Then, seemingly on point with the old school yard chant, first came love, then came marriage, then came baby in a baby carriage, then another baby, and then a pair of babies and a much larger baby carriage. Twenty-four years later, I am so very blessed to call them my family.

Education and Experience

I was a late bloomer in the world of higher education thought much knowledge and maybe even some wisdom was gained from the school of hard knocks. Higher education, spurred God's calling, while working full-time and attempting to be a half-way decent parent and spouse, came with its challenges. I began the long process by acquiring an A.A. in Communications from Normandale Community College in Bloomington, MN with expectations of transferring for a bachelor's degree. This plan, however, was interrupted by an angel or just a friend who encouraged me to apply to seminary and, low and behold, I was accepted and attended Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN, to which I am overjoyed to say that journey is all but over.

Service and Community Involvement

Early in my calling, I felt led to a program that Meetinghouse Church (formerly Colonial Church) was invested in, Families Moving Forward (FMF) is a program of Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative that housed families experiencing homelessness in church buildings around the Twin Cities. By the following year, I became the programs Congregational Coordinator for the church. Not long after this experience began, Along with Pastor Jeff and the chair of the mission's team, I went for a tour of tiny home that Settled had built as a prototype. The Settled vision was to have churches build tiny homes that would then be placed in Sacred Settlements to become homes and neighborhoods for unhoused people. The following summer, myself

and two other builders/church members, along with countless volunteers from the church and community built a tiny home in the church parking lot. Then there is Spring Fling, a free outdoor community music festival that was created out my need to fulfill an internship project in my first year at First Congregational. Complete with bouncy house, fun games, the local brewery food and drink wagon, and two live bluegrass bands, the vision was to invite the entire town and have some fun together while raising money and awareness for a mission. Spring Fling is now going on its 4 year and has raised thousands for UCC Ukraine Relief Fund, and two local Christian non-profit organizations.

Theological Perspective

I've come to see the world through the lens of the Triune God, Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. God, the Creator, brought everything into existence with an intention that we, as part of that creation, live in harmony and steward the world with care. God's grace, mercy, and love are gifts that we are called to share with all of creation. Jesus Christ, the Redeemer, entered our world to bridge the gap between our flawed humanity and God's perfect divinity. His life, death, and resurrection offer us a path to reconciliation and eternal life, demonstrating the depth of God's love for us. The Holy Spirit, the Sustainer, is our ever-present guide, leading us ever-closer to living in right relationship with God and each other. This understanding forms the core of my faith and shapes everything I do in ministry, encouraging me to embrace the mystery and wonder of God's ongoing work in the world.
