Homeless Outreach Program for Empowerment (HOPE Team)

The City has established a HOPE team which responds to reports of homelessness issues or situations and consists of City homelessness personnel, a representative from the Sheriff department, and a County social work.

Number of Homeless Individuals Serviced in 2023 - (PEH) - People Experiencing Homelessness

- 81 PEH were successfully housed in rental units that meet their needs and budget.
- 20 PEH were offered/accepted gainful employment through the efforts of HSM.
- 36 PEH were successfully placed in a temporary shelter through the efforts of HSM.
- 92 PEH were referred to community partners for intake process, resources, and rental assistance/funding.
- 33 PEH were provided employment preparedness assistance: resume, interview, and application process.
- 79 PEH were assisted with application process for County social services and programs.
- 88 PEH were assisted with developing a Stabilization Plan to assist with achieving short/long-term goals.

Buena Creek Navigation Center

One of the City's goals of the Homeless Action Plan (HAP) is to enhance interim housing capacity for the operation of an emergency shelter that reflect national best practices.

The City has partnered with the City of Vista to establish the Buena Creek Navigation Center (BCNC), a low barrier navigation center for adults in North County San Diego, near the City of Vista.

On January 24, 2024, the City Council unanimously approved the Buena Creek Navigation Center (BCNC) creating the first joint venture of its kind in North County San Diego. The BCNC consists of 24 rooms with the capacity to serve up to 48 adults.

Encinitas will have exclusive use of six rooms and 12 beds. The BCNC will provide year-round support, holistic services and trauma-informed care to adults experiencing homelessness that want to develop a plan to identify a path toward long-term rehabilitation and stable housing.

Outdoor Dining Update

On December 20, 2023, staff presented an outdoor dining item to City Council regarding new state legislation (AB 1217), preliminary options from the coastal parking study, and desired modifications to current outdoor dining permitting processes. After public comment and deliberation, the Council provided staff the following direction on outdoor dining:

1. Extend temporary outdoor dining to July 1, 2026, or until a permanent ordinance is adopted and in effect, whichever comes first (pursuant to AB 1217)
2. Prepare a permanent outdoor dining ordinance
3. Require a leasing fee for the use of public parking spaces as outdoor dining (but not for sidewalk space)
4. Develop design standards that include safety and aesthetics (including requiring aesthetic wrap of K-rail barriers)
5. Include no limit on the number of outdoor dining establishments per block
6. Increase the downtown parking limit from two to three hours
7. Remove inactive/unpermitted outdoor dining establishments
8. Ensure that converted parking be used exclusively for seating

We currently have three types of permits: Temporary Encroachment Permits (public space), Temporary Use Permits (private space), and Sidewalk Dining Permits. Planning is working with Code Enforcement and Engineering staff to undergo an extensive review of all outdoor dining establishments, which is the first step to removing the inactive/unpermitted establishments. Staff is also compiling accurate contact information for each establishment.

Staff is in the process of researching aesthetic design standards and leasing fees. Further, they are meeting with the parking study consultant CR Associates next week to discuss finalizing the study. Staff is tentatively planning to bring an outdoor dining item back to the City Council in April to respond to the Council's direction.

- I'm sure you all have heard of the exciting news that the long-planned Army Corps of Engineers sand replenishment project is getting underway here in Encinitas.
 - Congressman Levin delivered \$30.5 million dollars for this project.
 - Once the dredging is done in Solana Beach, they will start putting sand on Beacon's Beach.
 - The project will place 340,000 cubic yards of sand.
 - And then it will repeat every 5 years for the next 50 years.
 - This is just a game changer for our beaches and we're hoping to replicate it for more beaches throughout our area.
- Last week, Congressman Levin announced a new federal grant of \$53.8 million dollars to the North County Transit District for the San Dieguito railroad bridge replacement project.
 - This will pay for the replacement of that 108-year-old bridge over the San Dieguito Lagoon at the Del Mar Fairgrounds, and allow double-tracking of the rail through that area.
 - The project also includes the construction of a special events platform at the Del Mar Fairgrounds, so folks can take the train directly to the Fair and the races.
 - This project is also important as it is a precursor to the necessary relocation of the rail line as it goes south into Del Mar, where it is currently perched on the precarious and eroding coastal bluffs.
- This week, we also unveiled a new interactive map of federal project funding for every city in our district.
 - This is a first-of-a-kind among Congressional offices.
 - The map shows projects that together total \$835 million in federal dollars delivered by Congressman Levin to our district in the past 5 years.
 - This includes over \$51 million dollars for projects in Encinitas, including the Leucadia Streetscape Drainage Improvements, which we all know is so important especially as we face these El Nino rains.

