Dear **Valued Partner**,

We are pleased to share our Green Port Progress Report, a detailed account of the commitment made by the Port of Long Beach in 2005 to significantly improve air and water quality while safeguarding the health of the communities surrounding the San Pedro Bay ports complex.

As we celebrate 20 Years of Leading Green, the report outlines our role as environmental stewards and the achievements gained through successful, industry-leading programs to decrease port-related sources of pollution. Key updates include:

- Dramatic reductions of pollutants compared to the baseline year of 2005: Diesel particulates are lower by 92%, nitrogen oxides by 71% and sulfur oxides by 98%.
- Looking ahead, we are building for a zero-emissions future with charging stations for electric trucks, shore power for additional terminals, hydrogen fueling facilities, planning for charging stations to power zero-emissions locomotives and much more.
- Meaningful partnerships with our communities, industry leaders and dedicated workforce have driven our innovative practices in air quality management.
- We have committed \$65 million to our Community Grants Program, which funds local projects aimed at improving environmental health for communities in and around the Port. Our Community Sponsorship Program, budgeted at \$3 million annually, supports nonprofit community events centered on the environment, education, social justice, the arts and historic preservation.
