As part of the education team with Clearwater, I've spent so much of the past decade describing what a powerful experience it is for elementary school kids, teenagers, volunteers, and the public to sail aboard the sloop. It is life changing, it really is. But, I have never expressed how much this boat and community has changed me. The majority of my adult life has been spent on the Hudson River hauling on halyards, pulling in seine nets, singing with kids, and asking people to donate to or volunteer with Clearwater.

This boat, this river, this music, this crew, community, family, mission, work, has come to define me.

So, I'm sure our Clearwater community will understand that I am both excited and sadden to announce that I will be casting off from my role Education Director at Clearwater this month and passing the reigns on to someone new. You'll see me up at the Norrie Point Environmental Center teaching with Cornell University and the Hudson River Estuary Program staff. I'm excited to be moving on to another chapter of my life, but will never be far from the brine barrel and my favorite tiller.

To all the Clearwater volunteers, participants, friends, passengers, staff and especially crew. May you all have fair winds, following seas, and well set anchors. I'll see you at Revival!
