- 2. Therefore, be it resolved that We, the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. will support the just treatment of all immigrants, including the Irish nationals that have supported and defended the United National Convention: States of America for generations.
- 3. Therefore, be it resolved that We, the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. will support diplomatic intervention in the peace process in Northern Ireland in accordance with the Good Friday Agreement. Furthermore, we continue to support the MacBride Principles, the McGuinness Principles, fight for the reinstatements of the civil rights of the political ex-prisoners in Northern Ireland, and end the English partition of Ireland and assist in bringing a lasting peace to a united and free Ireland.
- 4. Therefore, be it resolved that We, the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. will continue to work for the growth of our Noble Order throughout the United States, as well as empowering all the membership to combat anti-Irish and anti-Catholic images and statements in our culture.

Therefore, be it resolved that We, the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. will, as in the spirit of the Irish Bards, continue to foster the learning of Irish history which will assure the proper and correct retelling of our history with emphasis on Irish women for future generations.

I am proud to provide the social justice position statements that were adopted at the 2022 LAOH

DISABILITY RIGHTS

The LAOH takes the following position on Disability Rights Issues:

- Disabled persons are not "other" and should not be marginalized in society. Persons with disabilities must have the same opportunities to contribute to society as non-disabled persons. All laws and policies that affect disabled persons must have input from the disabled community.
- All parishes should implement and follow the USCCB Guidelines for the Celebration of the Sacraments with Persons with Disabilities. All parishes should be welcoming, safe, and inclusive spaces, for persons with disabilities.
- LAOH members are encouraged to work within their parishes in outreach to disabled persons and families with persons with disabilities, to ensure accessibility to Mass, the sacraments and to all parish activities. Persons with disabilities and/or their representatives should be included in discussions about parish activities and events, especially in discussions about accessibility.
- The LAOH should recruit and welcome members with physical and intellectual disabilities and make accommodation for their participation in all meetings and events.
- Providing healthcare, and residential, employment and educational opportunities to persons with disabilities

- should be a priority for the Catholic Church and Local, State, and Federal Governments.
- LAOH members are encouraged to ensure Local, State, and Federal elected officials know that they support legislation that promotes access to healthcare, housing, and employment for persons with disabilities, including legislation that helps the caregiving economy.
- Persons with disabilities must be free from abuse and neglect in their living, school, and work environments. Caregivers and others who provide services and care for persons with disabilities should receive the best training possible and should be recognized, in terms of salary and respect, for the critical work they do in caring for the most vulnerable.
- The effect of climate change today greatly affects future generations of US citizens. The LAOH supports U.S.'s efforts to join global efforts to reduce the negative effects of climate change.
- LAOH members are encouraged to consider individual actions that can reduce the amount of air, land, and water pollution. Individuals can make a difference in their parishes and schools by participating in discussions of ways their communities can end polluting practices. Individuals can let their elected officials know they support legislation that brings justice to communities suffering from environmental pollution and legislation that will lead to a cleaner environment for future generations.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

The LAOH National Political Education Committee takes the following position on

Environmental Justice Issues:

- All people have the right to breathe clean air and have ready access to clean water.
- Environmental injustice is a sin against humanity and all God's creations.
- Environmental justice is a social justice concern that continues to need to be addressed by Catholic social justice policies, U.S. Government Policies and individual actions. The LAOH supports the efforts of the Catholic Church to work with Local, State and Federal Governments, as well as local community groups to address environmental injustice.
- Communities most affected by proposed environmental practices and policies must be included, at every level (Local, State and Federal), in discussions and development of those policies and practices.
- Plans in the U.S. to transition to cleaner energy sources should at every level (i.e., Local, State and Federal) acknowledge the potential financial effects on communities that have relied on the fossil fuel industry and include plans to aid those communities in the transition.

Missions and Charities Wrap-up

As my term as the National Missions and Charities Officer ends, I would be remiss if I didn't share with everyone my gratitude and heartfelt appreciation for all you have been able to accomplish these past two years. I am so proud of all you have done. At the National Convention in Pittsburgh, we were able to present Sister Corona Colleary from the Columban Sisters a check for \$15,500. We were also able to present Father Chris Saenz from the Columban Fathers with a check for \$14,000 for donations and a check for \$8,000 for Mass Stipends. When you add this to the checks that we presented the Columban Sisters and Columban Fathers for the first year of my term, we have been able to donate over \$70,000 to the Missions. In addition to this we were able to present 12 separate organizations with one-time grants ranging from \$500 to \$4,384 from our Appeals for Aid fund. A total of approximately \$16,400 was distributed from the Appeals for Aid Fund. None of this would have been possible with out the generosity of our membership. This year at the National Convention we established a Missions and Charities award to recognize the state that donated the most money per member to the Missions and Appeals for Aid fund. I was happy to present this to the state of California this year.

