

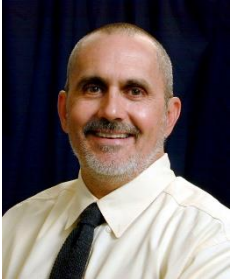

Presenter and Panelist Biographies

(In alphabetical order)



Doug Campos-Outcalt, MD: Dr. Campos-Outcalt has vast experience in medicine and public health and was one of the first faculty members when we started the four-year program in 2007. In fact, Dr. Campos-Outcalt has taught for more than 25 years and has served as associate chair of Family and Community Medicine since 2003. He is board certified in family practice and preventive medicine/public health. He also has served with state and local public health departments and is part of the faculty of the UA Mel and Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health in Phoenix. Dr. Campos-Outcalt received his medical degree from the UA in 1979 and completed residencies in family practice at the University of California, Davis, and in preventive medicine/public health in Tucson. He also earned a master's degree in public administration from Arizona State University in 1985. He was the deputy director of the Arizona Department of Health Services after serving as medical director of the

Maricopa County Department of Public Health and a medical consultant to the Cochise County Health Department. He also was a consultant for two years to the country of Papua New Guinea in the southern Pacific Ocean. Dr. Campos-Outcalt also has served as an advisor to local and tribal health departments throughout Arizona and was a family physician in the medical underserved communities of Guadalupe and South Tucson. Please join me in welcoming Dr. Campos-Outcalt to this important position as we continue to grow, establishing departments with respect to our curriculum and the outstanding faculty of the College of Medicine – Phoenix.

Anne Marie Cardinal, LCSW: Anne Marie Cardinal, LCSW joined Phoenix Children's Hospital in 2016 and brings varied experience to her role as mental health therapist in the Homeless Youth Outreach Program. She earned her B.A. in Sociology/Social Work from Siena College and a Master's in Social Work at Arizona State University.



Cameron Cobb, MSW: Cameron Cobb is the Associate Director of Children's System of Care with Banner University Health Plans in Phoenix. His role includes leading a team to collaborate with providers and stakeholders, as well as program development efforts including the school-based services initiative and related coalition work in Southern Arizona.



Debbie McCune Davis: For 40 years, Debbie McCune Davis has been building coalitions that champion health and educational opportunities in Arizona. She served as Arizona State Senator for District 14 from 2006 to 2017 and as a member of the Arizona House of Representatives from 1979 through 1994, and from 2003 through 2006. As a legislator, McCune Davis championed key legislative priorities including Education and Healthcare. During her time in the legislature, she was a leading voice in support of Arizona's Kids Care program which enables children from low-income families to have access to the medical care they need for a healthy start in life. Ensuring schools and universities have the ability to provide education opportunities for all Arizonans is also extremely important to her. She championed funding for K-12 education, including career and technical education programs for students across the state. Today, Debbie leads The Arizona Partnership for Immunization or TAPI, a non-profit

statewide coalition of over 400 members. When TAPI was formed in response to the alarming fact that in 1993, only 43% of Arizona's two-year-olds were fully immunized against preventable childhood diseases like measles, mumps, polio and whooping cough.



Lisa DeWitt: Lisa DeWitt is the Medicaid School Based Claiming Program Manager for Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS). She has worked with the program for 3 1/2 years.

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Bob England, MD: Bob England served for 12 years as the Director of Public Health, Maricopa County Health Department and most recently as the Interim Director for the Pima County Health Department. Dr. England served in numerous roles at the Arizona Department of Health Services, including medical epidemiologist for HIV & STD services, chief medical officer for the Bureau of Epidemiology and Disease Control, TB control officer, and state epidemiologist. He previously spent several years as a local health director in Connecticut. He has worked in public health for his entire career, including stints in large (Maricopa County, AZ), medium (Pima County, AZ) and small (Milford, CT) local health departments. Along the way he also worked part-time as the medical director for a migrant/community health center.



Kathy Hoffman: Superintendent Kathy Hoffman was elected State Superintendent of Public Instruction in November, 2018 and assumed office in January 2019. Superintendent Hoffman has spent her entire career working in public education, first as a pre-school teacher and then as a speech-language pathologist. She began her career in the Vail School District in Southern Arizona before joining the Peoria School District. Her experience as both an educator and advocate for students with disabilities informs her vision for public education. Throughout her career, she has fought tirelessly for equal access to high-quality public education regardless of a student's race, gender, or zip code. As State Superintendent, she is focused on growing Arizona's educator workforce through targeted recruitment and retention efforts, increasing funding and access to critical social emotional learning resources, expanding digital connectivity for urban and rural school communities alike, supporting and celebrating Arizona's many multilingual learners, and elevating the voices of our state's phenomenal educators.



Will Humble, MPH: Will Humble is a long-time public health enthusiast and is currently the Executive Director for the Arizona Public Health Association (AzPHA). His 30 years in public health include more than 2 decades at the Arizona Department of Health Services, where he served in various roles including as the Director from 2009 to 2015. Prior to being appointed Director, he worked in various capacities in the public health preparedness service line. Most recently, he was a health policy director at the University of Arizona from 2015-2017. He continues to be involved in health policy in his role with AzPHA and as Adjunct Faculty with the UA Mel & Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health. He has a BS in Marketing from NAU, a BS in Microbiology from ASU, and a Masters in Public Health from the University of California at Berkeley. He was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Science from the University of Arizona in 2015 for engaging partnerships between academic and executive public health.

