We come from across the nation, from different denominational backgrounds and from around the world. We are all God's children, united by God's love.

Music Notes

Given Mendelssohn's high regard for the choral masterpieces of Bach, Handel and Haydn, it is no surprise to find that his oratorio *St Paul* is modelled on similar lines, with an integrated scheme of recitatives, arias and choruses. His use of chorales to demarcate important points in the story and to reflect on the action is clearly influenced by the Passion music of Bach. One of Bach's favorite chorales, 'Wachet auf' (*Sleepers, wake*), is heard at the very beginning of the overture and later on in the chorus, replete with trumpet fanfares.

The larger part of Johann Sebastian Bach's (1685-1750) enormous output for organ dates from early in his life, especially the Weimar period that ended with his move to Cöthen in 1717. From 1723 on, he focused more on liturgical works as Cantor of the Leipzig Thomaskirche, where he worked until his death in 1750. The Cöthen period is particularly rich in instrumental works, including many for organ, but the long Leipzig period proved fertile as well. The Prelude and Fugue in B minor, BWV 544 dates from about 1730, a few years after his inventive Trio Sonatas, which were essentially the first such works conceived for solo organ. They also follow his first of two books of preludes and fugues in all keys collected under the rubric The Well-tempered Clavier. By the time he composed BWV 544, he had therefore gained ample experience in creating the two-part combination that would serve him so well.

3. Women's Collective HIV/AIDS Care: NE and SEDC. Solid emphasis on prevention and appropriate physical and mental health care.

4. 2022 Mission Trip: Relationships are built, new skills learned and mutual respect grows.

5. Uganda Village Health Teams: Buyobo is the first community in Uganda to achieve a fully functioning volunteer health team. Your support has been key.

6. EDEN at Faith in Anacostia: Everyone deserves to eat naturally. Eco conscious, fresh food, nutrition education, agricultural skills, employment opportunities.

7. Peace in Israel/Palestine - New Story Leadership equips Palestinian and Israeli change agents with the tools needed to create social, economic and political change in the region. Creative adaptions allowed work to continue during Covid-19. The current plan is to return to inperson work in 2022.

9. Mexico - Kids First: Free orthopedic care in Guanajuato. Care and surgical trips by volunteer surgeons will be up and running with caution in 2022.

10. Asia Pacific American Legal Resource Center (APALRC): Protecting civil and legal rights of low income Asian immigrants in DC area. Culturally appropriate and linguistically accessible.

11. GenOUT Choir for LGBTQ+ & Allies: Giving LGBTQ+ and allied youth a voice while connecting that voice to the larger community. We welcomed GenOUT in 2019 and hope to see them back leading worship when safety allows. Voice lessons and other forms of mutual online support are keeping connections strong during Covid-19.

12. Ethiopia/Oromia Educating Girls: A creative approach combines funding for schooling, for the girl's family and for a mentor. This lowers barriers and protects the girls from the dangers of land grabs, Covid-19 and political turmoil. A girl from REAL (Resources for Enrichment of African Lives) program said it all, "We are not poor. We have a vision!"

13. Habitat for Humanity: The inequity in access to safe housing is astounding. Habitat helps. Don't be silent. Support Habitat.

14. Asia - Forman Christian College/Pakistan: Scholarships for Christian and Muslim Women in Pakistan. Combining Alternative Gifts, mission budget funds and Asia Fund proceeds, we are supporting 11 women (six Christians/five Muslims). Forman offers a place to learn together with mutual respect.

15. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Kits: PDA excels at disaster response. The kits are an essential part of that response in the US and overseas. Supplies for the kits will be purchased with your donations.

16. Bethesda Cares: offers compassionate assistance to local homeless and working poor. They have been working hard to protect their clients during Covid-19. BHPCs Kitchen Ministry is suspended due to the pandemic.

17. Be thes da Help offers immediate short-term help our neighbors in crisis, including emergency groceries, rides to medical appointments, help with utility bills and more.

18. Friends Club reopened September of 2021 offering careful, appropriate social interaction for men in early to mid stages of Alzheimers.

19. Interfaith Refugee Family Support BHPC, Bethesda Jewish Congregation, Idara e Jaferia and Maqaame Ibrahim Islamic Center work together to integrate new refugees into our community.

20. Alternative Gifts General Fund. Donations allow flexibility to respond to the needs of our recipient groups that are not covered by specific donations. In the past, we have been able to help with emergency clothing needs and grocery gift cards for new parents dealing with expenses such as diapers and baby clothes.

