Please Join Us for a Special Social Justice Forum November 19, 2023 Noon to 1:30 in the Lounge

"Supporting Trans Youth and Families: Developing our Congregational Resources"

with Ashton Phillips and Jerni

We will be discussing ways in which our congregation can support and assist transgender children and their families threatened by legislation that has been enacted in over 20 states restricting gender affirming healthcare and other basic human rights of these vulnerable people.

As many of you know, our trans and gender expansive community members are under attack and being criminalized in many US states right now. This is so serious that they fit the criteria to be designated as internally displaced people (IDPs) by the United Nations. The UUA (Unitarian Universalist Association) and UUSC (Unitarian Universalist Service Committee) are partnering directly with frontline trans-led organizing to create networks of safety and direct support for Beloveds who need to relocate, access healthcare across state lines, or stay as safe as possible where they are.

DONATE NOW

Because of safety and legal concerns for these trans organizers, we are prioritizing security over transparency right now, which is allowing us to move together in deep trust during these crucial, scary times. For that reason, if you are interested in donating, we ask that you give generously and without asking for detailed information about our partners. Please know, though, that all donations are moving directly into the hands of trans-led organizers and being used to support trans and non-binary people in accessing the resources and support they need to survive and thrive. Some of the most basic things these funds are being used for right now include:

Moving expenses for folks who are relocating: movers & transport, first & last month's rent deposits, apartment application fees, packing supplies, equipment and/or apparel required for starting new jobs, start-up money to purchase home basics after relocating

Healthcare costs for folks who need to travel across state lines: out-of-network healthcare costs, on-the-road food and gas costs, vehicle maintenance or repair costs, lodging where host homes are not available, survival grants for people who miss work or lose their jobs for medical travel-related reasons, childcare costs for people who need to ensure their kids are safe while they travel.

NOVEMBER 2023 Social Justice Collection A New Way of Life



Susan Burton established A New Way of Life Reentry Project ANWOL 25 years ago after serving six terms in prison. From its humble beginnings as a single reentry home in South Los Angeles, ANWOL has expanded to 12 safe homes and has helped more than 1,600 formerly incarcerated women find shelter and safety. More than 4,000 individuals have had pathways to employment cleared thorough their pro bono legal team. Hundreds of women and mothers have returned to their communities to become college graduates, small business owners, lawyers, and community leaders. And perhaps most exciting of all, 31 partner organizations in 18 states and 4 countries are replicating their acclaimed reentry model.

ANWOL doesn't just provide safe housing and legal clinics. ANWOL also provides advocacy on behalf of formerly incarcerated people and leadership development for justice-involved women. They empower and build the leadership skills of formerly incarcerated people; they hire formerly incarcerated people; and they provide cuttingedge organizational leadership that promotes resources for disenfranchised people living in communities that have been marginalized.



The Disaster Fund needs your help!



Disaster Relief Fund

The UUA stands with its congregations and is ready to provide assistance to help congregations and their communities recover in the aftermath of disasters.

This calendar year has been an eventful year for our UU congregations impacted by hurricanes, flooding, and other natural disasters.. The UUA's Disaster Relief Fund is in place to help channel donations from individuals and congregations to our UU congregations needing help in the wake of disasters, particularly to those unable to access other funding sources. Often, Disaster Relief Fund Grants are the first to roll into a congregation, allowing them the immediate resources needed to protect their people and their buildings. Some congregations return their grants when they discover that their insurance or other sources pays for their needs!

During its 7 years of existence the Fund has given more than \$1.5 million in grants, more than \$275,000 of that this year alone. Today the Fund is at its lowest (\$50,000) since its beginning. While it is seeking special funding from congregations, it will also happily accept contributions from individuals.






Make a Tribute!


UUCLB '23-24 Concert Series #I

On Recruiting the "Nones" to the Unitarian Denomination by Joan DaVanzo

Let's first define the social problems facing us. We are engaged in a struggle between groups who believe in a stereotypical self (fundamentalist religion and MAGA Republicans) as opposed to those who believe in the introspective self (liberal religions and the LBGTQ+ community).

