



From the FCCA Pastor



Dear Friends,

Rachel Held Evans recently died. I don't know if you ever heard of her, but she was a young evangelical author who helped reclaim everyday ways of reading the Bible from a liberatory female perspective.

She was very active on Twitter, Facebook and had a regular series of articles she wrote at Patheos, the religious portal. In her book, *A Year of Biblical Womanhood*, she wrote,

"Life is full of the sort of joys and sorrows that don't resolve neatly in a major key. God knows that, the Bible knows that. Why don't we?"

Rachel had a way of sharing her thoughts in a gracious way, and sharing reproving remarks without alienating others, even the many men who trolled her regularly online. Her first book, *Evolving in Monkey Town*, shared her spiritual journey from certainty to an accepting of doubt and questioning while living in Dayton, Tennessee, where the Scopes Mokey Trial took place.

"The story isn't over. There are still prophets in our midst. There are still dragons and beasts. It might now look like it, but the Resistance is winning. The light is breaking through."

Her second book, four years later was called *"A Year in Biblical Womanhood: How a liberated woman found herself sitting on her roof, covering her head, and calling her husband master."* Like the book by the secular Jewish man, *"Living Biblically,"* Evans attempted to live for a year in a literalistic reading of the Bible as a woman. From the experience, she was better able to write about how so much of our understanding of faith is culture based, and how to reclaim portions of ancient culture for women in liberative ways.

The three large crosses that were newly installed on the Leland Road side of the church will be dedicated on Pentecost Sunday which is June 9th. We will celebrate the arrival of the Holy Spirit with worship in the sanctuary and then at the end of the service we will process outside to the crosses and gather around them as we dedicate them.



The crosses are a public symbol of our faith. Folks who see them as they drive past on Leland Road will be reminded of the presence of our church community. The crosses are an embodiment of the deepest mystery of our faith--death becomes resurrection. The crosses witness not only to the transformation of physical death into the new life of resurrection, they also testify to the new life in Christ we experience as a daily reality through grace, compassion and forgiveness. The structure of the cross, intersecting beams with one in a horizontal position and the other in a vertical position, is a reminder of the dynamics of our faith. God's love flows unconditionally into the world (the vertical beam) and then through our service flows out into the world (the horizontal beam.) As we serve, our hearts fill with love for God and love flows back to God. We are met by God's love and the dynamics of the cross come alive in our own hearts and lives.

To all who drive by on Leland Road, the crosses will announce the presence of a church that is often hidden. May we embrace our visibility. May the crosses inspire us to be witnesses to the presence of God in the world. We are the ones called to bring our faith into the community and let people know that our faith is vital and life giving. May we be the messengers of a faith that is inclusive, grace filled and committed to justice & peace.

A bit of the history of the crosses. The three crosses stood for many years in front of the First Congregational Church of Antioch when it was located on East Tregallas in Antioch. The crosses welcomed

"If you are looking for verses (in the Bible) with which to oppress women, you will find them. If you are looking for verses with which to liberate and honor women, you will find them."

Some of her best-known quotes are shared as images throughout this newsletter. You may be interested in reading her for her quick wit, and her deep honesty about the failings of the church. You may also like how she reclaims a way to be a Christian woman in the modern age without checking your head or heart at the door. She died much too young at age 37. Emma Green, in the Atlantic, wrote that Evans *"was part of a vanguard of progressive-Christian women who fought to change the way Christianity is taught and perceived in the United States."* Green argued that her legacy is *"her unwillingness to cede ownership of Christianity to its traditional conservative-male stewards"* and that her *"very public, vulnerable exploration of a faith forged in doubt empowered a ragtag band of writers, pastors, and teachers to claim their rightful place as Christians."*

"I have come to regard with some suspicion those claim that the Bible never troubles them. I can only assume this means they haven't actually read it."

Rachel, you are gone too soon, but the planet is a better place for your having been here.

folks as they drove into the church parking lot. They became the unofficial logo of the church. A line drawing of the crosses was used on the church letterhead and in church publicity.

