As Global Scholars, they will receive a certificate and Global Scholar honor cords.

Students in grades 9 through 12 have the opportunity to select interdisciplinary studies and activities that will help them develop global awareness and competency. Faculty from various departments communicate and work together for the benefit of the students. Students must achieve four components before earning the Global Scholars designation:

- Successful completion of certain academic courses (one of which must be the continuation of a world language through level 4)
- Active participation in program-approved extra-curricular activities
- A minimum of 20 service hours as outlined by the program
- A minimum of eight literature/media reviews (four of which had to be from books).
