Entertaining Angels

From time to time, I used to wrap up a homemade cookie or put together a small assortment of garden flowers and send my young children around the corner to the home of a dear friend whom they called Miss Helen. Sometimes I just wanted a few moments to myself and knew that Helen would invite them in for a visit; even if she was out, the walk there and back would buy me a little time. Sometimes I wanted them to practice their independence. And sometimes I wanted to remind them to do something kind each day. I suppose that every visit accomplished all three objectives.

Although my children are grown now, I still occasionally ask them to deliver a basket of fresh strawberries to a neighbor or suggest that they pop over to the home of a trusted adult friend for advice. Reaching out in these ways is just something we do in my family—or at least try to do. I consider simple gestures like these to be essential to our humanity. We cannot thrive in isolation. We need the mutuality of relationship, the give-and-take of generosity of spirit.

Scripture is full of examples of caring and of admonitions to care for others. We find everything from the story of Abraham serving the visitors who appear at the entrance to his tent, to the command in Hebrews 13:2, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares"; from the lavishness of the fatted calf, to the simplicity of a cup of cold water. In sharing refreshment—or simply time—with others, we demonstrate our regard for them and also create opportunity to receive unexpected blessings.

These long summer days are perfect for practicing biblical hospitality, and I encourage you to embrace your own version. What small kindness might you offer? Whom will you invite into your home? Whom might you surprise with an unexpected brief visit? I also urge you to pay attention to the kindnesses offered to you and feel the relief of being grounded in gratitude.

St. Peter's abounds in opportunities to connect. You have an open invitation to stop by anytime for a visit. Throughout the week, someone is often around, and on Sunday morning you are certain to be greeted warmly. Also, please remember that on the third Wednesday of the month we come together to share a simple meal and to visit with each other, sometimes with music! In the pages that follow you will find details about our July and August "third place" Wednesday evening events, as well as about many other ways to gather meaningfully to receive and offer hospitality.

This summer I invite you to join me in giving and enjoying small gestures that mean so much, leisurely conversations that build community. Together we are sure to entertain angels.

Bishop Gutiérrez to Visit St. Peter's October 22

On Sunday, October 22, the Right Reverend Daniel G.P. Gutiérrez, will visit St. Peter's at 10 a.m. This will be a meaningful opportunity to hear from our diocesan leader and also to tell him about our ministries, dreams, and plans. Please mark your calendar and plan to attend this special single service that day.

The bishop's visit is also an opportunity for us to confirm and reaffirm our faith. Confirmation is appropriate for those who were baptized at an early age and have never made an adult affirmation of faith. Reception is appropriate for those who have made an adult affirmation of faith in another church communion and now wish to be fully committed members of the Episcopal Church. Reaffirmation is for those who were confirmed or received earlier in their lives and now wish to make a new beginning in faith. While confirmation and reception are necessary and meaningful steps for becoming a full member of the church, reaffirmation is a more personal commitment to faith, so I encourage everyone to consider taking this opportunity to participate.



Inquirers Class

Are you interested in learning about St Peter's Church in the Great Valley? Or are you curious about the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania (the birthplace of the Episcopal Church), or about how we Episcopalians are connected to the Church of England and the Anglican Communion worldwide? CYWA Food Distribution

Your help will make a difference! We have an opportunity for you to assist with making and distributing lunches at the Coatesville Youth and Women's Alliance on the third Tuesday and Wednesday of each month. Help us continue the tradition!

In June, we delivered on hundred and fifty lunches, ninety dozen eggs, and paper cups of lemonade to our friends in Coatesville. The lemonade was a welcome surprise, especially for the children, and it sparked conversation just as we had hoped it would. And we're not stopping there.


On Tuesday, **July 18**, we will again make sandwiches and pack those green bags with all the "sides" in the common room at 10 a.m. That cart in the photo, loaded with green lunch bags, is just one of many that we pack into cars for delivery to Coatesville the following day.

In July we plan to include homemade oatmeal raisin cookies as a lunch treat. Since we prepare 150 lunches each month, thirteen volunteers have the opportunity to bake a batch of 36 cookies and package three of them in twelve zip-lock sandwich bags. In the coming weeks, be on the lookout for an opportunity to sign up to bake a batch.

And if you happen to be away during July, don't worry about FOMO (fear of missing out)! We will do this again in August, so you can join us to make sandwiches and pack lunch bags at 10 a.m. on **August 15**! Thank you from the food ministry and our Coatesville friends!