The dedication of our members to fundraise for our Missions was truly inspirational. You are living our motto of Christian Charity in your communities

throughout the country and elevating the name of the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians in all you do for charity. You ladies rock!!

I loved my time with you as your National Missions and Charities Officer and I look forward to serving you as Treasurer. Be well.

May I speak, please? Thoughts from a member.

The LAOH and the AOH are membership organizations dating back to 1894 and 1836, respectively, in America. Their survival is dependent upon adding new members each year to replace an aging membership. We seek new members that believe in our shared goals, are willing to do the "work" of the order, are motivated, inspired, and willing to serve. But are we a democracy? Does every single member have a voice? Does leadership listen to these voices? Good leaders listen. Good leaders do not rule in an absolute, authoritative manner. Good leaders engage and inform the membership. They share information accurately and completely. Good leaders keep their egos in check and do everything they can to build the membership, not divide and isolate. Organizations that are dependent on members joining for their continued existence, will struggle to survive unless leaders choose to lead by example and not by command.

Is it possible to hear thousands of LAOH and AOH members' voices all at once? Honestly, probably not. So, we have Division, County, State, and National Boards elected by the membership to carry forward the voices of these members. This is a representative democracy, so to speak. We have State and National Board meetings and Conventions with assigned Delegates to bring forward the interests, concerns, and issues that have been expressed by the members of their division, county, and state. To bring forth their voices, so that their members' voices will be heard. To discourage members from using their voices because leadership may not want to hear something "different" or something that may be in opposition to the leaders' personal viewpoint, is just unhealthy for a membership organization. It compromises the ability to build the membership because let's face it, who would join an organization if you were told your voice didn't matter and that Officers were more important than members. I suspect, not many would join.

I believe we are at a crucial turning point in our great Orders. Both LAOH and AOH. Do we build up and strengthen the membership or does it dwindle and fade? Do we engage members from all states, big and small, to have a voice or do we let a few decide the direction of the Orders? Will we impair our orders with short sighted initiatives, or will we work diligently to select leaders who make it a priority to work together for the success of the Hibernians in

America as a whole? Only time will tell. I believe in our members as they are our greatest assets. And I believe their voices should be heard.

At the convention in Pittsburgh, we held a very engaged FFAI Committee Meeting with input from our LAOH members, AOH members and Ciaran Quinn of Sinn Fein. At our general session, Michelle Gildernew (MP) gave a captivating update on the current challenges and opportunities in Ireland. The major issues of concern at this point are Brexit and Britain's lack of adherence to the Protocol, Amnesty Legislation and forming the new government in Stormont.

Ciaran Quinn spoke on the recent election in the north where there was a major political shift. For the first time, a Nationalist leader, Michelle O'Neill is the First Minister elect with a Unionist DUP member as the Deputy Minister. The DUP have refused to form a government in Stormont since the May election. Ciaran also spoke of the significant impact of Irish America on developments in Ireland and the UK. The US played a major role in the development of the Good Friday Agreement which brought the peace to the north of Ireland and US support is critical in ensuring that there is no wavering on that agreement.

The recent announcement of a Seanad Eireann Public Consultation open to all on the constitutional future of Ireland is a welcome development intended to give all who have a stake in the future in Ireland a voice in planning for Irish unity. We look forward to commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement next year

against the backdrop of united Ireland discussions.

Last week, under the direction of President Madigan, I issued a "Call to Action" requesting members to contact their members of Congress to ask them to sign on to the Troubles Amnesty letter to the House of Lords and the Special Envoy to Northern Ireland letter to President Biden. These are critical bipartisan initiatives, and your efforts are appreciated. As Ciaran told us at convention, Irish America has an impact.

Of course, the big news for Irish Americans throughout most of the United States was that the Saint Patrick's Day parades and related activities were on! After two years of cancellations, we were all able to get out and show our Irish Pride. On March 4th President Gayle Shalvoy attended, as our representative, the introduction of those being honored in this year's parade held at the County building in downtown Rochester. Thank you, Gayle.
