Security Sales Tax

The "Quarter for the Quarter" sales tax collection began on October 1, 2021, as required until June 2026.

The reinstatement of a 0.245 percent special sales tax levied in the French Quarter was approved by voters on the April 2021 special election ballot to authorize the funding of additional POST-certified officer patrols and other public safety programs in the area. The tax collection was originally set to take effect July 1 but was delayed.

On September 30th, FQBA President Tony Viloria spoke at and represented the business community at District C Councilmember Kristin Gisleson Palmer's signing of the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement with the French Quarter Economic Development District (FQEDD), the French Quarter Management District, and the City of New Orleans that governs the administration and oversight of the FQEDD Trust Fund and the programs that it funds.

"This is a matter of extreme concern for the French Quarter Business Association," Executive Director Brittany Mulla McGovern said during a Monday meeting of the French Quarter Management District.

McGovern, who also sits on the board, said the issue came across her radar in August when the city hand-delivered an invoice to one French Quarter business indicating that it owed proceeds from the expired tax.

"We reached out to the finance department and they assured us this was a segregated case of a business being invoiced for an expired tax," McGovern said.




City erroneously collected more than \$460,000 from expired FQ sales tax, and now can't spend it

The Lens and The Times-Picayune | The New Orleans Advocate reported on the City of New Orleans' erroneous collections in 2021 of \$466,671 of an expired French Quarter sales tax. The FQBA worked on the issue with the City of New Orleans' Finance Department and District C Council staff since made aware of the issue on August 10, 2021. The FQBA is the only entity to inform its membership to cease collection of the expired 0.2495% FQEDD sales tax (informative monthly e-newsletters and direct communications with FQBA staff is one of the many benefits of FQBA membership). Guidance from the Louisiana Attorney General's office dictates that the erroneously collected taxes should be segregated for a three-year prescriptive period, redeemed to any taxpayer who can prove payment of the erroneously collected tax, and after three years the taxes can be spent by the French Quarter Economic Development District for the purpose of the original referendum for which they were levied.

In June 2020, the City of New Orleans introduced a 41-page document entitled "Reimagining the French Quarter." FQBA membership were vehemently opposed to the proposals and the FQBA worked from June 2020 to April 2021 on advocating against the pedestrianization of the French Quarter.

Out of the eight incomplete and unvetted proposed concepts only the following were achieved in 2021:

1. French Market Place Updates, such as new street lighting installed and services working with unhoused individuals, and
2. A refined Neighborhood Slow Zone, where City Council adopted 15 mph speed limits in interior streets of the French Quarter

5G/Small Cell Towers

Since October 2019, the FQBA has been working with other French Quarter groups to minimize unsightly 5G tower installation in the French Quarter. 5G, or Fifth Generation, cellular service is the newest advancement in cellular technology. It requires new transmission towers that differ from the large-scale macro towers and the 74 existing fifteen-foot 4G towers that exist in the French Quarter.

Pole Design to Integrate with Existing Poles

The four major mobile carriers have been rolling in additional cell towers into the Quarter during heavy attendance events like French Quarter Fest, Mardi Gras, etc. to keep up with wireless demand. Notably, 5G waves do not penetrate walls, and will not service residents or businesses that operate indoors. This is for open air wireless usage only.

On August 12, 2020, a decision was made in the City of Portland v. United States case that was heard in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals on February 10, 2020. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has defeated dozens of cities in court (including Portland, Oregon; San Francisco; New York City; Los Angeles; Boston; Chicago; Washington, DC; Las Vegas; Philadelphia; Austin, Texas; and others), with judges ruling that the FCC can preempt local fees and regulations imposed on wireless carriers deploying 5G networks. Rather than give the FCC a complete victory, the judges' panel overturned the commission's preemption of certain aesthetic requirements that cities and towns impose on cellular installations. The FCC ruled that "aesthetics requirements are not preempted if they are (1) reasonable, (2) no more burdensome than those applied to other types of infrastructure deployments, and (3) objective and published in advance." This action reassures that the efforts of the FQBA were appropriate and ahead of our city's peers.

Due in part to the FQBA's efforts, the City will require the carriers to install new 5G streetlight poles to replace existing non-5G streetlight poles, creating a zero net gain.

Sixty-eight 5G streetlight poles have been permitted for installation in 2021. The Vieux Carre Commission (VCC) allowed for a number to be installed for a review period. One outcome of that review period was that the VCC asked that the poles be changed from fiber glass to cast iron. Due to nationwide supply chain issues installation has been piecemealed.

Graffiti Cleanup



After a year lapse, the FQBA brought back their hallmark event - the Vieux Carre Graffiti Abatement Program's all-volunteer graffiti cleanup of the French Quarter. In May 2021, nearly 50 volunteers cleaned graffiti in the French Quarter. The event was attended by District C Councilmember Kristin Gisleson Palmer and was covered by Fox8 and *The Times-Picayune* | *The New Orleans Advocate*.