The Antioch church building and grounds were sold to the Salvation Army in 2010 and the decision was made to move to Pittsburg and share ministry with Community Presbyterian Church of Pittsburg. At the time of the sale, we brought many things with us from the Antioch church. The crosses were the largest items we took with us when we moved. The church bell was the heaviest, the stained glass rose window the most beautiful, the baptismal fount and communion table the most recognized. The altar candles, cross and Bible were the most easily carried. Some of these items have journeyed twice. Once from the church when it was located on 6th Street in Antioch to the East Tregallas church location and then again from East Tregallas to Pittsburg.

On the first Sunday of our arrival in Pittsburg, we processed down the center aisle of the sanctuary carrying the Bible, candles and cross. The communion table and baptismal fount quickly found new homes in Pittsburg. The table we use every Sunday for worship. The baptismal fount lives in the narthex and on occasion holds the door open. The candles and cross live in the back of the sanctuary. The Bible found a home in my office. The Rose Window was framed, lights were installed to back light it and it now graces the rear of the sanctuary above the doors.

The church bell was adopted by the Antioch Historical Society. The crosses lived in an Antioch backyard for a number of years and then were transported to Pittsburg and spent time in the Camp Stoneman Room. The crosses had been cut off even with the ground when they were removed from Antioch and in order to restore their original height they had to be extended. Eventually the crosses were installed on the side of the church facing Leland Road. Thanks to Chris Persing and Jim Hodges who shepherded this project along. And to all the others who pitched in.

'Looking forward to gathering around the foot of the crosses to dedicate them on Pentecost. Hope you will be able to be there.







Winter Nights:

By the time you read this, the Winter Nights will have been completed, but as of this writing, it has not started yet. We are scheduled to receive 7 families, 32 guests, 12 adults/20 children. Girls are 12, 10, 10, 4, 3, 2, 17 mo., 2 weeks and 1 week. Eleven boys are 13, 11, 11, 9, 8, 8, 8, 7, 6, 2 and one month. A special thank you to those families who cooked a meal for this group while they were here. Recognition to the Fish, Schmidt, Henry, Stetson, Galvez, Persing, Dybdall, Hosmer, Namanny, Dexheimer, Burks, Hodges, Sullivan and Scott families!!! And, Robert Hosmer who spent every night. The program couldn't have worked without your help!! On May 30, the dinner invitation was extended to the churches that plan to help host the extended Winter Nights program next year. That program is scheduled to last for 13 weeks early next year. More information to follow as we get closer.

Shepherd's Gate:

Our Mother's Day donations for the women's shelter was very successful. There were many cans of food donated, along with several large packages of paper towels and toilet paper. Three gift cards were received, and we purchase another \$100 of gift cards from our share of the profits from the Talent Show. Some clothes were also donated. May thanks to all who contributed, no matter the amount.

Parking Lot Program:

The Parking Lot Program began on January 2 and finished on April 29. For four months homeless people, who were living in their cars, were able to park in the parking lot on the Leland Roadside of the church. This gave them access to restrooms, snacks, water and breakfast items in the morning. A member of the Interfaith Council was there every night supervising. Due to the graciousness of the shelter program congregation, we were able to provide a hot meal on most nights. Families came from Pittsburg, Bay Point, Antioch, Brentwood, Central County and Hercules. There were 40 participants which included 9 singles, 3 couples (6 people), 5 families (23 people) and 1 family with 1 adult child. This included 7 working adults and 3 pregnant women. One pregnant woman was able to move into the Winter Nights shelter and delivered a daughter. One family of 7 moved into the shelter (with a newborn). One family of two and a single adult female found housing. One couple moved to Texas and a family of 4 moved out of the area.

A testimonial from one family:

Hi! I'm sorry we forgot to say something yesterday. You took such kind care of us there, but we had to try to get to him mom's house. We are too old and too medically fragile to maintain our health under those conditions. We both were declining very fast. We blew his whole check on that U-Haul for those few days and I'm blowing mine on a rental van trying to get to his mom's house. Thank you for taking care of us.


