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ANNOUNCING THE ANGEL FUND

To ensure that the APF can always help all shelter animals in need of extraordinary medical care, we have created the APF Angel Fund. This fund will enable us to have the financial resources available to help each of the animals who are in need of special care.



Chili is a stunning kitty with beautiful tiger markings. Despite his young age – he's not even 2 years old – Chili was on his second go-around at APF. He was returned with some medical issues and it was obvious he was in pain. Our veterinary staff examined him and found serious issues with his hind legs, and X-rays confirmed that he needed femoral head ostectomy surgery to alleviate the pain.



Lulu, a 6-year-old Chihuahua, who has the most remarkable ears, was surrendered to the APF because her owner had health issues that made it impossible for her to provide care. Again, our veterinarian noted an unusual gait and discovered she has medial luxating patellas on both of her hind legs which also required surgery.

These are both relatively young animals with many years ahead of them, but without these surgeries, it is unlikely they would have been adopted.

Our shelter veterinary team is well known as one of the Capital Region's largest providers of spay/neuter surgeries, but they also provide lifesaving care for the shelter animals. They are able to handle the vast majority of the treatments and minor surgeries in-house, but often the shelter animals need next-level care that requires a specialist, and those procedures are an extreme expense to the APF.

"Unfortunately, more of the animals that arrive at the APF are injured or in need of advanced medical care," said Veterinary Medical Director Jackie Kucskar, DVM. "Our shelter is equipped for basic care and simple surgeries, but for X-rays, diagnostic testing from specialists, or more complex surgeries that require a board certified surgeon, we depend on veterinarians in the community. Our goal is to give each of the animals in our care the best opportunity for a pain-free, healthy life in their forever homes."

Earlier this year, two one-year-old Dobermans were surrendered to the APF. They had spent most of their young lives in a basement and were not exposed to new things, people, or the daily socialization that puppies need. Kathy Snowden, a certified dog trainer, and Carolyn Decker, Animal Behavior College Student, volunteered their time to work with Rosie and Rupert.



Here is what Kathy and Carolyn had to say about their time with these two special dogs: "As dog trainers for some of the APF shelter dogs, it's incredibly and fabulously rewarding to have worked with Rupert and Rosie! Recently we had the honor and pleasure to work with these two Dobermans that had a rough first year. They were both unsocialized and very afraid of pretty much everything in the world around them. In addition to the love, guidance, and care from the APF staff, we came each weekend to try to socialize, build confidence, and do some training. We saw lots of improvement each week. They are showing signs of trusting people, environments, and sounds, which makes all of us so very happy and hopeful. Their socialization will have to continue with their new owners along with positive guidance and training, so they can trust people and enjoy their future in our world."

While receiving training from kind volunteer trainers, APF staff also worked with Rosie and Rupert. Kaitlyn Kieser, an APF Vet Assistant, spent special time with the dogs every day to work on their training routine.

"It was clear from the beginning that Rupert and Rosie would require a unique approach to socialization and acclimation to "normalcy" due to their first year of life being isolated from the outside world. It is critical that we treat each animal that is surrendered to the APF as individuals, with specific sets of needs and unique challenges that they are required to overcome to prepare them for their new life post adoption. In the case of Rupert and Rosie, exposure to new stimuli using positive reinforcement training techniques were implemented by the animal care specialists at the APF to create positive associations with new people and experiences."

Rupert and Rosie have both found great homes to work with them and continue to grow their confidence. Both dogs plan on attending future Canine Academy courses so they can continue to grow their skills.









APF SHELTER STAFF AND THEIR COMMITMENT TO SUPPORTING PATTY
