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I have thought for a long time that church altar guilds came into being on that first Maundy Thursday evening – the night when Jesus and the Twelve met for the supper in the upper room before his death. Although the Gospels are silent on the matter, someone cooked, prepared the room and the meal, and cleaned up. The examples of my mother and my wife tell me this. With these thoughts, I wrote these lines in the early 1990s in thanksgiving for all altar guild members (who are mostly women) and especially for the altar guild of Trinity Church, Mobile, who were my companions in service for so many years.

# Burning of Linens

Once a religious object is blessed and dedicated for divine worship or veneration, it must be treated with reverence and not be used in either an improper or profane way. However, blessed religious objects break or wear from use. The basic rule for the disposition of these items is to burn or to bury them. Here are a few examples:

- A chalice which becomes "unserviceable" is not to be sold, but must be used for some other sacred purpose or melted.
- Vestments, altar cloths, and linens must be destroyed.
- Polluted or excess holy water must be poured into the ground.
- Palms are to be burned, and the ashes then used for distribution on Ash Wednesday or returned to the ground.
- A broken rosary or religious statue normally would be buried.

In all, the underlying idea is that what has been dedicated to God should be returned to God. One should never just "throw out" what has been dedicated to God. Linens that can no longer be repaired should be deconsecrated and burned. Bring them to Solomon and they will be lovingly deconsecrated, burned, and the ashes scattered on the grounds.

Since 2001, at each of our meetings, Province IV has had a service to deconsecrate and burn tired linens. If you have any such, bring them to Solomon in June; we will have a burning ceremony one night while there. Prior to burning them, each item will be carefully looked at to see if any embroideries, tassels or fringes might be reused. They are often of much finer quality than is currently available. If burning is not practical, items should be deconsecrated and buried.

# My experience with the Anglican Rosary

Years ago, I had a personal crisis and went to my priest to have someone to talk to, and he did listen patiently as I shared my story. At the end of our time together, he prayed for me and offered me this advice. "Since you are so agitated right now, pray the Jesus prayer," and then he proceeded to tell me what it was. "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." He told me to repeat the prayer many times.

I followed his advice and prayed the Jesus Prayer. With time, my crisis was resolved.

Then on 9/11, I found myself with a group of people at what was to be a training but instead was a place of shock and grief as we watched the silent TV screen show the Twin Towers coming down. Someone handed me an Anglican Rosary and suggested we pray it using "The Jesus Prayer," so we did!

It was such a raw and emotional time for me that I felt I would never be able to pray again, much less focus on my spiritual life. As we read the paper coaxing us to just say the words written there, somehow, we really did begin to pray. For a brief twenty minutes, I shifted to a place that WAS prayer, and I understood that I was indeed



a sinner, as were the people who had attacked our beloved country.

With this experience, I became genuinely interested in learning more about praying the Anglican Rosary. I have found it to be an excellent tool to help me focus as I pray. I read books that helped me learn to use the Rosary while praying the Psalms, prayers from the Book of Common Prayer, and to make up my own prayers when I am worried about my children or my friends.

The Anglican Rosary has been a wonderful tool that helps me open a reliable channel to God.
