We will examine both the media's impacts (including its effect on the crowded Democratic field and the contest with Trump) as well as its challenges (including legal issues, the impact of technology and changed reading habits). We will



also examine the growing news desert, in which one in five Americans have no local newspaper.


2019 is the 100th anniversary of women’s suffrage in the U.S.; 2020 is the 100th anniversary of the League of Women Voters. Richard Finnegan documented the fight to expand women’s rights in Ireland. He connects the issues confronting the Irish women’s rights movement to the on-going struggles for women’s rights in Europe and the United States.

Richard Finnegan is a semi-retired professor of political science and international studies at Stonehill College where he taught for more than 40 years. He is coauthor of the book *Women and Public Policy in Ireland*.

Nature Conservation: From Serious Problems to Practical Solutions

THREE SESSIONS: 10:30-noon Mondays 11/25, 12/2, 12/9. Location: EPL

Nature changes constantly and not always for the best. Changes can be rapid and are most likely induced by humans. This series looks at endangered species in our natural world, with special focus on prominent environmental threats, their root causes, and possible solutions.



We will also examine successful conservation efforts around the world.

Dr. Herb Raffaele is the former Chief of International Conservation of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the author of several books about Caribbean natural history including *Wildlife of the Caribbean*.

TUESDAYS

French Opera

THREE SESSIONS: 11-12:30 p.m. Tuesdays 11/5, 11/12, 11/19. Location: EPL

French opera, with its big choruses, grand ballets, and intricate plots differs significantly from Italian opera.

Its emphasis on drama and refinement set it apart from the Italian focus on singing acrobatics. We will discuss the development of French opera, including selections from great composers both French (Bizet and Gounod), and others (Offenbach, Verdi and Salieri).

Dante, Milton and the Devil

SIX SESSIONS: 1:30-3 p.m. Tuesdays 10/8, 10/15, 10/22, 10/29, 11/5, 11/12. Location: EPL

The great adversary of Western literature, the Devil, appears in Dante’s *Inferno* and Milton’s *Paradise Lost*. We will examine the characterization of the Devil in each epic, and the art inspired by these epics. Bring copies of Dante’s *Inferno* (translated by John Ciardi) and *Paradise Lost* to class.

Francis J. Smith is a Fulbright Scholar, former lecturer in the Classics at Harvard’s Graduate School of Education, and 1985 MA Teacher of the Year. The former head of Classics and Modern Languages at Wayland HS, he was featured in the PBS documentary *Great Teachers of America*.

Africa: The “Dark Continent” from the Mid-19th Century to the Present

THREE SESSIONS: 10:30-noon Tuesdays 10/8, 10/15, 10/22. Location: EPL

This course will examine many of the countries of sub-Saharan Africa from their colonization during the “Scramble for Africa” to their emergence as independent nations in the 1960s, with subsequent successes and failures. Among those studied will be Nigeria, the Congo, Rwanda, Senegal, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Botswana and South Africa.



Michael McNaught earned B.A. and M.A. degrees from Oxford University, where he specialized in Military History and the Theory of War. As a teen, he spent three years living in Tanganyika (now Tanzania), where his interest in African history and politics developed.

The Biological and Toxin Weapons Convention: An Intelligence Perspective

Location: EPL
The BWC, one of the world’s oldest nonproliferation treaties, entered into force in 1975. The participating 182 countries agreed never to develop, produce, or stockpile biological or toxic agents. Unfortunately, the BWC treaty had a problem: it did not require countries to show their work was legitimate.



Dr. Betsy Sanders was a member of the U.S. Delegation negotiating a BWC protocol requiring annual declarations of relevant facilities and research projects. She also was a member of the U.S. Delegation to the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons.

Self-Publishing: The Joys and How to Avoid the Pitfalls

Do you have an unpublished manuscript? Let’s demystify the publishing experience, from formatting to printing options. Advance your work through social media and on-line sites. Explore how to publish E-books, paperbacks, and audiobooks and market them through a variety of publicity ideas.
