

#### Pastor's Bible Study - Weekly Lectionary Texts



So much of our attention in congregational development is spent dealing with internal issues and opportunities that we turn more and more inward. Even our "outward" work smacks of our "inward" bias as we invite people to our events and ponder how to make our events more compelling for those who aren't part of our congregations. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, is known for saying "the world is our parish."

Simply stated, the streets are our sanctuary. Our communities are our congregations.

Yet too often congregations ignore their neighborhoods. They don't consider the vast resource of people surrounding their church and seem to forget that Pentecost, the very event that gave birth to the church, happened in the streets. It's time for churches and congregations to engage with the people around them—most of whom have not yet made a faith decision but are hungering for the grace that only God can provide.

Everything was going fine . . . until it wasn't. For Reverend Junius B. Dotson it took an actual breakdown during a funeral to realize he needed a reset. As he recalls his own journey through grief, depression, burnout, and emotional breakdown, Dotson is passionate about calling for a *Soul Reset* for all disciples of Jesus Christ.

This 6-week study is for everyone who moves at breakneck speed through daily life, often relying only on their own strength to bring about God's kingdom on earth.

Jesus shows us a different way--an easier, unforced rhythm of what kingdom work looks like. It's a balance of work, rest, play, worship, exercise, eating well, and participating in spiritual practices that keep our souls hydrated and healthy.

Soul Reset calls the church and all of Jesus' disciples to reset and reorder their lives around spiritual practices, to learn to walk through difficult seasons with our souls connected to the source of Living Water so that we don't burn out or break down. And if we do burn out or break down, we learn to lift up and point one another back to Jesus.


THE CLASS MEETING: Reclaiming a Forgotten (and essential) Small Group Experience

#### Spiritual Gifts: Discover; Discern; Develop; and Deploy YOUR Special Gifts from the Holy Spirit








Compiled Compendium of Resources on the Spiritual Gifts – Facilitator: Wendell C. Love

Participants will be offered the opportunity to take a Spiritual Gifts Assessment, and will be urged to continue to study about their spiritual gift with a view to how they can use their gifts in the body of Christ (i.e., the catholic (universal) church). The session is expected to be delivered over a six-week period and will begin in Mid- May.



# You'll Get Through This: Hope and Help for Your Turbulent Times Paperback – March 10, 2015


