
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
### DVDs:

**ACT OF REPENTANCE TO INDIGENOUS PERSONS (101095)** At General Conference 2012, an Act of Repentance and Healing Relationships with Indigenous Persons was held on April 27, 2012. This two-DVD set includes material explaining why this service was held (DVD segments and guide) and a DVD of the service itself (123 min.). Age: Adult.

**FORGED BY FIRE: UNTOLD STORIES OF FAITH (106016)** This series of five extraordinary stories, told by United Methodist people with a commitment to being the church in a transformed society, takes root in the deeply complex historical struggles of their ancestors. These stories point to the resilience of the church and people of faith as they dare to act with freedom and with unity to restore community and resist dominant norms, behaviors, and perceptions that justify hate based on race, ethnicity, nationality, and language. Five segments: 1) U.S. Internment of Japanese American Communities (10 min.); 2) **The Trail of Tears: Cherokee Forced Removal** (9 min.); 3) Underground Railroad: African-American Passage to Freedom (7 min.); 4) When the Border Crosses over Us: Hispanic/Latino Struggles on the U.S. Mexican Border (12 min.); 5) The Newest Immigrants: Pacific Islanders (8 min.). **LADONNA HARRIS: INDIAN 101 (109048)** Using interviews, archival footage, and photographs, this documentary DVD tells the story of Comanche activist and national civil rights leader LaDonna Harris and the role that she has played in Native and mainstream America history. The wife of a U.S. Senator, she became a voice for Native people in the 1960s and continues working to strengthen and rebuild indigenous communities and train emerging Native leaders around the world. Copyright limit: Your church can only show this DVD in a group of its own members (cannot advertise to the general public). Age: High school - Adult. 64 Minutes.



**MORE THAN BOWS AND ARROWS (113021)** This award-winning documentary explores the contributions of Native Americans to the development of the United States and its culture. Age: Middle school - Adult. 51 Minutes.


**STORIES FROM THE CIRCLE OF LIFE (119044)** This DVD includes stories of Native Americans throughout the United States. Native narratives explore faith journeys, ways they have integrated cultural beliefs into faith and life, issues confronting communities historically and today, and lessons for the church and all God's people. The disc also includes the audiobook 'Giving Our Hearts Away' that can be accessed on a computer (not a CD player). Includes leader's guide to the DVD. Age: Adult. 37 Minutes.

**EARTH JOURNEY (705008)** Author: Belsley, Elaine. Thirteen Native American flute songs by Central Illinois musician Elaine Belsley. Five of the songs were inspired by her world travels. Song titles: Into 2000, Machu Picchu: An Andean Adventure, Moai of Easter Island, Native American/Irish Jig, Athabaskan Song, On a Venetian Gondola, Stonehenge, On the Great Wall, Thunderbird Song, Indian Summer, Forever True, Tribute to Hawk, Double Eagle Dance. **OJIBWA HYMNS: NUHGUHMOWINUM (715007)** For many generations the historic Native American congregations of the United Methodist Church in Michigan have been gathering during the month of August. Recorded in an outdoor chapel, this CD contains 16 songs (including Amazing Grace) and 8 narrations (including Psalm 23 and the Lord's Prayer). Age: All. 50 Minutes.

**RIDE THE WIND (718007)** Author: Broken Walls. This collection of contemporary Native American Christ-honoring songs was recorded live at the Many Nations One Voice Celebration in Dallas. Age: All. 60 Minutes.




**SINGING THE SACRED: CD & SONGBOOK (719017)** Musical Gifts from Native American Communities. This collection of 21 songs from 17 Native American communities celebrates the diverse Native American cultures and their contribution to the Christian church, particularly to the United Methodist community. The songbook contains musical scores and additional information and includes Communities of origin, First lines and common titles, and Topics and categories indexes. Age: All. 60 Minutes.


