

## Music Notes

The Section Leaders will, between early January and early February, be singing the entirety of Thomas Tallis' *Mass for Four Voices*, which concludes our 20-21 exploration of Renaissance masses for four voices. Thomas Tallis' career was shaped by his artistic sensibilities developed in the florid musical reign of Henry VII, not to mention his devotional life as a Roman Catholic. Despite the ravages of war and fierce tribal politics of the day, Catholicism flourished in 15th-century England. But the dawn of the 16th century brought with it new and very real dangers—a ruling family wracked by scandal, political volatility, and a religious reformation that would threaten the foundations of religious life.

Thomas Tallis and William Byrd are rightly acknowledged as the foremost composers of the high Renaissance as expressed in Tudor England. In the case of Thomas Tallis, it is his clear ability to adapt to the extremities of the political upheaval and, as a result, the religious changes serving four monarchs which sets him apart. Tallis is the master of the musical line and vocal phrase. Regardless of the text he sets, he sets it in a beautifully crafted hierarchy of harmony and discord.

As with many of the songs by enslaved peoples, *Keep your lamps* impetus came from hearing a sermon based upon the parable found in the book of Matthew, Chapter 25, verses 1-13. In this passage of scripture, Jesus tells the story of the wise and foolish virgins. They had been told that the bridegroom would be coming, thus they got their lamps, trimmed them, and set them burning and went to the appointed place. However, the bridegroom did not arrive at the appointed time and the foolish only brought enough oil for one night. They then returned to get more oil and of course the bridegroom came while they were away. Jesus then says to his disciples, "you know not the day nor the hour of my return. Be ye ready!" As a response to this, one can only imagine the song stirring from the soul of one slave listener. Jesus was indeed a deliverer and a hope for the slave. One can only speculate that this song was sung often, when there was a possibility of deliverance.



## LIFE OF THE CHURCH


**Church office closed on Monday, January 18 in observance of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday.**

## **Adult Education for January 2021**

### **Sunday Mornings at 9:15 via Zoom**

The Zoom link for Adult Education will open at about 8:45 on Sunday morning to give those who would like an opportunity for early fellowship to join. Bring your own coffee! The program will begin as usual at 9:15.

**January 17: Kerm Towler – Christianity in South Africa:** Kerm Towler has traveled to southern Africa (five times to South Africa-once to Zimbabwe and Zambia) as part of the Wesley Theological Seminary Immersion program, which means he just cannot get enough of South Africa! The country is rich in cultural, artistic and plant life. Did you know that most of the plant species in the world had their origins in southern Africa? He has "been in the room" with people who fought for freedom (and paid the price with torture) and were imprisoned on Robbin Island as well as the man who was Nelson Mandela's personal jailer of 30 years in two prisons. As part of the presentation, he will introduce the human origins work, and then discuss the recent history regarding apartheid and social development, highlighting the advances as well as areas in which progress is being held back. And maybe a picture of some animals might be seen too.

**January 24: Rev. Pat Jackson – "Be the Bridge" Initiative:** Rev. Jackson is the co-Executive Director of Interwoven Congregations and a Parish Associate at Bethesda Presbyterian Church. Interwoven Congregations is a faith community dedicated to creating opportunities for people to meet and engage in a sustained way across the racial divide. Be the Bridge is an initiative that several BHPC members participate in.

**January 31: Dr. Robert Jones, Public Religion Research Institute, White Too Long: The Legacy of White Supremacy in American Christianity** Dr. Jones last addressed BHPC Adult Education in 2017, when he discussed his previous book, The End of White Christian America. Both volumes are based on deep demographic and public opinion studies of the intersections of race, politics and religion.



## KEEPING UP WITH GIVING DURING THE SHUTDOWN



BHPC's 2021 Stewardship theme – Abundant Blessing, Abundant Gratitude, Abundant Giving – continues to frame the life our church. Even during this time when we cannot gather in person, we hope that each of you can discern how God continues to shower blessings on us all, individually and as a church family, and in gratitude for those blessings, give abundantly to support God's work at BHPC.

Now more than ever, we want to ensure that everyone is aware of the many methods of giving that are available, whether you are a long-time BHPC member, a virtual visitor, or looking to simplify your giving habits. So, here is a comprehensive list of the ways you can give to BHPC.

**Online:** All methods of online giving will direct you to **Realm**, BHPC's virtual connection tool, where you can securely enter any giving amount, designate which "fund" should receive your donation (e.g., "General Giving," the "Annual Pledge" or even the "Easter Fund"), and choose whether to make a one-time donation or a recurring donation. For all online giving, you will need a credit or debit card. There are three methods of online giving:

- **The "Give" Button:** Simply click the red "Give" button found on the top right corner of the BHPC website and you be directed to **Realm**.
- Text "BHPC" [space] dollar amount" (ex. "BHPC 150" for a \$150 gift) to 73256 and follow the link.
- [Log into Realm](#) via the App or from the website and choose the "Giving" option.

**Check:** Please make checks payable to "Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church" and mail to the church office. As with online giving, you may indicate a special designation by writing that in the memo field.

**Gifts of Securities** (e.g., stocks, bonds, etc.): Transferring securities to Bradley Hills' brokerage account is a great way to donate appreciated securities while potentially avoiding capital gains taxes. To learn more about this giving option, please see our website under the [SERVE](#) tab and then "Ways for You to Give."
