And when [Paul] had said these things, he knelt down and prayed with them all. Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

He was going to go back to Jerusalem and his fellow Jews that he had once shared so much in common with were going to have enough of him and turn him over. It filled Paul and the Elders with grief. And these things would continue throughout history...but Paul's time had come to an end. There were hugs, tears, prayers, words of encouragement and admonition...and then Paul got on a ship and left.
