## **IN 2019 WE:**

#### **Saved Lives.**

Our client and her daughter had fled horrific domestic violence. She was powerless against it due to lack of law enforcement and protection for women in her country. Her only option to save her daughter and herself was to flee to the United States for protection. After they arrived, they were placed in deportation proceedings by the government. We prepared her case, defended her, and helped her tell her story in court. We proved that she had been persecuted based on her membership in a particular social group. The judge granted humanitarian asylum in the case. Now, they can work on re-building their lives in safety and peace.

### Kept a Family Together.

After a mother's illness, a relative of the child took the mother to court to take custody of the child. We defended the mother and reunited her with her child.

## Supported a New Beginning.

During the client's marriage, her finances had become entwined with her husband's and she was dependent on him for her financial needs. While she didn't want the marriage to end, her husband filed for divorce. Her life became a nightmare. She needed the help of an expert divorce attorney to help her in this complex situation since she had no income of her own. We connected her with a pro bono attorney who stayed by her side through it all. The attorney believed in her and helped her to start over on stable ground financially.

#### **Rescued a Parent.**

A single mother whose child lived with her was sued in court by the father. He wanted the child to live with him. She was filled with fear and she came to us for help. We successfully defended the mother at the trial and kept things the way they were.

#### **Met Basic Needs.**

A client was granted the right to work for the first time. A single mother, the client struggled to make ends meet and the employment authorization greatly helps her to provide for her children. We are currently advocating for the client to stay in the United States based on her good moral character, length of time here, and the exceptional hardship it would cause her children if she is deported. As we are defending the client under this law, the client is granted employment authorization while her case is pending.

# **Made Things Right.**

We advocated for an immigrant who had been ordered removed (deported) before we met him. We identified defects in the way the court case was processed which made it very unfair to our client. We filed a Motion to Reopen and Terminate the client's court case. As a result, the court case was re-opened and the client is no longer under an Order for deportation. The client is, however, still in removal proceedings. We are defending him in his active proceedings and seeking asylum for him based on his fear of return to his country of nationality.

#### Saved a Home.

The client had received an eviction notice from her landlord. She was behind on her rent because she was waiting for her disability payments to begin. We negotiated with the landlord and a settlement agreement was reached. The client agreed to gradually catch up on her rent and the landlord agreed to not sue/evict the client. The client stayed in her home, an eviction was prevented, and the client will not have an eviction on her permanent record to harm her future housing options.

# **IN 2019 WE:**

#### **Defended a Family.**

We helped a family stay in their home after the owner claimed their children were causing problems and filed to evict them. The family was so devastated that they had sent an older child to live elsewhere to help their chances of not being evicted. We successfully defended the family in court. The Judge ruled in our favor, the family was able to have their child return home, and they stayed in their home.

#### **Prevented Homelessness.**

A mother living with her children was scheduled to attend an eviction hearing. After our negotiations, the landlord withdrew his eviction complaint and a judgment was never entered against the client. The client continues to live in her home with her children.

#### **Brightened a Future.**

A teenage client was awarded Special Immigrant Juvenile Status. This status will protect him from violence, poverty, displacement, and enable him to participate in the normal activities of his classmates, such as getting a driver's license and a job. His new legal status has given him a much brighter future. He has had a long, challenging road, but now has hope for his future.

#### **Provided a Lifeline.**

A participant in the Haitian Family Reunification Program obtained permanent residence through our services, giving her the ability to get a job, stay united with her family, get a driver's license, and participate fully in the community. Our work has given her the ability to meet basic needs and work toward her dreams.

#### **Provided Refuge.**

We represented a guardian who had taken in a child from Central America who had traveled to the United States on his own to escape danger and neglect. After a stay at a shelter for unaccompanied youth near the border, the child was placed in a home in Franklin County. Through our services, the guardian sought custody of the child to stabilize the child's life and to help protect him from being deported to an unsafe situation. The guardian was awarded custody. We continue to defend the child in immigration court.

#### Cared for the Disabled.

We referred a disabled, elderly veteran to a pro bono attorney for services for a Power of Attorney. The client was staying in a nursing home and could not go to an attorney's office. The pro bono attorney visited the client in the nursing home, and prepared the document. The client needed this Power of Attorney document so his relatives could help him efficiently at this time in his life.

# **IN 2019 WE:**



#### **Protected the Vulnerable.**

An immigrant living a home condemned by the Borough of Chambersburg due to serious repairs that were needed was forced out and had to sleep in her car until she could find other housing. The landlord was refusing to return the rent that she had pre-paid for that month and her security deposit. After our advocacy, the landlord returned the funds which were much-needed by the client to find new housing and provide for her family's needs.

#### Welcomed an Immigrant.

An immigrant worked very hard to learn English and United States civics. Franklin Legal Services represented her in her naturalization case and the client became a proud citizen of the United States of America at the Franklin County Courthouse on June 14, 2019. It was a great celebration day!





# **Direct Representation**




# **Advice Only**


