GCFP 2025 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

District VIII hosted a creative and memorable “MystERIE by the Bay” convention at the Sheraton Hotel and Bayfront Convention Center in Erie. More than 250 attendees gathered over three days and were welcomed with goody-filled hospitality bags, along with a series of engaging mysteries and stories woven throughout the event. Beautiful floral honor designs were created for CAR-SGC Director Beverly Kazickas, President Wolanski, and Convention Co-Chairs Joyce Milberg and Bonita Herman by Judy Morley, Vickie Beatty, Tom Huston, and Carol Klonicki.

A variety of engaging workshops and presenters filled the schedule, complemented by featured speakers at each meal who carried the convention’s mystery theme into their presentations. Attendees learned that Pennsylvania’s state insect is the firefly—the mystery of why it glows and how it communicates—and discovered that purchasing a new plant for the garden can sometimes require digging three separate holes!

Ken and Peggy Butler delivered an informative presentation on the firefly (better known as a lightning bug), while author Neal Sanders offered a lighthearted talk titled “Gardening is Murder,” sharing the challenges of maintaining multiple gardens. The Meadville Community Theater troupe entertained guests with a humorous performance about an invasive species mystery, and Tim Farrell provided an engaging and educational presentation that demystified floral design.

The convention also featured exciting award presentations, educational exhibits, a variety of vendors at the Bayside Market, excellent raffles, and beautifully arranged centerpieces at each meal.

A member of HAGC since 2001, she has served on and chaired numerous committees and events, with her leadership having a profound impact on the club's growth and success.

A notable contribution has been chairing the club's biannual flower show, and developing and hosting a series of floral design classes. Her floral designs have been featured in NGC's Vision of Beauty Calendar 15 times. Another notable club and community contribution was her work with Hazle Township Supervisors to plan, design, and name the Hazle Township Inspirational Park to beautify the area with trees, PLANTS, and a gazebo.

On the district, state, regional and national levels, she has served on and chaired numerous committees, including District II/III Director, GCFP Financial and Recording Secretary, 2011 Convention Co-Chair, Convention Presentations, Leadership Workshops, and GCFP President 2017-2019 to name a few! She is a Master Flower Show Judge and current Chair of NEAJC, judging prestigious shows including the Philadelphia Flower Show, as well as state shows in Maryland and Delaware, along with presenting floral programs across Pennsylvania.

Karen Wychock is well-known in GCFP and a go-to person to get jobs done. In addition to her illustrious educational career, she is the owner of Times Gone By, a traditional basketry business, and was a featured vendor at the 2025 GCFP Convention Marketplace.

Deeply engaged in horticulture and the arts, she IS past President of the Trevoze Horticultural Society, a member of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, and Ikebana International. Since joining Trevoze Horticultural Society in 2009, she has assumed leadership roles at local, district, and state levels.

Serving as Chairperson of the 2025 GCFP Convention in King of Prussia, she created "A Gardening Revolution" experience, blending gardening and colonial history into an inspiring and educational event. She currently serves as GCFP State Judges Council Chair, coordinating six area councils across Pennsylvania, and became an Accredited Life Judge in 2023. From 2021–2025, she also served as Keystone Gardener Editor (print edition), producing six issues, including directory editions for Presidents Sheila Croushore and Leeanna Ryba. Karen worked diligently through the Covid pandemic as District XI Director, and has served on several District XI committees, including Flower Show Chair and Design Program Chair.

For 13 years, her creative contributions as chair of her club's flower shows were invaluable, having been awarded several GCFP Flower Show and Schedule awards. Her eight years working with youth and senior citizen groups have focused on mentoring and supporting their participation in her club's annual flower shows. She has conducted numerous design workshops and has been honored by both her club and GCFP presidents. Never slowing down, Karen has participated in and won multiple ribbons in horticulture and design at the Philadelphia Flower Show, while also serving as a show committee member. Her current project is a GCFP Pennsylvania Gardens publication for President Wolanski.

Note: Deer prefer soft, tender growth over coarse or fuzzy plants, making the texture of the bachelor button a natural barrier to browsing. This unpleasant mouthful acts as an immediate physical signal that the plant is not a preferred food source.
