The Hmong American National Catholic Association (HANCA) convention, held every other year, invites Hmong Catholics from all over the United States to come together in order to explore their faith and culture.

Approximately 160 people coming from eight different dioceses attended the convention, which was held the weekend of July 14-16 at St. John’s University in Collegeville, Minnesota.

The convention’s theme “Your Love Awakens Me, I am Alive” (Ezekiel 37:1-14) inspired the various workshops, prayer services, and worship. Some of the guest speakers were Archbishop Bernard Hebda, Bishop Andrew Cozzens, and Deacon Michalak, who discussed the importance of faith and prayer.

Separated into two groups, the adults and youth members had different workshop schedules they followed throughout the weekend. The topics of these workshops ranged from forgiveness and God’s Mercy to the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit.

In addition, Hmong Catholics had the opportunity to engage in charismatic prayer, a time of praise and worship that most members do not regularly engage in. Angela Lor, 18 and a member of the youth community at HANCA, said, “Although I was hesitant at first, it [charismatic prayer] allowed me to connect with others who freely expressed their faith and, as a result, made me experience God in a different light.”

The convention concluded with the celebration of the Eucharist and an election of a new
