The materials will include references to critical resources and forms for notifying and getting client consent to a custodian appointment or successor attorney upon sale and doing so in compliance with relevant rules of professional conduct.

This CLE will explore and analyze the benefits, risks, and concomitant opportunities of virtual litigation (court & ADR), the acceleration of digitalization and ramifications (including scrutiny of data collection practices in litigation, etc.) and consider solutions to these complex questions during this "new normal" time while cognizant of all commensurate ethical responsibilities.



This CLE will explore and analyze the benefits, risks, and concomitant opportunities of virtual litigation (court & ADR), the acceleration of digitalization and ramifications (including scrutiny of data collection practices in litigation, etc.) and consider solutions to these complex questions during this "new normal" time while cognizant of all commensurate ethical responsibilities.

Topics include:

- Background & overview of the status of litigation (state & federal), as well as ADR proceedings during this pandemic, including statistics & reference materials, etc.
- Status of virtual civil trials (bench & jury) (state & federal) across the country. Address considerations of moving a trial from the physical courtroom to a virtual courtroom, including permissibility and constitutionality of a jury trial by videoconference (jury deliberating remotely); reduction of ability to obtain adequate cross section of community as jurors, etc.; whether such a trial would increase or decrease court and human costs; and, among other considerations, whether a virtual jury trial would deliver the same quality of justice. Further, a discussion regarding the ethical considerations in litigation during COVID-19, including, but not limited to, the virtual jury trial (invoking the Rule and enforcing it; making sure jurors are following the court's instructions and not looking at other materials or electronics; juror notes, etc.).
- Acceleration of technology, what are acceptable data collection practices for litigation as well as the need for vigilance regarding the Rules of Professional Responsibility. Discussion of "who's in the room" when you have virtual meetings, mediations, depositions, trials, etc., confidentiality and other ethical considerations.
- Analysis and efficacy of virtual mediations, arbitrations, and court proceedings, including jury trials.