Let's give this issue some historical perspective. This struggle begins in the late 19th Century when Sigmund Freud suggested there was an unconscious depth to the mind. His observations were followed by WWI and its assertion that political and social domination was most important. After WWI there was a blossoming of interest in psychology. The Bloomberg authors gave us stream of consciousness literary works and even ordinary people on the street were intrigued by the idea that there was another, hidden self within. The Weimar Republic arose in Germany which anticipated the leveling of sexual, racial, and LBGTQ+ barriers, but it was quickly overthrown by Hitler's authoritarian rule. In the USA after the bout with authoritarianism that was McCarthyism; women's lib, the civil rights movement and finally the gay rights movement got underway. So what we are facing now is the authoritarian backlash against all of that.

Now the "nones" are both spiritual and not church members.

Since they are spiritual, it's likely the bulk of them would come to us if we make the right appeal.

What are the values that might appeal to the "nones"? The three values that the far right is against: honesty, fairness, and justice.

There is no honesty greater than the honesty behind science. We need sermons by Peter Hotez about the science behind vaccine creation. We need scientists to explain the scientific acceptance of gayness and the science behind trans.

The fairness of negotiated contracts is important for all our lives. We need sermons from contract negotiators and union officials.

Finally, we need sermons from liberal judges. We all need to know how our justice system will deal with violence, gun control, and inequity in our lives.

We can't do this as a single congregation. A single congregation would be overwhelmed. We have to work as a united Unitarian Denomination and welcome in other liberal denominations as they choose. I believe this would attract the "nones" because they long to see action on these critical issues. Now through this strategy they would see issues presented for the first time in a religious setting with all the musical, poetic, and affirmation of caring that our liberal church can provide.

On Stock Appreciation: We have met the enemy and it is US! just as Walt Kelly predicted by Joan DaVanzo

The influence of the private and public (CalPERS) investment sector, which invests in stocks is our country's greatest weakness because stock appreciation undermines our ability to sustain good paying jobs and even threatens to destroy Capitalism itself.

Investors big and small, you and I, CalPERS; all the churches, mosques, synagogues, temples in the USA; all the charities in the United States; all the nonprofits such as the Center for Skeptical Inquiry, John Oliver Productions, likely the Foundation for Freedom from Religion; all US universities from sea to shining sea and finally many individuals, governments, universities and social groups abroad invest in stocks that appreciate. That appreciation is what gives us members of the investment community income from our investments.

Stocks appreciate when overhead is reduced. In industry the greatest overhead expense is wages. So a corporation that pays its workers less tends to please the investment community, big and small, you and I, CalPERS; all the churches, mosques, synagogues, temples in the USA; all the charities in the United States; all the nonprofits such as the Center for Skeptical Inquiry, John Oliver Productions, likely the Foundation for Freedom from Religion; all US universities from sea to shining sea and finally many individuals, governments, universities and social groups abroad invest in stocks that appreciate.

So all our stock investment plans are for appreciation and against good wages.

The other way that stocks appreciate is through mergers and

acquisitions. This tends to create giant corporations that can defie any group that tries to influence them, such as unions and government. Wall Street supports this accretion of corporate power in place of small firms that compete with one another and deliver quality goods and services to the consumer.

So Wall Street is against Capitalism, as well.

Over the years since private investment became popular, investors, big and small, you and I, CalPERS; all the churches, mosques, synagogues, temples in the USA; all the charities in the United States; all the nonprofits such as the Center for Skeptical Inquiry, John Oliver Productions, likely the Foundation for Freedom from Religion; all US universities from sea to shining sea and finally many individuals, governments, universities and social groups abroad invest in stocks that appreciate; have created this corporate monster that destroys Capitalism and good wages for us all.

It's simply not enough to divest in petroleum stocks. You need to know when you are feasting on the appreciation of your stocks, you are drinking the blood of working people and dining on the social and political bodies of the United States of America. You are bending all American Institutions to the will of the almighty Wall Street that you, as members of the investment community have created.

Maybe it's time to invest in muni bonds, the ones that built the Aquarium of the Pacific, and fixes school buildings and potholes?

Is it time for you to revise your will or trust. or maybe to develop one for the first time?
