- 1 Success/Leadership, Success/ Communication, or Youth Leadership Workshop
- 6 Months as a club officer
- 1 Year as a district officer
- Serve as a club sponsor, mentor, or coach
- Complete a High Performance Leadership Project

Pathways Program Requirements:

- 2 learning paths (35-40 Speeches)
- 1 year as a club officer
- 1 year as a district officer
- Serve as a club mentor or coach
- Serve as a club sponsor, conduct a Speechcraft, or conduct a Youth Leadership program
- Complete the DTM project