## Map:

**INDIAN COUNTRY: NORTH AMERICAN INDIAN REFERENCE MAP (709007)** This 23" x 36" full-color map of the United States shows the locations of current American Indian reservations (2004). It includes 'Portraits of Pride,' a series of small portraits of famous Native Americans and 'Long History of Losing Ground,' a series of small maps showing the shifting ownership of land. 
**GRACE SUFFICIENT: A HISTORY OF WOMEN IN AMERICAN METHODISM 1760 - 1939 (814138)** Author: Schmidt, Jean Miller. Chapter titles: Women's religious lives in the founding era; Evangelical liberty and public domesticity; The true Methodist woman -- prescription and reality; Women called to preach the Gospel; Itinerant preachers' wives; Holiness evangelists; Woman's work in the church -- new spheres of usefulness; The struggle for ordination; Methodist deaconesses -- a public ministry for women; The struggle for laity rights; Racial-ethnic women in American Methodism (**Native American**, Hispanic American, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Asian American, Chinese American, Japanese American, Korean American, Filipino American); New women after the vote -- citizens, preachers, and social reformers; Epilogue -- 1939 - 1968. 
**INDIAN NO MORE (820166)** Author: McManis, Charlene Willing and Sorell, Traci. Regina Petit's family has always been Umpqua and living on the reservation is all 10-year-old Regina has ever known. But when the federal government enacts a law that says Regina's tribe no longer exists, Regina becomes "Indian no more" overnight. For the first time in her life, Regina comes face-to-face with the viciousness of racism when her family moves to Los Angeles. In this moving middle-grade novel, Regina must find out: Who is Regina Petit? Is she Indian, American, or both? And will she and her family ever be okay? **MASSACRE AT SAND CREEK: HOW METHODISTS WERE INVOLVED IN AN AMERICAN TRAGEDY (816104)** Author: Roberts, Gary. On November 29, 1864, the United States Colorado Volunteers attacked peaceful Cheyenne and Arapaho people encamped along Sandy Creek in the Colorado Territory. The two men most responsible were leaders in the Methodist Episcopal Church. This book examines the little-known event and the persons involved. Chapter titles: Which way? Whose way?; The road to dominion; The bitter conundrum; Methodists and the American Indian; John Milton Chivington -- the fighting parson; John Evans, M.D. -- entrepreneur and philanthropist; Colorado's 'Indian problem;' The path to Sand Creek; Protest and recrimination; Methodists, Sand Creek and the 'Indian question;' Chivington and Evans -- the later years; The balance sheet. \*2018 UMW Reading Program Bonus Book: 2 Education for Mission. **RESCUING THE GOSPEL FROM THE COWBOYS: A NATIVE AMERICAN EXPRESSION OF THE JESUS WAY (815159)** Author: Twiss, Richard. Chapter titles: The Creator's presence among Native people; The colonization, evangelization and assimilation of First Nations people; Sweating with Jesus -- stories of the Native experience; A view from the hill -- emerging Native expressions of the Jesus Way; From colonization to contextualization; Looking down the road -- the future of the Native Church. Includes discussion questions, glossary, and bibliography. Age: Adult. 271 Pages.







**VOICES OF NATIVE AMERICAN WOMEN (814059)** Author: Roy, Delrayne, editor. In this slim booklet, twenty-three Native American women of faith, from 17 tribes and from every region of the Americas, share the fears, pains, trials, and victories of their lives. Age: Adult. 24 Pages.




**CHRISTMAS MOCCASINS (899911)** Author: Buckley, Ray. A story by Native American author Ray Buckley about forgiveness. After being robbed by three young men, a grandmother makes them very special moccasins, delivering them on Christmas Eve. She explains to her grandson on this journey that they are doing the Creator's work and he experiences the freedom of forgiveness. Age: Elementary - Adult. 26 Pages.



**GIVE-AWAY (899922)** Author: Buckley, Ray. A story by Native American author Ray Buckley about God's gift to humankind. Realizing that people have lost their sense of identity, the birds and animals offer their most precious gifts, even at the cost of their own lives. However, the Creator explains that 'It is I who must give myself away' in the form of a humble baby. Age: Elementary - Adult. 32 Pages.



**WATER WALKER / NIBI EMOSAARDANG (819185)** Author: Robertson, Joanne; Williams, Shirley; Toulouse, Isadore. A full-color paperback book. An Ojibwe grandmother (nokomis) loves nibi (water). No-komis walks to raise awareness of our need to protect nibi for future generations and for all life on the planet. She and others have walked around all the Great Lakes from the four salt waters, or oceans, to Lake Superior. The walks are full of challenges, and by her example she challenges us to take responsibility for protecting our water and to protect our planet for all generations. \*2020 UMW Reading Program: Social Action - suitable for children. Age: Elementary – Adult. 38 Pages.



**WING (899933)** Author: Buckley, Ray. A story by Native American author Ray Buckley about healing and re-creation. A bird named She Who Flies Swiftly becomes injured and after the Creator touches her everyone wonders why she is still unable to fly. Over time the Creator changes her pleading song into a beautiful new voice and her name changes to She Who Has Been Healed. Age: Upper elementary - Adult. 32 Pages.
