The meeting was called to order by Yvonne Matthews at 6:15. More than 45 participants introduced themselves. Yvonne recognized Moureen Bish for her extensive involvement in the community and her work on the AHNA Board.

Police Report: Asylum Hill's CSO, Sid Palmieri, 860-305-7675, continues to issue tickets for loitering, panhandling, and public drinking. He mentioned that 271 Farmington, a former Dunkin Donuts, will open in 2 months as Hartford Fry. The manager of 198 S. Marshall is hiring 24 hour security staff. Sid managed to dissuade high school students from hanging out at 117 S. Marshall St. Lt. Martin Cunningham, 860-719-1130, Lieutenant Commander North District, reported that schools are out June 13. ATVs continue to be a challenge; of the 10 adults arrested recently, 8 were from out of state.

Hartford Police Chief David Rosado, 860-757-4020, shared his priorities as the new police chief:

- Increase staff with at least 50% people of color
- Create a Community Response Unit that includes 5 officers designated to work together to address specific problems
- Increase use of technology
 - 750 cameras across the city
 - body cameras for all police
 - drones – the chief is working with the ACLU to protect the privacy of residents

In addition, the Chief is working with the Community Court to pilot a program called Hartford Alternative to Arrest, to provide services and help for people who commit a minor crime and need basic help such as food, shelter, a path to a job, etc.

In response to questions, Chief Rosado said all officers have received implicit bias training. He described the Re-entry Program in which help will be offered to people just released from prison. The program, housed at City Hall, hopes to help 150 of the 1000 people who will be released in Hartford this year. Chief Rosado said he plans to train all officers to be CSO's.

In addition, Paul thanked the Asylum Hill Congregational Church for its recent donation of \$15,000 to AHNA, as well as the Aetna who donated \$2,500.

Yvonne noted that with these additional donations, AHNA will seek a part-time Executive Director. As her term is concluding, the Board is also seeking a volunteer to be Chair of the AHNA Board.

Voices from the Neighborhood:

- Councilman Larry Deutsch encouraged residents concerned about branch library closings to attend Council meetings and speak up about their concerns
- Tieasha Gayle, community organizer and resident of S. Marshall St, shared a story about successfully getting a response from the city to deal with flooding on S. Marshall.
- CRT provides free groceries for families

I-84 Update: Michael reported that the advisory committee meeting will meet in August. Questions were asked about the proposed Laurel Street ramp that would eliminate Knox Gardens. Michael responded that the City owns the land and that residents should express their concerns to the City. Participants agreed that the July AHNA meeting should focus on the impact of the I-84 proposal on the Asylum Hill neighborhood.