- Yesterday, we announced the January Constituents of the Month were Encinitas residents Ted and Carla DeBont.
 - Ted and Carla reached out to Congressman Levin after seeing their health insurance premiums double after Ted aged into Medicare.
 - Because of their story, he introduced the *Health Insurance Premium Fairness Act* to close a loophole in the ACA, and help married couples when one spouse ages into Medicare and the other remains in the ACA marketplace plan.
- Finally, I want to mention a new bill that Congressman Levin introduced last month.
 - This is the Veteran Hunger Coordination Act.
 - This bill was introduced with Republican Derrick Van Orden of Wisconsin.
 - The sad reality is that many low-income veterans are less likely to participate in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (or SNAP) than the overall low-income U.S. population.
 - The bill would help connect veterans with programs and resources to get vital nutrition assistance.
 - Congressman Levin strongly believes that anyone who served our country should never struggle to feed themselves or their family, and this bill is one more step toward that goal.

Legislative Update - February 1, 2024

LOSSAN RAIL CORRIDOR: As Chair of the Senate LOSSAN Rail Corridor Resiliency Subcommittee of the Transportation Committee, Senator Blakespear continues to take the lead on increasing coordination among the many stakeholders who participate in the operations of the 351-mile corridor from San Luis Obispo to San Diego. With another bluff failure in San Clemente last week and the closure of the rail line, the urgency of improve the efficiency and resiliency of the rail corridor has been elevated. The Senator has held three public hearings, met with elected, railroad and agency leaders and worked with Congressman Levin to increase state support for coordination and federal funding for improvements.

LEGISLATION: Senator Blakespear is planning to introduce legislation this term that addresses her priorities issues that including transportation, gun violence prevention, housing, environment, and women's rights. Since the session began in January, she has introduced three bills and is co-authoring an Assembly bill.

- **LACTATION ACCESS IN COURTHOUSES** would require courts starting in January 2026 to grant reasonable break times during court proceeding for an attorney or other person to express breast milk. (SB 949)
- **STREAMLINE BIKE LANE PROJECTS** removes unnecessary delays in the development of bike lanes for coastal cities and counties. Encinitas is considering support of this bill at their meeting on February 14.
- **LOW INCOME HOUSING requires** cities and counties to have a plan to provide homeless serving housing to the number of unhoused people tallied in the annual point in time count and to submit a Housing Obligation Plan to Housing and Community Development Dept, update the plan annually and post it on their website. (SB7)
- **REPEAL OF INCOME-BASED CHARGE TO UTILITY BILLS.** The Senator is co-authoring a bill by Assemblymember Irwin's to repeal the income-based fixed charge to utility payments. (AB 205)

STATE BUDGET DEFICIT: The Senator is participating in the ongoing review of the Governor's proposed budget that addresses an estimated \$38 billion deficit. The state is required to pass a balanced budget every year. Through cost savings, spending reductions and the use of rainy-day funds, they will succeed.

Re-introduction of Assembly Bills:

- AB 1992: Blue Carbon Projects in Coastal Developments (Formerly known as AB 45)
 - The bill would authorize the California Coastal Commission to add blue carbon demonstration projects to the suite of factors it considers for potential mitigation when approving coastal development permits, where feasible
 - Encinitas' San Elijo Lagoon was the inspiration behind this bill
 - This bill was re-introduced in January
- AB 530: E-Bike License and Training Program (will be assigned a different bill number)
 - The bill would require a license for e-bike riders without an active driver's license
 - Prohibits persons under 12 years old from riding e-bikes
 - Establishes local diversion and community service programs as an equitable alternative to ticketing riders without a valid license/state issued photo ID
 - To be reintroduced in February