With thousands of Afghan refugee families needing to be resettled, the current need is greater than ever. This sponsorship would entail subsidizing the family's rent on a declining basis for a 9 to 12-month period as well as providing a full initial apartment set-up and a range of on-going transportation, education, mentoring and other supports that will be tailored to the needs of the family with which we would be matched. In addition, to this longer-term commitment, we plan to continue providing short-term assistance by setting up apartments for families. We have set up four apartments since August with your donations and enthusiastic volunteers of all ages. Although, furniture and furnishings are donated, there are other costs that must be covered. A committed group of volunteers is forming for this extended effort, but we cannot make the sponsorship commitment without the needed financial resources. It is not too late to volunteer your time. Smart Sacks Today in Memorial Hallway after Worship



Bradley Hills' Smart Sacks Project resumed after worship on Sunday, October 3, place! We've been paired with Weller Elementary School

(3301 Weller Rd. in Silver Spring) and JoAnn Leleck Elementary School (710 Beacon Rd. in Silver Spring). But to sustain this service project, we need additional volunteers!

Two to three Drivers Per School: Once every two to three weeks, a driver picks up from church the tote bags (23 for Weller Elementary, or 25 for JoAnn Leleck Elementary) and delivers them to the school between 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on a weekday. Each tote weighs 12 to 15 lbs, and contains four packed Smart Sack bags. Food is non-perishable, so you can load up on Sundays right after the bags are packed following worship, and keep them in your car for delivery later in the week. Or you can pick them up from church on a weekday (other than Monday, when the church is closed).

Packing Table Setup On Sundays Outside Memorial Hall: We'd like to have teams of two (perfect for couples) to help set up the packing tables each Sunday before the 10:30 service. This is a great opportunity for 8:30 attendees to participate. This responsibility would be to take the boxes of food (menus for each week are already decided) from the storage closet

and arrange them on the tables so they're ready for packing into sacks. The boxes can be a bit heavy to lift out of the closet, but we have a with Covid safety protocols in cart that eliminates the need to carry them.

> Plastic Bag Openers: We use plastic grocery bags provided by Manna to create each Smart Sack. It would be a huge help if one or two volunteers (perfect opportunity for our youth members!) could open the sacks just before or during the packing operation on Sunday mornings.

Background on Smart Sacks: Smart Sacks helps bridge the gap between Friday and Monday by providing nutritious foods for children and their families who might not have another meal until after the weekend. The food is provided by Manna Food Center, a nonprofit striving to end hunger in Montgomery County. Bradley Hills member John Schmiedigen picks up the food each week from Manna's warehouse and delivers it to our church, for the congregation to assemble into Smart Sacks after the 10:30 worship service

KEEPING UP WITH GIVING



BHPC's 2021 Stewardship theme – Abundant Blessing, Abundant Gratitude, Abundant Giving – continues to frame the life our church. Even during this time when we cannot gather in person, we hope that each of you can discern how God continues to shower blessings on us all, individually and as a church family, and in gratitude for those blessings, give abundantly to support God's work at BHPC.

Now more than ever, we want to ensure that everyone is aware of the many methods of giving that are available, whether you are a long-time BHPC member, a virtual visitor, or looking to simplify your giving habits. So, here is a comprehensive list of the ways you can give to BHPC.

Online: All methods of online giving will direct you to Realm, BHPC's virtual connection tool, where you can securely enter any giving amount; designate which "fund" should receive your donation (e.g., "General Giving," the "Annual Pledge" or even the "Easter Fund"); and choose whether to make a one-time donation or a recurring donation and how you want to give; by credit/debit card or by ACH transaction using your bank account. All methods of online giving incur a processing expense for the church. To help offset this expense, the donor is offered the opportunity to contribute 1.5% of the gift amount for ACH transactions and 3% of the gift amount for credit/debit card transactions.

- The "Give" Button: Simply click the red "Give" button found on the top right corner of the BHPC website and you be directed to Realm.
- Text " BHPC" [space] dollar amount" (ex. "BHPC 150" for a \$150 gift) to 73256 (REALM) and follow the link.
- Log into Realm via the App or from the website and choose the "Giving" option.

Donors can setup online giving by providing the information for credit/debit card, for ACH transactions, or for both. If both giving options are setup for a donor, the selection of which donation method to used is made at the time of each gift of when setting up recurring gifts.

Check: Please make checks payable to Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church and place a check through the office door (Door #4) mail slot, or you can set up automated bill payment through your bank and the bank will mail a check to the church at a frequency and amount you choose. For all checks, you can indicate a special designation in the memo field, gifts without a designation will be directed to general giving.

Gifts of Securities (e.g., stocks, bonds, etc.): Transferring securities to Bradley Hills' brokerage account is a great way to donate appreciated securities while potentially avoiding capital gains taxes.
