#### **CYBER SAFETY**

This year conversations were around cyber safety. We understand that extremely young children have access to internet based games, apps, and sites. While we cannot change the frequency or restrictions of the usage of internet for these children, we CAN teach them how to be safe.

96% of kids use social networking sites such as Facebook, Instagram, and snapchat which emphasizes the importance of Internet safety. Breaking it down by age lends us these figures:

Four in five 5-7 year olds (82%) Nearly all 8-11 year olds (96%) Almost all 12-15 year olds (99%).

Not only is the simple use of the Internet and social networking sites increasing, the average time spent online for children is increasing as well, with the older groups spending about just as much time online as all of the younger groups combined. Spending more time online allows children to become more vulnerable to sexual predators, sexual offenses, and cyberbullying. Consequently, this leaves less time for outside physical activity with friends, joining a sports team, and spending time with family.

These teachings have been welcomed in schools throughout our county and our teams have left with the praise of the administration.

We want to thank every school that participated this year, as well as those who have already pre-registered their schools next year. We cannot wait to share this valuable information with your students!
