Stanley Mirvis is Assistant Professor of history and the Harold and Jean Grossman Chair of Jewish Studies at Arizona State University. He has written extensively on the Jewish presence throughout the colonial Atlantic world and on the "Western" Sephardic Diaspora. His forthcoming book is The Jews of Eighteenth-Century Jamaica: A Testamentary History of a Diaspora in Transition (Yale University Press, forthcoming). He received his PHD in History from the City University of New York, M.PHIL in History from the City University of New York, MA in Jewish History from the Bernard Revel Graduate School of Jewish Studies and BA from Yeshiva University. His research focuses on the social history of Jews in the early modern Atlantic—the "Western Sephardic Diaspora"—dealing largely with issues of Diasporic and creole identity. In addition to his position at ASU, he has also served as a Post-Doctoral Research Fellow at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Adjunct Assistant Professor at Hunter College of New York and an Adjunct Lecturer at John Jay College of New York.
