The embodiment of our better angels.

I've carried these words in my heart and mind for several days. These words lodged in my heart when they were spoken in tribute by an individual about a long-time friend and colleague who passed away that was the embodiment of our better angels. The words uncovered the memory of Abraham Lincoln's lyrical and passionate appeal to the better angels of our nature with the closing of his first inaugural address.

Embodying our better angels isn't accidental. If left to chance, our worst impulses often respond first in times of change and uncertainty.

Embodying our better angels requires intentionality in gathering together with and getting to know those who are similar to us as well as those who are different from us. It calls us to humble listening as Jesus would listen. It inspires us to share our authentic voice. It asks us to learn how God is at work in the world. It challenges us to make a commitment to community.

Along with Pastor Marc, I've been looking forward to the return of informal fall conversations started three years ago called "Listening is an Act of Love." These gracious conversations without any agenda are precious opportunities to embody our better angels and weave community. Over the last three years, I've witnessed these conversations bring out new relationships in the congregation in addition to deeper understanding among those who have known one another for many years.

While reading a column by David Brooks earlier this year, I thought of our "Listening is an Act of Love" conversations. Describing <u>Weave: The Social Fabric Project</u>, Brooks wrote: The first core idea was that social isolation is the problem underlying a lot of our other problems. The second idea was that this problem is being solved by people around the country, at the local level, who are building community and weaving the social fabric.... Every time you see that person deeply and make him or her feel known, you've woven it [the social fabric].