He is active in the community and his home life, serving on the Board of Directors of the Scottsdale Training and Rehabilitative Services (STARS) and the Arizona Hospital and Healthcare Association (AzHHA). Will is a believer in using evidence-based health policy as a means to improving health outcomes and in leading and managing with emotional intelligence.



Daniel Landers: Dan Landers is the Mental Health Block Grant Program Specialist for Arizona Complete Health. Dan created, and oversees, the YES Program made up of Youth Engagement Specialists from Children's Behavioral Health providers who provide behavioral health support directly on campus in 86 schools across Southern Arizona. Since the start of these programs, in 2019, schools have referred over 1,000 students for behavioral health services. Dan holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Political Science from Arizona State University and a Certificate in Public Health Epidemiology from the Arizona State University W.P. Carey School of Business.

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Tracy Pedrotti, MPA: Tracy Pedrotti is the Adolescent Health Program Manager at Arizona Family Health Partnership. With more than 15 years' experience in adolescent-centered services, she has been dedicated to supporting youth and the professionals working with them, to establish lifelong health behaviors and ensure confidence and competence in adolescent-centered services.



Siman Qassim, MBA: Siman is a well-seasoned public health and public policy professional, with a background in community health programs. She started her career in refugee health running a small community center to assist Somalis adjust to life in America. After this, she served ten years at the Maricopa County Department of Public Health, where she was the administrator for the Office of School Health and Wellness Initiatives and the Office of Health Promotion and Education. Currently, Siman serves as the director of health policy at Children's

Action Alliance, an advocacy organization focused on the health, education, and security of Arizona's children. Siman's career has taken her all over the world, from international policy in Washington, D.C. to the Bahamas as an assistant director of health and safety for a large private company, to volunteering in Tanzania with Maasai women. She was awarded the Phoenix Business Journal's 40 Under 40 Award in 2013 and is an alumnus of Valley Leadership. Siman earned her bachelor's degree at Howard University in Washington, D.C. and holds a master's degree in business administration (MBA) from Nova Southeastern University in Florida.



Cira Villa-Williams, LMSW: Cira is the Crisis Manager at La Frontera-EMPACT in Tempe, AZ. Cira is currently running the Children's Crisis Programs which include the DCS Rapid Response Teams in Maricopa County and the DCS Crisis Stabilization teams in both Maricopa and Pinal Counties. And up until May of 2020 also managed the San Tan Walk in Center which provided an onsite and immediate mental health services and crisis support to adults experiencing difficult life stressors. Cira also has experience working at a private agency that specialized in Behavioral and Substance Addictions and Codependency in both the outpatient and inpatient environments. Over the past 16 years, Cira has provided direct service, supervision and management within the Crisis department including working on Mobile Teams, Crisis Stabilization teams, EMPACT Crisis Hotline and Special Projects which is comprised of special populations including the Tribal and ALTCS communities. Cira also supervises ASU Master-Level interns for the Crisis department and believes in the importance of good training and education for the next generation of Social Workers. Cira graduated from the University of Arizona (Go Wildcats!) with her Bachelor of Arts and attended Arizona State University for her Masters in Social Work.



Angélica Villaseñor: Former actress, artist, writer, motivational speaker, and counselor. Angelica was born in Jalisco Mexico, migrating to USA in 2003. While she was in Mexico, she completed her undergraduate degree in psychology, worked as a counselor at CAIM assisting to restore the lives of domestic violence survivors and had her own TV show aimed to discuss mental illness and their possible treatment. Upon her migration to the USA, she obtained Family Development Credentials with Cornell University and a Master's Degree in Professional Counseling with Grand Canyon University. In 2013 she published the book "Mi Caminar con Dios-Walking with God" where she discussed how to obtain emotional healing and fulfillment of the purpose in life through the faith. In 2015 she served as the

President of the Yuma County Victims' Rights Committee and towards the end of the same year, she started broadcasting the radio program "Mujer Levanta to Vuelo -Woman Spread your Wings", with the objective of guiding women to complete their inner healing process. She has worked in the development of programs tailored to help in the teen pregnancy prevention, Art Therapy programs to assist teenagers expressing their feelings in a healthy way, Transition to adulthood programs as well the development of other programs that will assist parents navigating the BH system, school system and other community resources that will help their children with Autism and ADHD succeeding in their lives. To the present, she is a Licensed Associate Counselor working as the Children's Behavioral Health Site Supervisor at Regional Center for Border Health and continues providing therapy for children and their families.



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Kelli Donley Williams: Kelli Donley Williams is the state suicide prevention specialist at AHCCCS. She also oversees AHCCCS' initiative to expand the provision of behavioral health services in schools statewide. Kelli previously oversaw the longstanding *Arnold vs. Sarn* lawsuit for ADHS; she was on the team that saw the 30-plus year lawsuit to a settlement agreement, detailing the Medicaid-covered services for those with serious mental illness in Maricopa County. Kelli worked in international health from 2003-2008, spending five years implementing health programming for women and children in Bolivia, Mexico, Mozambique, and Nicaragua. She serves on the boards for United Food Bank and the Arizona Public Health Association and has worked in public health since 2003. She was a Peace Corps volunteer in Cameroon.



Arely Zavala: Arely Zavala is an Education Facilitator at Mariposa Community Health Center since April 2019. She works primarily with youth in Santa Cruz County educating them about Teen Pregnancy Prevention curricula like Making Proud Choices and Cuidate. She has experience delivering the curriculums virtually, in-person, and often collaborates with organizations to bring the best experience to youth.
