents, with financial benefits for payers, businesses, government, and families. This bill funds PWTF through a combination of marijuana revenue (passed in the House in 2018) and a modest assessment on health insurers (passed into law 2012), with an estimated total of \$28m annually.

## Continued Funding Supported by Health Care, Municipal, Social Service, and Community Leaders

The House and Senate voted to re-fund PWTF in the last session as part of health care legislation. Hundreds of civic leaders have called for continued funding for PWTF, from large hospitals and health systems to small community based-organizations, from health policy leaders to labor leaders, and from business leaders to elder service providers. Mayors from Boston to Pittsfield also support future funding.
